SALTWATER CROCODILE


Grows up to five and a half metres in length! A giant! Has a powerful "Death Roll" attack. You don't want to bump into this when swimming in the swamp.


BROWN SNAKE

A deadly creature, its venom quickly kills if left untreated.

BLUE RING OCTOPUS

Stuff of beach holiday nightmares. As small as a golf ball, its venom can cause cardiac arrest.





STONE FISH

Obviously. Its venom causes shock, paralysis and tissue death. The bitten limb might have to be amputated, if you haven't died first.

THE RED BACK SPIDER

Most famous poisonous spider! The red striped spider's venom induces severe pain, but thankfully, deaths are rare.

TIGER SNAKE


Another of the many venomous snakes found in Australia, especially in the southern regions.

FUNNEL WEB SPIDER

Looks like a Tarantula! It has fangs that can penetrate fingernails or shoes. Eeeiuw! Found in the eastern coast of Australia, New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland.

GREAT WHITE SHARK

The largest predatory fish on earth. In the ocean, to be accurate!




All the excitement we felt for this trip died down. Trust Anthony to be the wet blanket.



WHAT'S WEIRD AND ONE-OF-A-KIND!

Seasons in Australia are back to front!



- 80% of all plants and animals that live in Australia are found NOWHERE FLSE in the world.
- Australia is the driest, flattest, hottest and most climatically challenging of all the seven continents. The other six continents are Asia, Africa, North America, South America, Europe and Antarctica. Only Antarctica is more hostile to life.

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- 50 million years as an island and continent has protected Australia's indigenous life forms from competition. Just to name two: eucalyptus in the plant world and marsupials in the animal world evolve uncommonly. Think about it, how do marsupials move? They bounce, and they can stand on two feet, like the kangaroo.
- Some of the smallest and most vulnerable native animals in Australia are driven close to extinction, by an introduced species, the fox. These poor creatures, the numbats, bettongs, qualls, potoroos, bandicoots, rock wallabies and platypuses, need urgent protection!
- The Megascolides australis are the world's largest earthworms of Gippsland, occupying the vast eastern corner of Victoria. These earthworms can grow up to three metres in length (double the height of a man!) and more than 15 centimetres in diameter (as wide as a bowl!) When they move, you can hear a gurgling sound in the ground.
- The short-beaked echidna and the duck-billed platypus are monotremes. They are primitive mammals that lay eggs, and after their babies hatch, they are nourished with their mother's milk. The word monotreme refers to "one-holed", referring to the cloaca, a single opening for the passage of eggs or sperm, faeces and urine.

• Did you know that the echidna is hatched from a single, sticky, GRAPE-SIZED, soft-shelled egg? Amazing, right?!

- Now on to the quokkas! One of the smallest wallaby species, they are marsupials. They carry their babies in a pocket of skin on the mother's stomach. Quokkas have shorter hind legs than other macropod species. Largely herbivores, they eat native grasses, leaves, stems and bark of plants.
- Quokkas have been used in medical research on muscular dystrophy as they suffer from the same disease.

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
Stephanie Wong is a graphic designer and illustrator.
