





A Secret in SoHo

Leave it to the savvy trio behind some of downtown
New York's most beloved restaurants—Vincent
Boitier and the Iacovelli brothers of the much-missed
Provence and L'Orange Bleue—to open SoHo's
chicest new hotel, **The Broome.** The team spent
seven years transforming a Federal-style
building—home to a commune of artists in the late
'80s—into 14 cozy, modish (and affordable, for this
zip code) rooms. All are accessed from the property's
greatest asset: a five-story atrium café/lobby that
lends the whole place an unmistakably Left Bank
vibe (431 Broome St.; 212-431-2929; thebroomenyc
.com; doubles from \$359). —David Jefferys
