
to our children

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### Day 1 - Getting to know one another

Excitement filled the air as families gathered at Changi Airport for the flight to Kuching, Sarawak. For some families, it was their first time on board a plane! While onboard, we celebrated Ang Howe Jun's birthday, with all passengers singing him a birthday song.

Upon arrival at Damai Puri Spa and Resort, we had mass ice-breaker games, followed by an opening address by CCF Executive Director Chee Wai Yee.

After dinner, families gathered for group activities with their leaders and coleaders. It was an opportunity for bonding and to get to know one another better.



It was a wet morning, but that did not dampen our spirits as we departed for the Sarawak Cultural Village. Families visited the different tribal houses and got to learn about the indigenous groups in Sarawak. They even participated in a dance workshop and learnt a simple Bidayuh dance!

After lunch, it was free and easy time for families to relax by the pool and beach. CCF set up a beach toy library to loan items such as kites and beach tool sets to

Thereafter, we proceeded indoors for psychosocial activities. Led by CCF social workers, the activities had families demographically divided into parents, teens and children groups respectively. Each demographic group activity had different objectives: for the children, the objective was for them to learn the importance of sharing and friendship; for teens, it was about building a caring and sharing community amongst them; and for the parents, it was to encourage compassion for others, and to increase positive self-statements.



### Day 3 - Inter-family bonding and talentime

After a morning exercise by the beach, we had an awesome time of station games! One of the games had the families decorate their own family autograph book, in which they could use to gather messages from other families and volunteers as part of their AFR memories.

Then, we had a cultural carnival where families were presented with opportunities to dress in tribal costumes. We had an exhilarating time trying out traditional games such as the improvised blow-pipes!

It was then the long-awaited gala dinner. Together with guests from Sarawak Children's Cancer Society (SCCS), we were treated to delicious dinner and impressive performances by each group, based on the theme of 'Nature Touch, Community Spirit'. The children performed on stage, and enjoyed themselves tremendously. It was a spectacular night!



### Day 4 - Giving back to the local community

After an early breakfast, we further embraced the 'community spirit' theme of the AFR by getting ourselves involved in community service at three different locations. A group of us visited the Oncology and Surgical Ward of Sarawak General Hospital, where families presented gifts to the children and put up Christmas decorations to spread the festive cheer. Another group visited SCCS Children's Care Centre, where they played games with the children and taught them the cheers they have learnt during the Retreat. The third group visited SCCS's upcoming Children's Care Centre, and witnessed the tree-planting ceremony at the site.

After a meaningful time of giving back to the community at Sarawak, it was Home Sweet Home.




## Children's Day Party @ Play Nation

### What is a head of hair worth?

1 passionate Yahoos put a price on their heads to kick-off Purple Hope – a community initiative by Yahoo! Singapore to extend the company's reach in support of non-profit organisations and their social causes. CCF is honoured to be the first beneficiary of this annual campaign.


Held at the National Library Building on 8 October 2011, ADORE was attended by 38 guests, including 17 bereaved family members. The memorial service began with a sharing from two bereaved family members, followed by testimonies from two CCF social workers.

To mark the 10<sup>th</sup> year of ADORE, a memorial wall was specially created in honour of the children who had touched many lives and brought joy to those around them. As guests walked along the memorial wall with names of the little brave warriors, they wrote heartfelt messages on golden ribbons and pinned them beside the names of those whom they knew and cherished.

At the close of the memorial service, each family was presented with stalks of tulips, in recognition of the journey they have taken and in remembrance of their children.



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rom April to August 2011, 19-year-old Adel Geow did an internship with CCF@ KKH as part of her Diploma course in Psychology and Community Services.

During her short stint with CCF, the third-year student from Ngee Ann Polytechnic had the opportunity to interact with CCF beneficiaries, many of whom shared with her their cancer journey.

Through her interaction with the teenage patients and survivors, Adel was deeply moved by their optimism and bravery. She was inspired to share their stories of courage with other teenage cancer patients, in hopes of encouraging them to press on and not give up their fight with cancer. This led to the publication of Cancer Courage: A guidebook for teenagers with cancer.

"The idea is to develop a resource booklet for teenagers newly diagnosed with cancer, to help them better understand what they are going through," said Adel.

The 40-page booklet written and designed by Adel herself covers topics ranging from medical to psychological aspects of cancer. It provides insights about the common types of cancer among teens, tips on coping with side-effects of treatment, as well as advice from fellow teenagers on dealing with hospitalisation. It also includes activities for the readers to express their thoughts through writing and drawing.

"The process of producing Cancer Courage has given me the opportunity to know many new brave friends. They have inspired and motivated me to see things from a different perspective, and to never give up even in the face of hardships. Their courage and optimism have given me a renewed appreciation for life," Adel said.

The publication of Cancer Courage is made possible through the collaborative efforts of CCF and Ngee Ann Polytechnic, and is supported by National Youth Council's Young ChangeMakers Grant.
