#### Letter from our founder

Back in 2010, I had a dream to start a business to help the most marginalized members of our community build up strong and thriving businesses. Flash forward to July 2020, I was finally able to make my dream a reality.

Originally, Guelph Market planned to run monthly in-person events so the Guelph community could browse and shop from all of the talented artisans and makers. Due to the safety precautions put in place to reduce the spread of Covid-19, we made the ultimate decision to cancel our in-person events for the forseeable future, and instead turn to creating an online platform to promote our vendors' works.

Since launching our website on July 1, 2020, we have grown considerably. We now have over 30 vendors that have joined the Guelph Market family! We've also started creating partnerships with local non profit organizations to help spread the word and help them raise funds.

With our transition to going completely online, we came up with the perfect solution to give back to the community! Guelph Market plans to hold monthly fundraiser auctions to help raise funds for non profit organizations that work with marginalized members of our community.

In November 2020, we held a fundraiser for the 1492 Landback Lane community in Caledonia. During this fundraiser we had over 30 products donated from local businesses and community members, raising a total of \$600 for the Indigenous Land Defenders to allocate based on their needs.

This month, December 2020, we are holding a fundraiser for Guelph Wellington Women in Crisis. Moving forward, we plan to hold monthly fundraisers that will happen from the 1st to 7th of the month.

Thanks to your continued support, Guelph Market is able to continue working with local businesses and organizations to help spread the word!

# The Importance of Supporting Local

As we steadily march along into the busiest season of the year (yes, even in a pandemic!), you may hear family members over zoom, friends on the telephone, or neighbours at a safe distance mentioning that they are committing to buying locally made items and products this year. For my family, the holiday season usually means a trip to the big box stores for a 'one and done' approach to holiday shopping. Sadly, last year that kind of quick and dirty shopping showed my family that there isn't much difference in products bought at the big box stores – especially when my brother and I bought my mom the same teakettle and teacup set! This holiday season we've decided that we want to have a truly unique holiday, with items that we've never seen before, or may not have even thought of when we started making our lists! We've challenged ourselves to shop from local small businesses only. But why commit to shopping local? Here's what's happening when you support small businesses in your community.

The money you would usually be giving to a big box store for your holiday shopping practically disappears into thin air! Studies have shown, when you shop at the typical big box store only 43% of that money makes it back into the community. When you shop local, more of the money you spend will be kept in Guelph. Backing small businesses means building a stronger community! Shopping local also shows that you're embracing and supporting what makes your community unique. Especially in this time of uncertainty, building a strong community is more important than ever!

Another benefit of shopping from local small business means that you're helping to create local jobs. One major downfall of the pandemic is that it has forced so many of our community members out of their steady means of employment. By supporting small businesses in Guelph, you help create higher-paying jobs for your friends and neighbours. You're showing your fellow community members that not only do you value them as a neighbor, but you value what they do for the community. To further help the community, buying local also helps protect the environment. Purchasing from local businesses helps to conserve energy and resources in the form of less fuel for transportation and less packaging being used in shipping (especially when you opt for local delivery or pickup!). Also, spending locally instead of online ensures that your sales taxes are reinvested where they belong— in your community!

Local business owners know you, and you know them. Backing your friends and neighbors in their business ventures is just another step that the Guelph Community can make to creating a tight-knit city that supports it local businesses, creators, makers and artists. Furthermore, just like with what we've been busy with at Guelph Market, studies have shown that local businesses donate to community causes at more than twice the rate of chains!

Local purchases keep the wealth in our neighborhoods and increase the prosperity for the people around us instead of going to a far-away corporation. We are so pleased to welcome Guelph Wellington Women in Crisis to the Guelph Market family!



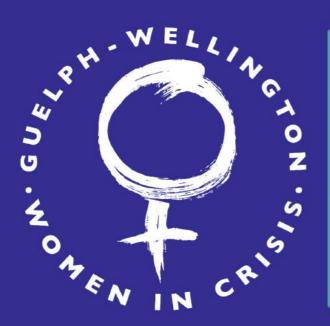

## WINTER PLANT CARE GUIDE

#### 1. Lower Light Levels

Plant growth will slow down and they will become semidormant as we experience less daylight. This doesn't mean that you should stop scheduled care and maintenance; simply allow your plants to grow at their own pace. Avid growers may consider using grow lights as a supplement.



Lower light levels slow down photosynthesis and as a result, plants will use less water in winter months. Make sure to water only as much as your plant needs and monitor how fast your plants are drying out. Always allow excess water to drain from your plants.

#### 3. Cold Drafts and Heating

If you find that your plants are drying out faster in the winter, it is likely a result of your home heating system. Ensure that plants are not in the path of any hot air vents as this can cause browning on foliage. If you have a fireplace, keep app plants at least 5 feet away.

#### 4. Fertilizing

Houseplants continue to grow in the winter, but their growth will slow down. Unused fertilizer left in the soil can damage plant roots so it is best to cut fertilizing concentrations in half.

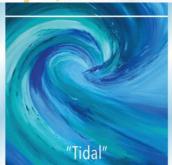

#### HOLIDAY HACKS TO FOSTER WELL BEING AND NEW TRADITIONS.

Human beings thrive on consistency. That does not bode well for us in these "Covid Times". Clearly we will be challenged; especially those who live alone or are away from family. However, pulling together and creating new routines can help us experience a sense of togetherness even while physically apart.

The key here is to reinforce and amplify the thoughts and behaviours that give us a sense of connection and belonging.

Here are some things we can do:

#### Accept-

Things ARE different and this alone can stress our nervous system.

However, a daily practice of *looking for* things to be grateful for literally stimulates uplifting feelings in the brain. *Even the breath you are taking right now* is something to be grateful for and will increase a sense of well being. Our brain doesn't distinguish between huge and tiny. So just find even the smallest thing.

#### **Don't Compare**

Don't label things "good or bad". Our attitude affects our entire mood. Protect yourself. Be mindful of thoughts that present as happy memories and morph into a sense of loss. How you respond to thoughts determines whether your day is filled with gratitude or despair.

#### Plan Activities and Start New Traditions.

Our traditions create rhythm and predictability and give us a sense of belonging. This year make new traditions. Write a song or poem together. Develop a recipe. Donate to charity. Take a drive to see the holiday decorations.

<u>Make to do lists</u> that are up lifting. Have the list handy so when you are down you don't have to start from scratch remembering them.

**Get a rescue pet, or a plant.** Caring for something gets oxytocin flowing and gives a sense of connection.

**Do something crafty.** Being creative stimulates the brain and can be rejuvenating. **Call friends and family.** Plan this in advance so you can look forward to it. Call everyone!! **Plan the menu** assigning each person a dish. Exchanger dishes. Share dinner over zoom. **Make a memory box**-to feed the spirit. When you are nostalgic, write it on a slip of paper. Decorate it and sit in APPRECIATION. **Feeling** needs to be deliberate so it stores in memory. Assemble memories in your box. Cultivate happiness as you infuse your box with happy memories and gratitude. If thoughts turn into sadness or regret be mindful and gently bring yourself back into appreciation.

<u>Plan For Rest and Digest.</u> The Vagus nerve is part of the parasympathetic nervous system which is responsible for "rest and digest". Keeping this nerve healthy reduces stressful feelings.

<u>Singing, humming, breathing out more slowly</u> than breathing in helps reduce stress and calm the vagus nerve. Sing in the shower or while doing house work. <u>Stay connected.</u> When we are unhappy we tend to avoid others. We may think we are a burden or be seen as "weak". But isolating is the worst thing we can do. Do you know loneliness is as lethal as smoking 15 cigarettes a day?

People don't tend to like change- but if you approach this time with curiosity and a sense of adventure you may be surprised how many resources you can connect with. Stay well.

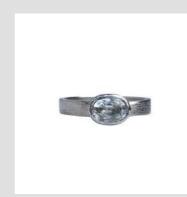
