This set of educational games and activities is designed to teach Phonemic Awareness. Children will love developing their understanding of sounds within words to play each game. These games have been designed to teach voice sounds, rhyming, volume, alliteration, and matching sounds. This game set is at a pre-reading level and leads on to 6 Letter Sound Games.

How to Play:

Rhyming Cards



This collection of 13 rhyming pairs can be used for simple matching games. Practice sounding out the words to hear the common rhyming patterns and then match them with the other object that also ends in the same sound. Color-coding around the border provides self correcting / checking support.

Metal Mike

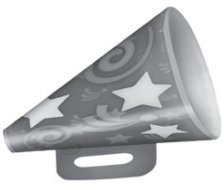


Metal Mike cards provide simple words (such as Consonant-Vowel-Consonant) for practicing sound talking. Sound talking is speaking each letter sound (with a brief pause) before saying the word. For example ' /b/ /u/ /g/ - bug'. When speaking in sound talk, be sure not to pronounce /uh/ after the /b/ sound and try to keep the letter sounds as pure as possible. An adult can speak for Metal Mike in sound talk and then the child can choose the correct picture. Children can also take turns speaking in sound talk, segmenting out the sounds in words.



Voice Sounds

These 10 voice sound cards can be used for making various sounds and for hearing the differences between sounds. Practice making the sounds, or get an adult to make the sound and identify the correct matching picture.



Make a Trumpet

This simple cardboard trumpet can be made to practice voice control and volume manipulation. Speak into the trumpet and practice changing the loudness of speech. Cover the open end of the trumpet and practice altering the sound.



Odd One Out

This simple board game requires children to take 4 simple object cards and place them on the board. Three of them share common rhyming patterns, while one is the odd-one-out. Place the odd-one-out and continue until the board is complete. Do the odd-ones-out share anything in common with each other?



Silly Soups

A simple board game where children make up their own silly soups. Anything can go in the soup cauldron, so long as it starts with the same sound. Complete until all the cards are used. As an ingredient is added, sing 'We're making lots of silly soup, we're making soup that's silly. In goes some rice, some raisins, a ring, a rat...' Be sure to emphasize the initial sound so that children can hear the same sound across the object.

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
