## **Washington Monument**

The Washington Monument is the tallest cement structure in the world. It is located in Washington DC. and is 555 feet high. The monument is designed to look like a classic Egyptian obelisk. It was built in honor of George Washington who is referred to as the "Father of our Country." Construction was completed on July 4, 1848.


Around the base of the monument are fifty flags. They stand for the 50 states of the Union. Inside of the monument is an elevator to the top. Once at the top, you can see the White House, kincon Memorial, the Capitol Building, and the Jefferson Memorial. The area that houses all of these monuments is called The National Mall.

Using the internet, find a picture of a DC license plate. Glue it in the box.





## The Statue of Liberty


The Statue of Liberty is located in New York Harbor in New York. It is stationed right at the arrival of Ellis Island. Lady Liberty was a gift to America from the people of France. The French gave her the name Liberty Enlightening the World.

The statue is 305 feet tall including the base and pedestals. It is made of sheets of copper molded around an iron frame. She is dressed is a long flowing robe. The crown she wears on her head has seven spikes sticking out from it. They represent the seven seas and continents of the world.

One of the most obvious things about Lady Liberty is the torch that she holds in her right hand. The torch symbolizes freedom. In her left hand she holds a table inscribed with the day the united States declared its independence from England- July 4, 1176.

Ellis Island was a holding place for over 12 million immigrants to the U.S. between 1892 and 1954. For those people looking for a new home, it stood for a symbol or freedom.
