American Revolution

After the end of the French and Indian War, the British decided that they needed a means to obtain money to help pay off the expenses of the war. Therefore, they began sending troops to the American colonies for "protection." They then, in return, made the colonists pay for this protection. They tried to tell the colonists that they could not purchase products from anywhere but Britain. They also began to pass taxes such as the Stamp Act.


The colonists began to recognize that Britain was governing for the good of Britain and not for the good of America. The colonists decided that they did not want protection, goods, or taxes from Britain. They wanted to govern themselves the way they wanted without the input of Britain The colonists got together and formed the First Continental Congress. They demounced British laws and said that they wanted to be independent.


Angered by this, the King sent soldiers to America to regain control. When British troops landed in Concord, Massachusetts the American soldiers were ready, and they fought back. The first battle began in 1775. This battle marked the beginning of the American Revolution. George Washington was chosen as the leader of the Continental army.

On July 4, 1776, the new American states adopted the Declaration of Independence. For three years the Latties continued, with each side winning some and losing some. The way finally ended on September 3, 1793, with the signing of the Treaty of Parce With this treaty, Great Britain gave up its control of the colonies and the colonists finally won their true independence.



The word revolution means a complete change in government. The people who lived in America but still remained loyal to the British King were called "Tories". One-third of all Americans opposed the War. It is said that the British had more American men fighting on her side, then George Washington had fighting with him.






Boston Tea Party


In 1773, a Boston lawyer colonist named James Otis began stirring up the other colonists. He was angered that the British Parliament was making all the rules concerning the American colonies. Otis told the colonists that they should be allowed to vote the way they wanted. No one from the colonies was allowed to protest or be a member of the British Parliament. Otis told the colonists, "taxation without representation is tyranny."

To keep the peace, the British government gradually began to give the colonists some of the things of which they were complaining. They took away all taxes except the tax on tea. Still, the colonists were not happy. On December 16, 1773, angry Patriots, dressed as Indians, slipped quietly onto British ships without the soldiers or sailors seeing them and dumped 342 grates of tea into Boston Harbor.

This act by the colonists angered King George To punish them for this act, he closed all of the ports in the Boston Harbor. He cold the colonists that nothing would be shipped in or out of the harbor until the tea was paid for.
