Frank's hodrod sports a '49 flathead with Mercury heads. It has a '36 transmission and a '32 read end. The wheels are 1935 wire wheels with 16" tires.



The frame is a 1934 Ford which has been narrowed and sectioned. The interior will have a Model A bench seat and the dash will be stock with the addition of an Aristocrat gauge box.

Frank also has another build going on in his backyard. It's a 5 window 1936 Ford Coupe. Frank sent me a picture of this '36 build which is shown in the picture to the right. Not one build going on at a time, but two. So we all know that Frank is hotrod crazy!

Tricks & Tips by Vem Troublesome Adjustable Lifters

I received an email from "John" asking how to "maintain the adjustment on adjustable lifters" on his hotrod. This is pretty common, so I decided to give my tips on how to trouble shoot this problem. The pictures are provided by our in-shop expert Kevzo.



Step 1. Disassemble the lifter.



Step 2. Clean the inside threads.



Step 3. Wire wheel clean the outside (male) threads.



Step 4. Give the outside threaded part of the lifters a gentle squeeze in a vice.



Step 5. Just before re-assembly, add Loctite (instant adhesive) as shown in the photo below to insure that the setting (adjustment) will last for a long time.



Step 6. Reassemble the lifter.



Tip: It will help to clear out and clean the valve lifter galley. This will insure that you have access to adjust the lifters as needed.


