Effects of this medicine
This medicine is synthesized adrenal corticosteroid. It suppresses inflammation of skin to improve the symptoms such
as redness, swelling, itch, etc.
It is usually used to treat eczema/dermatitis syndrome, prurigo syndrome, insect bites, psoriasis, palmoplanter
pustulosis.
The following patients may need to be careful when using this medicine.Be sure to tell your doctor and
pharmacist.
•If you have previously experienced any allergic reactions (itch, rash, etc.) to any medicines or foods.
If you have: skin infection with bacteria/fungus/spirochete bacterium/virus, skin disease caused by insects (ticks,
hair lice, etc.), eczematous external otitis with eardrum perforation, ulcer or heat burn/frost bite.
• If you are pregnant or breastfeeding.
•If you are taking any other medicinal products. (Some medicines may interact to enhance or diminish medicinal
effects. Beware of over-the-counter medicines and dietary supplements as well as other prescription medicines.)
