Harvest 2013: Pressing Matters

It began as a mild summer -- warm and dry. Sunny, temperate days assured that the vines grew steadily and grapes ripened evenly beneath their leafy canopies. By mid-August, everything was on the brink of Harvest, with

Pinot and Chardonnay leading the field, when the hot weather hit. Two weeks of relentless 90-degree heat sent sugar levels soaring and, all at once, two hundred tons of grapes were reaching the perfect state of ripeness.

The race was on. We sampled closely, preparing to harvest the ripest sections of the vineyard first, leaving others on the vine a few days longer. We tasted the grapes daily and began picking small sections as they reached the optimum stage. In four separate picks, we pulled up 27 tons of Pinot fruit that was ready ahead of the rest. This proved to be a good tactical move, as it freed up space for processing the tsunami of freshly picked grapes that were soon to come.

Over a two-and-a-half week span, we spent long days harvesting and processing every varietal in the vineyard. Based on both necessity and our commitment to quality, we picked then pressed red and white on the same day – for four days straight. As a team, we cleaned the presses and fermenters and, spurred on by coffee and adrenaline, recorded the minutia of each Syrah, Chardonnay, Sangiovese, and Pinot yield on its journey from vineyard to fermentation to press to barrel.

For me, the defining term of the 2013 harvest was "compression:" what is typically a ten-week season was squeezed into a frenetic five. Yes, it was challenging, at times even crazy. But, with teamwork and strategic coordination, we got it right at Rusack, and can't wait for everyone to taste the results.

Fall ACC Selections

Wine critic Robert Parker's The Wine Advocate is still among the reigning publications world-wide for wine evaluations and scores. Earlier this year, Parker announced that he was passing the torch, in California, to wine reviewer, Jeb Dunnuck, formerly of The Rhone Report. We are proud to announce that Rusack Vineyards again fared wonderfully well in Dunnuck's first Central Coast Report

under the auspices of The Wine Advocate, which was released earlier this month. Among the scores we received were:

2010 ANACAPA: 91 POINTS. "...It offers up classic notes of cassis, lead pencil, chocolate and a touch of baking spice as well as a medium to full-bodied, seamless profile on the palate. Drink now-2022."

2011 RESERVE PINOT NOIR: 92 POINTS. "Much more serious and focused, the 2011 Pinot Noir Reserve, which spent 10 months in 50% new French oak, offers up notions of crisp black cherries, new leather and crushed stone that flow to a medium-bodied, pure and detailed wine that carries finely polished tannin and plenty of length. It should age nicely through 2020. Drink now-2020."



2011 SYRAH BALLARD CANYON ESTATE RESERVE: 92 POINTS. "More pure and elegant, the 2011 Syrah Ballard Canyon Estate Reserve is a full-bodied, seamless effort that has loads of fruit and texture. Black raspberry, licorice, toast and creamy licorice all show here and while it will hold longer than the straight Ballard Canyon Syrah, it has an upfront, hedonistic feel. Enjoy it through 2019. Drink now-2019."

2011 SOLOMON HILLS PINOT NOIR: 93 POINTS. "Easily my favorite of the pinots and gorgeously perfumed and elegant, the 2011 Pinot Noir Solomon Hills Vineyard dishes out knockout aromas and flavors of underbrush, toasted spice, dried rose petals and sweet red fruits. Rich, supple and pure on the palate, with medium-bodied richness, fine, yet noticeable tannin and serious length on the finish, it should be given another 2-3 years in the cellar and thrill through 2023. Drink 2015-2023."



2011 SANTA BARBARA COUNTY CHARDONNAY: 90 POINTS. "Ripe, rounded, loaded with fruit and texture, the 2011 Chardonnay exhibits outstanding aromas and flavors of brioche, vanilla custard, toast and baked apple pie to go with a medium to full-bodied, voluptuously textured palate. Big, upfront and crowd pleasing in style, it's a great value and should be consumed over the coming 1-2 years. Drink now-2015."

From one of Santa Barbara County's great growing regions, the Rusack 2012 Solomon Hills Pinot Noir captures some of the area's classic characteristics. This wine contains notes of orange rind and cherry, which follow through on the palate, giving way to the sweet silky tannins. All together, these elements make for a round and approachable wine that is also age worthy.

2011 Anacapa, Santa Barbara County

This year, our flagship Bordeaux style red wine, Anacapa, is comprised mostly of Cabernet Franc (43%) and Merlot (40%), along with some Petite Verdot (17%). This vintage captures aromas of baking spices, dried blueberries and coffee beans, accented by flavors of black cherry, dried cranberry, cocoa and the beautiful texture of lush, velvety tannins.
