Each topic has a(an):

- * information page
- *correlating activity pages
- *vocabulary words

Information Page

Each of the topics has an information page to read Cyou child.

Activity Page

After the information page has been read, it is that to do the activity that is found right after the information page. Some of these activities are work or fun while others are more challenging. All of them will enrich your child's understanding and knowledge of each topic.

Vocabulary Study

The underlined words are vocabulary words. Read each sentence that contains the vocabulary word very carefully. It is important that your child hear the vocabulary words in context. Ask your child if he/she can get the meaning of the word from listening to the sentence it is contained in. Next, turn to the vocabulary pages in the back of the book. Use a dictionary to find the meaning of the word and write; on the lines provided. Vocabulary study increases your child's knowledge of the topic!

How Long Does it Take to Complete A Unit Study?

Doing a study guide page and an activity sheet a day, it should take about one month to complete. However, you can expand the study portion and make it last as long as you like! That's the beauty of homeschooling! Do it YOUR way!

Study Choices

Choice #1- Read the first page of the study guide. Then use the internet and fun children's books to learn more about the topic that is covered in that study guide. For instance-our Anterican Indians Unit Study has a study guide page about Geronian. Lig into Geronian. There are probably lots of interesting things to learn about him that the study guide does not cover. Spend a day on Geronian or spend a week! When your child has completed studying that particular topic, it will be time to do the activity sheet for that topic. The activity sheets are found right after the study guide page that it look with.

Choice #2- Remonly the study guide page and do the activity sheet that goes with it. The activity sheets are found right after the study guide page that it goes with. You may choose to do one study guide/activity sheet per day, two per day, two per week, three per week, etc. It doesn't matter. The pace is completely up to you. At one per day, it will take about a month to complete this unit study.

Tips and tricks to go the extra mile!

Supplies Need:

½ inch three-ring binder

8 tabs (if you are using our copywork and/or notebooking pages, you will need to have 10 tabs. Label with copywork and notebooking)

Your study guide and activity sheet pages

- 1. Label your tabs: Study Guide, Activity Steets, Book Log, NICK, Biography Reports, Outlines, and Narration pages (Copywork and Notebooking, if using these).
- 2. Make copies of NICK rates and cutline forms and narration forms, put them behind the tabs. Your child can use either the NICK notes form (easier) or the outline form (a b hander) after any of the study guides. The narration forms also come in two levels. Choose the correct level for your child. These serve as a good way for your child to show what they have learned.
- 3. Hole punch your study guide and activity sheets and place behind the correct tab. You will read a page of a study guide. Behind the study guide are all of the activities that go with that study guide.

Was Jesus' Death Prophesied?

Prophecies are God-given <u>revelations</u> of the future. God used prophecies to instruct his people about events that would occur later. Prophecies are God's promises, not <u>predictions</u>.

The birth of Jesus was the fulfillment of centuries of Messianic prophecies found in the Old Testament. Throughout the Old Testament, stories were told of the place of Jesus' birth, details of his life, his mission, his nature, his death, and his resurrection. There are over 300 Messianic prophecies in the Bible's Old Testament that refer to Jesus.


These prophecies are all promises straight from God hards stated in the prophesy that the Messiah would be a leader a prophet, a teacher, a priest, and one of God's chosen people, a Jew. They knew he would somehow fill the role of intermediary between God and not a. He would speak the words of God and offer himself to die for the sins of the people.

The Ministry of Jesus

Jesus began his ministry around the age of 30. It lasted for 3 years. The Galilee region was the home of Jesus during much of this time. The Bible tells us that Jesus preferred parables, <u>metaphors</u>, <u>allegories</u>, sayings, and proverbs as his method of teaching. Before Jesus' ministry began, He was baptized by John the Baptist in the Jordan river. After that, Satan tempted him in the Judean desert. We later learn that Jesus left his hometown of Nazareth. During his time, King Herod arrested John the Baptist.

After leaving Nazareth, Jesus went to Capernaum, a cizebble pwn on the northwest shore of the Sea of Galilee. While Jesus was percon earth, he performed many miracles, told parables, told what he wen was like, and how God cares for us. He shared his message in syragogues, in boats, on hills, and in homes. During his ministry, he healed the sick helped the tormented, raised the crippled, and gave sight to the blinds however, Jesus' main purpose for coming to earth was for a reason that no only else could fulfill.

The Region of Galilee

Galilee is located in the northern region of Israel. It is divided into three regions: Upper Galilee, Lower Galilee, and Western Galilee. It stretches from Dan to the north to the shores of the Mediterranean Sea and the Israeli Coastal Plain in the west. During the times of the Roman Empire and Jesus, the country was divided into Judea, Samaria, and Galilee, which comprised the whole northern section of the country. The son of Herod the Great, Herod Antipas was the ruler of Galilee.

Most of the Galilee is rocky <u>terrain</u>. Galilee has selectar large mountains including Mount Meron and Moun Tabor. During the last thirty years of Jesus' life, he called Galilee home. The first three Gospels of the New Testament are mainly about the account of Jesus' public ministry.
