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Introduction to Easy Guitar

This course was written to teach students in Gr. 4-8 classroom music how to play chords to accompany singing. Though it is a course for beginning students, most teachers will find the initial range of ability covers students who have never touched a guitar in their lives to those who are already quite accomplished. It is assumed that for some students, the only time they will handle a guitar is in your class. This is an introductory course, meaning that only the surface of this vast and multi-styled instrument will be scratched.

Most music teachers work under considerable time pressure to have students performing as quickly as possible. In addition, the population of students we are working with is accustomed to immediate gratification in almost all areas of their lives. Therefore, the course is designed to give a sense of accomplishment as soon as possible. In order to achieve this feeling of success quickly, the first fifteen songs use only the tonic chord. This gives the student a sense of playing the song while developing good chord formation but they will not have to change chords. By the end of the fifteenth song, the students will have mastered forming Em, D, A, C, G and E. The switching of chords is often when the first real frustration of guitar players is experienced. The first switch is D to A which is relatively easy. If students cannot manage the switch, have them play just the D chord or just the A chord. Divide the class into two groups. Make a copy of the D chord and the A chord on cardstock. Hold up the D card when it's time for that group to play and switch to the A for the second group. Encourage any student who is able to switch, to play both chords. The G chord can also be difficult for students, so consider allowing them to use the four string G chord instead. The careful balancing act between moving the students forward and keeping frustration to a minimum must be monitored at all times.




We have included a PowerPoint to project for every song. Play the PowerPoint (audio is linked) and then you, the teacher, can go around the class and check chord formation.

In addition to the PowerPoints of the songs, we're including links to many YouTube videos of easy pop songs that students can play beginning when they know the E and A chords. These songs will be fun for the students to learn! However, the ever changing taste in musical selection is something that needs to be considered. Last year's hit is soon forgotten. So, after the easy pop songs are introduced, invite the students to bring in their own music that they'd like to learn how to play. Once the songs are checked for appropriate content and playability, simplified versions of the chords can be introduced and links can be put up for play-a-long.


So, in a sense, this program combines the best of what is fixed - standard chords of the guitar taught with traditional folksongs, with the best of what is new!


