LESSON 1

Scripture passage: Genesis 1:1-5

BACKGROUND AND INTRODUCTION

For the first lesson of the semester, the teacher may begin by asking a question such as this: do you have a good lunch with you today? A good sandwich? Or: did you have toast for breakfast? Cereal? Where did it come from? Lead the responses back step by step all the way to the hand of God Who makes the fields of grain to grow and bear fruit. Carry through this same line of questioning with the homes the children live in: from the walls to the lumber to the growing trees, or from the brick to the clay of God's ground. Encourage responses affirming that everything comes from God, because He made all things.

LESSON MATERIAL

The following four question-words, to be used by the teacher as a guide, will help the organization and the development of the story of creation.

- 1. CREATION--WHEN? Keep the answer simple: in the beginning. Suggestion: chant Genesis 1:1 with the class. Explain this as long, long ago. God was there, but not the earth. And then the earth was there!
- 2. CREATION--HOW? God said. Show the difference between God's speaking and ours. Stress the idea of God's creative word. Explain the idea of the wonder.
- 3. CREATION--WHAT? Heavens and the earth. They did not look then as they do now. Suggestion: stop and look, really look at God's world (from the windows?). In explaining "without form and void," the meaning is not that the earth had no form at all and was completely empty, but that it was not finished. A first grader can understand this concept.

Describe, graphically and in detail, absolute darkness, the pitch darkness of no light at all; and then explain the presence of the Spirit of God brooding on the waters. Take the example of a hen brooding over unhatched eggs so that they will hatch alive. So the Spirit of God brooded to make a living world. Recite Genesis 1:3, and chant with the class again. The darkness of the evening did not "just come." God divided the light and the darkness: He made the night. Stress the creation of the day and night, with their dependability and regularity. You may want to say that God made time, the minutes and the hours, on this day.

Tell, or ask the children why we need light; and show why our wise Creator made light first.

4. CREATION--WHY? Quote, "and God saw that it was good." God's work is always good and perfect because He made it for His own glory. What do we, His children, do? Praise and thank Him for it.

POINTS TO REMEMBER

- 1. GOD IS LIGHT. The light of the first day is only a little picture of God as light.
- 2. GOD MAKES ALL OUR DAYS. Each day we see that He is good, and fill each day with His service.
- 3. GOD MAKES EVERY MINUTE OF OUR DAYS. How do we use this wonderful creation of God?

4. GOD ALWAYS WAS. Though we cannot fully understand it, we believe it.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES

- 1. Tell in brief and simple terms the unbelievers' theory of evolution. Contrast faith's belief in the God of the wonder. It is not too early to warn against the evolutionistic thinking which surrounds us, and even very young children.
- 2. Draw a picture of things that need light.

LESSON 54

Scripture passage: Exodus 9:13-10

BACKGROUND AND INTRODUCTION

In the three plagues of yesterday's lesson, we saw that Jehovah taught Pharaoh that He is <u>Israel's God</u>. Pharaoh had still more to learn: that Jehovah is the <u>only God</u>. Before God sent the next three plagues, He had a sermon for Pharaoh, which He preached through Moses and Aaron: God talked right to Pharaoh in this sermon. He said: you must know that there is none like Me; I might have struck all the Egyptians dead with a sore disease (this is the meaning of vs. 15); but instead I am keeping you alive so that I can show my power in you to the whole world; and are you still trying to fight me, Pharaoh? We know that Pharaoh could not fight God; for soon Almighty God will drop him to his death in the Red Sea.

LESSON MATERIAL

These three plagues may be too much for one day's lesson.

1. SEVENTH PLAGUE.

- a. Moses raised his rod to heaven, and the Lord sent thunder, lightning, hail, and fire. No one in Egypt had ever seen a storm such as this.
- b. God had given a warning to take the animals out of the fields. Those who feared God's Word did. The rest of the animals, left outside, died.
- c. This was a dreadful plague. The thunder was the voice of God's judgment, and He sent His fire creeping along the ground to destroy plants and trees, and also the crops of barley and flax.
- d. The land of Goshen had no storm at all.
- e. Pharaoh called Moses and said, "I have sinned this time. The Lord is righteous, and I and my people are wicked. If the Lord will take away the storm, I will let you go." Though this sounds as if Pharaoh was sorry, look closely at what he said: "I have sinned this time." What about all the other times? He knew he was wicked, but was he sorry about it?
- g. Moses gave him this sign: as soon as Moses was out of the city, he would ask God to stop the terrible storm. And God did.
- h. Ask the children whether Pharaoh kept his promise, and show how empty his admission of sin was.

2. EIGHTH PLAGUE.

- a. Before this plague started, Moses and Aaron went to Pharaoh and asked him why he would not be humble before the Lord, and let the people go.
- b. They told Pharaoh beforehand how awful this plague would be (vss. 5 & 6).
- c. Pharaoh seemed to pay no attention to their talking, but his servants were afraid, and begged Pharaoh to let the people go. However, they blamed the wrong man: Moses instead of Pharaoh.
- d. To please his servants, Pharaoh called Moses and Aaron back and told them to go serve the Lord. Then he added a "but." But who will go? He was willing to let the men go, but no more people.
- e. When Moses and Aaron insisted that everyone should go, he drove them out of the palace.
- f. The Lord sent an east wind all day and all night; the next morning the

land became dark with the waves of grasshoppers. They covered the whole land and ate everything in their path. Note the resemblance of grasshoppers to horses. They were pictures of armies sent by God's judgment to destroy the land.

- g. Egypt became a desert, with every green thing destroyed. Now there would be famine and starvation.
- h. Pharaoh said he was sorry, but only because he was afraid Moses would not ask God to take away the plague.
- i. God sent a strong west wind which blew the grasshoppers into the Red Sea. Not one remained in Egypt. And the Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart.

3. NINTH PLAGUE.

- a. Moses stretched his hand toward heaven and the Lord sent thick darkness.
- b. This special darkness was the kind of darkness that was before the Lord created light. No lights would pass through this darkness. It could be felt.
- c. We need light in order to live. God sent this special darkness as a picture of death and of the horrible darkness of hell.
- d. There was light, a special, God-given light, in the homes of the Israelites. It shone out of their homes into the darkness around. That, too, was a great wonder of God that He shone His light only on His people.
- e. The darkness lasted three days.
- f. Then Pharaoh called Moses and told them to go, but to leave their animals in Egypt. When Moses refused, Pharaoh angrily told him not to see his face again. And Moses agreed.

POINTS TO REMEMBER

- 1. The light which God shone inside the homes of the Israelites is a picture of the light He shines in our hearts. The light He shines in our hearts is His salvation in Jesus Christ. For Jesus is our Light, and He will lead us to heaven, where darkness will be gone forever.
- 2. In chapter 10:2 the Lord told Moses to pay attention to all God's wonder so that he could teach his children, and they could teach their children to fear the Lord. Still today we teach you children the wonders of Jehovah. Otherwise you would not know that He is Lord.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR MAP WORK, LESSON 23

- 1. If they are able, have the pupils themselves label the following:
 - a. Great Sea (this is probably better at this age than "Mediterranean")
 - b. Jordan River
 - c. Dead Sea
 - d. Mamre (underneath the X)

With careful guidance, they should be able to do this.

2. Color the Great Sea and Dead Sea blue. Trace the Jordan River with blue crayon, too. Color the land of Canaan between the Jordan River and the Great Sea light green.

INSTRUCTION FOR OUTLINE MAP, LESSON 37

The teacher will read (and explain, if necessary) the instructions.

- 1. There are two countries on this map, Canaan and Egypt.
- 2. Find Canaan by looking for the Jordan River and the Dead Sea.
- 3. Put a red X on the Jordan River and a blue X on the Dead Sea.
- 4. Write ''Dothan'' under the X on the map. Tell what happened there.
- 5. Look at the middle of your map, nearest to your left hand. The country with a river that looks as if it fans out is Egypt. Write the name "Egypt" over the fan of rivers.
- 6. Now make a road from Dothan to Egypt. Color it brown. This is the way Joseph traveled.
- 7. The teacher may use discretion in having the children color the rest of the map, e.g., the Great Sea blue, the desert area between the two countries tan, etc.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR MAP WORK, LESSON 46

- 1. This is the land of Egypt.
- 2. Trace the river and the little rivers that fan out from it in blue crayon.
- 3. Next to the river, print the word Nile.
- 4. Under the circle print the name of the city of Pithom.
- 5. Under the square print the name of the city of Raamses.
- 6. Write Goshen next to the dotted lines.
- 7. Color the Great Sea blue.
- 8. Color Egypt light green.
