



How long does it take to complete the lambook?

Doing a chapter and mini-booklet a day, a 2-folder lapbook take, about one month to complete. However, you can expand on the topic in the text rading and make it last as long as you like!

Cover Labels- Most of the booklets that are folded look nicer with a label on top instead of stables that are folded look nicer with a label on top instead of stables.

They will be labeled "covered page" or "cover label."

So where do the mini-bookiets go?

A color coded and labeled KEY is included. This key mows you where all of the mini-booklets go in each folder. Keep this page handy! You halso see with top of the mini-booklet pages another graphic that shows <u>once again</u> where to place the booklet in each folder. So there are TWO ways to see where to place the booklet. We make it easy!! You won't get lost.

we to use the book with the mini-booklets

At the beginning of each run; booklet template page, you will see the directions for cutting and assembling the template. Within these directions, you will find which part of the book to read. After reading the selected text cut out, assemble and glue in the mini-booklet that goes with it. Then fill out the mini-booklet with the correct answers. The answers will be found in the selected text.

Lapbook assembly choices


Choice #1 -Do not glue your folders together until you have completely finished all three folders. It is easier to work with one folder instead of two or three glued together. You can keep the waiting folders in your binder that we will be mentioning later.

Choice #2 -Glue all of your folders together before beginning. Some children like to see the entire project as it is being done. Plus, it helps with keeping up with which folder you are supposed to be working in. The choices are completely up to you and your child!



The History of the Bugle

The first "horns" were made from the horns of large steers. In the days before telegraphs, telephones, and cell phones, the horn was used to communicate over long distances. Because of its light weight and small size, the horn was easy to pack and carry. When air was blown into one end of the horn, it produced a large, sharp sound. This sound could travel a great distance.

It is said that the ancient Egyptians used the loud sound of the horn to ward off evil spirits. The Greeks used the horn to sound the start of the plympic games. European armies used them to help choreograph their military.

Although animal horns served the purpose of sending sound, there were a couple of problems. Since they were made from the horns of animals, after a time they would begin to smell badly. Also, no two horns are alike, so the sounds they produced varied.

As time progressed, so did the "horn." Joseph Valliday of England invented the first metal horn in 1811. He named his invention the Royal Kent bugle, in honor of the Duke of Kent. The word *bugle* is French for "steer." The idea that horns could be made in the same sizes and staper to produce a consistent tone and pitch was a huge success!

During the Civil War, the brigle was a valuable means of communication for the soldiers out on the field. It was used to warn of dangers, tell coordinates, announce times for special meetings, and used to call the soldiers in from the battlefield. Each action had a unique call and sound.


In World War II, the bugic was used on large ships. The sound was played over a radio. By this tilly, there were over 120 different calls being used by the military.

The sound of the bugle is still used today in the military. It is blown to signal wake up, time to eat, and lights out. Most calls are now prerecorded and played over a sound system instead of a soldier actually playing it. However, a bugle is still used to play the tune, "Taps," at the funeral service of anyone who has served in the Armed Forces.
