ON WRITING AND PURPOSE: AN INTERVIEW WITH HERMAN HANKO

Meet Professor Herman Hanko. His love and concern for the church of Christ knows no measure. He preaches with a wisdom and intensity that no preacher can have without living 80 years and experiencing wars, church controversies and divisions, pop culture, political uprisings, world travel, mission work, teaching Bible lessons to young catechumens, instructing seminary students, giving speeches, and spending hours researching, studying, and writing. His intensity and wisdom come out in a gentle scowl and a firm but comforting thump of the pulpit as he preaches to congregations of people who increasingly feel the pressures of a depraved world.

As voracious a writer as he is preacher, Hanko has authored and coauthored nine RFPA books, written countless articles for the *Standard Bearer* magazine, and penned numerous pamphlets pertaining to Christian life.

Hanko has served the church of Christ for fifty-five years, laboring ten years in the pastoral ministry and another thirty-five years as professor of New Testament and church history at the Protestant Reformed Theological School in Grand Rapids, Michigan. He continues to serve the church even in his retirement.

preaching and lecturing both in the United States and abroad. Hanko earned an AB degree from Calvin College, a ThM from Calvin Seminary, and an MDiv from the Theological School of the Protestant Reformed Churches.

Hanko graciously consented to a brief interview concerning his writing life and the purpose behind it all.

RFPA: What is the writing process like for you? Do you enjoy the research, the outlining, the writing, or the revising the most?

Hanko: I like the actual writing the best. But to write well requires blood, sweat and tears—to use a version of Churchill's call to the British when they were attacked by the Nazi powers. I have what I suppose would amount to another three or four books tucked away in my files somewhere or stored on my computer with, I hope, a backup, that will never see the light of day. But I surely had a good time writing them.

RFPA: Can you describe your ideal writing environment?

Hanko: When one has raised a relatively large family, one learns to work under any conditions and anywhere a typewriter or

computer can be set up. One of my books was written in its original draft in a B & B in Northern Wales. Another is composed of SB articles that were written at some very unusual times and under some very strange circumstances. Another of my books was written in South Wales in the small confines of a kitchen in a small B & B. Another was extensively revised in Singapore, one of the noisiest cities I have ever been in.

ON WRITING AND PURPOSE: AN INTERVIEW WITH HERMAN HANKO

RFPA: How do you choose topics for your books?

Hanko: The books I have written are based on my own work, primarily as a professor in our Seminary, although in some cases they are based on classes I taught.

RFPA: How do you seek to make your books distinctive?

Hanko: There is a great deal of "foam" in the book market: silly, superficial, worthless, and religiously insipid. Solid, Biblical and doctrinal literature is needed for those who still like what Paul calls "strong meat" in distinction from "milk". They are the core of the church of Christ.

RFPA: Why do you write for the RFPA? Hanko: The market reached by the RFPA is exactly the market in which I desire to sell my books. They also do an excellent job of producing very attractive and worthwhile books. We live in an age when in the religious book market Solomon's words have been shown to be true: "Of the writing of many books there is no end."

The RFPA provides, so far as I know, the only consistently Reformed and Biblical books one finds on the market. Increasingly, those people who still want to be Reformed and who enjoy solid biblical material are turning to the RFPA for books. We ought to be thankful that the Lord provides us with this opportunity

to be a consistently Reformed voice in today's church world.

RFPA: Why do authors such as yourself write these books?

Hanko: It is the calling of ministers of the gospel to instruct in the truth of the Scriptures. If one can, one carries out that calling through preaching, teaching, and writing. I enjoy all three and occupy myself in all three as much as possible. We are also called to spread the truth far and wide; books are able to do that. Therefore, I write out of faithfulness to our calling, arising out of a deep sense of the blessedness and glory of God's truth.

RFPA: Which of your RFPA projects is dearest to you and why?

Hanko: I really do not have a work that I consider to be especially dear. I rarely, if ever, read my own writing after it is published, wherever it may appear. I find too many things I wish I had said differently or explained more fully. I guess I enjoyed them all, but because exegesis is my first love, I guess I would have to say that commentaries are the most enjoyable. But, having said that, history, especially of the church, attracts me like a magnet attracts a nail, and so writing history is a fascinating occupation.

RFPA: Tell us about your upcoming book, Justified unto Liberty: Commentary on Galatians (available Spring 2011).

Hanko: I was attracted to the epistle to the Galatians in my years in seminary, and my attraction to this epistle continued into my ministry and remains still today. This epistle's main themes—an unconditional covenant, the purpose of the law, and liberty in Christ—powerfully and unforgettably refute the error of justification by works, an error widely promoted throughout history and still today by leaders in Reformed and Presbyterian circles. Being schooled in the work of the ministry during the time when these matters were towering issues [schism of 1953 in the Protestant Reformed Churches] left an indelible impression on me. The power of the epistle of Paul to the Galatians has never left me.

RFPA: Do you have plans for future book projects?

Hanko: Yes, I have plans for future books, but at my age I do not think these will ever be finished—or, perhaps, even started. I do have my daughter doing some preliminary work on two of them. But if my work should be brought to an end tomorrow, no harm will have been done.

The Lord, in the great work of the gathering of the church, has no need at all for any of us; he can do it all himself if he so chooses. It is a privilege of grace to be used by him. "Weakest means fulfill his will...."

Sixty members of the Association and numerous others gathered on September 23, 2010 for the Reformed Free Publishing Association annual meeting.

Professor Herman Hanko, emeritus professor of the Protestant Reformed Seminary and author of several RFPA publications, spoke on his upcoming book, Justified unto Liberty: Commentary on Galatians (available Spring 2011).

He explained that this book came about due to his love for the book of Galatians, his understanding of Martin Luther's attraction to Galatians. the relevance of Galatians to the controversy in 1953 over a conditional covenant, and the current controversy over the federal vision teaching of justification by faith and works.

Following Hanko's address, the business meeting was held, beginning with the voting in of new Board members. Dan DeMeester, Jeff Kalsbeek, Dave Harbach, and Matt VanOverloop were elected by majority vote to 3-year terms on the RFPA Board.

Dewey Engelsma, the secretary of the Board, presented a report of RFPA activity for the previous year. Highlights included work done in the training of new copyeditors and the hiring of Bethany Kingma as an addition to the staff. A brief explanation was offered on enhancements done to the RFPA website as well as current and upcoming book projects.

Dave Hanko (former treasurer) reviewed the financial details for the fiscal year ending August 2010. Revenue from both the Book and the Standard Bearer divisions exceeded expectations. However, both of the divisions showed slight operating losses. These losses had been budgeted for and the actual performance was better than anticipated. The balance sheet reveals a healthy financial organization with a strong cash position, for which the RFPA is deeply grateful.

The strong showing on book sales and Standard Bearer subscriptions

was attributed to various promotional activities such as monthly specials, promotional mailings, and flyer distribution.

The 1,180 current RFPA Book Club members explain in large part the volume of book sales as do the 2,350 loyal subscribers of the Standard Bearer who enjoy this periodical. The recent trend for improving support and readership has continued into the new fiscal year where the month of December showed the highest volume ever for book sales and the highest number of Standard Bearer subscribers since July of 2009.

A Review of Bound to Join: Letters on Church Membership David J. Engelsma Reformed Free Publishing Association Jenison, MI, 2010 Hardback, 167 pp. Reviewed by Rev. Martyn McGeown

The occasion for this book is the lamentable situation of many Christians who are either without any church or are members of departing or apostate churches. They try to replace church membership with books, CDs and on-line sermons. They fear for their children. What should they do? Engelsma addresses these questions biblically, practically and pastorally.

Widespread confusion plagues the church world on this issue. Some believe that the church is not necessary. All they need is a Bible, a concordance and perhaps a computer. Others do see value in church membership but are fooled by the many bodies masquerading as churches.

What should we look for in a church? Look for the preaching of sound doctrine, the right administration of the

two sacraments and faithful Christian discipline. There, even when there is much weakness in many other areas, is

the true church. And there, urges Engelsma, you and your children must be.

Engelsma's thesis is as clear as it is controversial. The calling of all Christians is to become and remain members of sound, Reformed churches whatever the cost. That's Belgic Confession, Article 28!

Christ Himself calls us to forsake all things to follow Him, and following Him means joining His church as she manifests

herself in instituted congregations. Christ Himself calls us to witness against the apostasy of the false church by leaving that corrupt body

Protest ecclesiastically, but when all protest falls on deaf ears, lingering in the false church to change it from the inside

where His name is dishonoured.

is spiritually folly and disobedience to Christ.

In the preface, Engelsma calls his instruction "strong medicine for serious

ecclesiastical maladies." The applications are pointed and searching, but behind the applications is the deep, rich doctrine of ecclesiology. But this is not ecclesiology for ecclesiology's sake. This is ecclesiology in the service of the church, of church membership.

Many will stumble just there. Many applaud church membership while living separated from the church institute. Engelsma

shows convincingly that that is not an option.
