Lily Pebbles

YouTuber and beauty and lifestyle influencer Lily Pebbles opted for a serene, neutral theme for her bathroom with tones of grey, pink and white but don't miss the hint of yellow splashed in the shower, all inspired by her favourite Brooklyn hotel.

Lily wanted the bathroom to be modern and functional with elements such as recessed wall cabinets, practical tiled shelves and a stylish vanity unit that was essential for storage.

Whilst the herringbone tiles and white basins are minimal, the addition of black taps and blush pink accents bring a sense of energy to the room. Large format grey tiles were incorporated to run throughout the floors, walls and bath panels to give a more seamless, spacious feel.

"My favourite thing has to be the mirrored" cabinets, which hold a huge amount of products, and has a designated charging point, which comes in so handy!

The cloakroom boasts industrial elegance. We love the mini concrete basin, a small space doesn't mean you need to lose those statement pieces and they are complemented perfectly with decadent brass taps.

When speaking to her designer at Ripples, Lily gave the brief of 'fun' and we think it's bouncing off the walls. Enhancing a small space is tricky but not impossible - this designer chose to place the tiles vertically and only half way up the walls, creating the impression that the space has more height. With finishing touches like the multi-purpose towel hook and soap plate, it's a cloakroom gem with practical and stylish elements that will surprise guests when that door slides away.

NEOM Real Luxury Candle

Neom candles are some of my favourites because they burn incredibly clean and turn into an oil. Their scents are gorgeous and instantly make you feel like you're in a spa, so I always have one burning when I have my evening bath.

Therapie Himalayan Detox Bath Salts

I've used these bath salts for years and repurchased them time and time again. The pink crystals work to balance pH levels & positive/negative ions and to help the body establish equilibrium. They're literally magic salts and if I've had a stressful day, a handful of these sprinkled in the bath restores my energy levels, removes any stress and give me a great night's sleep.

L'Occitaine Almond Shower Oil

Showers can be relaxing and luxurious too. I love to use this shower oil as it applies easily, turns into a slight milk and then leaves you with the softest skin all over. The subtle almond scent is also really nice - my husband and I fight over this!

A bathroom friendly plant

I think a plant can add so much to a space, especially if you're trying to create a calm and relaxing environment. I made sure to create a little shelf space in my new bathroom as I knew I wanted to add a plant to the mix. Not all plants like the humidity of a bathroom though, so pick wisely, something like a snake plant, aloe vera and ferns work well. If all else fails, get a faux plant, they still have the same effect on the room.

Underfloor heating

If you're at the planning stage of a bathroom renovation I would highly recommend adding underfloor heating to your wish list. If you think a snuggly dressing gown is an essential, wait until you've experienced the cosy feet effect of underfloor heating. No more cold mornings or tip toe-ing out of the bath, this was one of the best decisions we made in our new bathroom!

Getting the light right

Our quick and easy guide to lighting up the bathroom from Senior Designer Ana Rezende.

TWO LOOKS

Having different circuits in a bathroom can completely change the mood of the room. Opt for one switch that will give you a relaxing mood with a softer tone and one switch for your main down lights. It's an easy and cost effective way to have a bathroom that works for every user and every mood.

MOVEMENT SENSORS

Light sensors are a great investment. Having that wow effect every time you step into the bathroom or knowing it'll be easy to find your way there at night is a little luxury. Plus, it's a very practical addition if you have children who can't reach the switch or regularly leave lights on!

KEEPING ON TASK

Getting back to practical, day-to-day life, I would recommend choosing a mirror with in-built lighting for when you need to do your make up or shave. I love our 'Moon' mirror, which has a light that only illuminates onto your face when you get closer to it. For general use, it releases a soft glow around the mirror edge.

LUXURY LOOK For the master bathroom or guest ensuite, choose a beautiful pendant to create a luxurious look that will impress. At Ripples, there are a great

selection of designs that are suitable for any bathroom so no need to worry about the water or humidity; you can put one right over the bath.

INDIRECT LIGHTING

Indirect lighting is my favourite lighting feature; it's one of the best ways to create a relaxing bathroom environment. Sustainability, experience, innovation. Architect and TV presenter George Clarke, best known for his work on Amazing Spaces, gives us an insight into what makes the perfect shower...

When I think about designing a bathroom I often start with the layout and use of light and colour to maximise the space. The bathroom is not only an intimate sanctuary but also a functional space and it is incredibly important to choose the right products to work within it. An integral

part of the bathroom is the shower and whilst being functional it can also be used to create a striking focal point within any interior.

When I experienced a Methven shower (available at Ripples) for the first time, I was amazed by the difference compared to other showers. Not only are they beautifully designed; it's the clever technology inside the

products that is on the leading edge in terms of innovation. Methven are passionate about delivering an invigorating experience and are constantly challenging ideas and pushing the boundaries for new technologies. This approach has led to three shower spray technologies, each offering a unique showering sensation.

It is a common misconception that greater water

To really create a standout interior, take a look at the eye-catching Aio collection, which features a unique and award-winning halo design in matt black. Reign of retro

Making an impact in a small shower room can sometimes be a challenge. Not so for the owners of this 1930s family home, which came with a distinctly 1960s décor.

The entire house was in serious need of an update - think single glazed windows, a lack of central heating and even an outside loo!

With plans to double the size of the property and reconfigure the layout at the same time, the new owners saw a way of utilising part of the original kitchen space as a downstairs cloakroom-meets-shower room. "A shower and WC downstairs is a great advantage for today's busy families, especially those with young children," says Senior Designer at Ripples Jo Sangster, who took on the task of designing the perfect, practical space.

The homeowners had plenty of ideas when it came to the look and feel of the room, and presented Jo with a myriad of pictures and tear sheets from magazines along with moodboards on Pinterest. The overall theme comprised geometric shapes in retro prints and colours. "They really wanted the room to make its mark," adds Jo. "So I started the scheme with the Patisserie encaustic floor tiles and Exa hexagonal white textured wall tiles, coming up with three hand drawings in different variations to see what worked best."

In such a small, narrow area, it can be tempting to stick to an all-white scheme to help create the illusion of space. Jo and the homeowners used a varied approach, mixing colour, pattern and shape, to really draw the eye and detract from the compactness of the room. After the electrics and pipework were reconfigured, the design could really start to take shape.

To provide depth and contrast to the white and blue tones of the wall and floor tiles, Jo chose additional large format tiles in a dark grey and used them in both the walkin shower as well as behind the bespoke wall-hung vanity unit, which is painted in Farrow & Ball Stone Blue.

Adding a touch of luxury, a brushed brass fixed head shower, hand shower, shower mixer and basin mixer combine effortlessly with the minimal, frameless glass shower screen.

"Using wall-hung sanitaryware and storage is a great design trick in smaller bathrooms, ensuites and cloakrooms," adds Jo. "Not only does it enhance a feeling of space but it's also easier to clean too. We used a rimless wall-hung WC with soft-close seat and topped the vanity with a sit-on washbasin that comes with a handy ledge for soap and hand cream."

As well as looking the part, the shower room is big on function with a towel radiator close to the shower and large circular mirror above the basin. There's even space underneath the vanity unit for a small step for the children to pull out as and when needed.

"The overall effect is eye-catching and right on trend," reveals Jo. "And yet it's a style that, thanks to its 1960s influence, isn't going to go out of fashion in a hurry." As this scheme shows, playing with colour, texture and shape can really enhance the bathroom and bring to life what could otherwise so easily be a bland, boring box room with a purely functional purpose. "Never be afraid to go bold with your choices," says Jo. "Go as big as you dare and we can always work around anything too outrageous, toning it down and combining it with calmer aspects to make the scheme work as a whole. Nothing is off limits! It's all about combining personality with purpose and this family shower room does just that."

How to future-proof your bathroom

Our designers are experts in making sure your bathroom is a long-term investment. Here's their top-notch advice...

Wondering what we mean by 'futureproofing'? We are talking anything from tiled seating to stylish grab bars (yes, stylish) that will assist with any changes to you or your family's current or future health or simply optimising the room so it's compatible with the latest technology. Here's what two designers at Ripples, Billie and Alison, had to say ...



Billie When I think future -proofing I think, timeless products, a safe

space and technology so these are my key considerations...

Choose a timeless design

I would recommend a sophisticated and elegant finish rather than something 'of the moment'. Remember, there's absolutely nothing boring about this, we can create an exceptionally classy look for a contemporary, classic or boutique style bathroom.

Get the finest quality

I can't stress it enough; always ask yourself, which items are going to stand the test of time? Even if this means investing more initially it's worth it in the long run. A bathroom is not a small update in your home, it can be disruptive and you don't

want leaking, weak and tarnished brassware after a few years.

Be practical

Again, think how is my life going to change over the next 5, 10, 20 years? A non-slip floor doesn't need to look really obviously antislip; we have lots of beautiful tiles that have a good grip and won't draw attention.

Choose a bath that has a lower edge so that children can get in and out easily and if you suffer from any negative physical conditions then it will be easier for you to lift your legs over the bath as well. Another safety feature to explore is our range of thermostatic shower controls, this way you don't need to rely on remembering to check if the temperature is too hot or cold, before getting in. You can set the maximum temperature when it's installed to avoid the risk of scalding.

Ease of clean

You can be sure to avoid watermarks by getting an easy clean coating on top of your shower glass. It will be low maintenance and limescale resistant so you don't need to spend countless hours scrubbing harsh dirt away. Another way you can keep the space clean, is to opt for underfloor and behind the wall electric heating as this will dry the space up, ensuring that mould doesn't grow.



Alison

Our bodies all change as we get older and there's no avoiding it, so it's sensible to consider this when you're redoing your bathroom. However, it doesn't have to be a negative! I want every client to get the most out of their bathroom and we have so many practical products that fit ever so subtly into the room without looking bulky or unattractive. Here are my top tips...

Take out the bath

Generally, I find that as you get older, you no longer feel the need for a bath as it can be difficult getting in and out with the added danger of a slip hazard when standing on one foot. Balance may be an issue too so losing the bath helps reduce risks involved. And, like Billie mentioned, if you can't live without a bath, take a look at getting a low height option.

Wetrooms

Wetrooms are a great solution as everything is on one level and you can keep the spray to a minimum with a single fixed glass panel. This will reduce the risk of tripping over and by removing the bath, you allow for a larger, luxury size shower area.

Within a shower area, a seat can be very useful, either one which folds away or a built in, tiled seat area. The second option is often

more popular as it is an integral part of the design where the tiles blend in together.

Accessories

I think you'll be pleasantly surprised by our selection of hand, grab rails – they look really sleek. We consider them a key part of the design, not an ugly, practical thing that you must have. I always incorporate them into the design and the great thing about our range of accessories at Ripples is that we have some lovely options to match the rest of the products in the room.

Get comfy and be smart

A 'comfort height' loo means that yourself or the user doesn't have so far to go before they get to the seat. There are two ways we can achieve this; by setting a wall hung loo at a higher level or by buying a specific height toilet for this purpose.

I would thoroughly recommend a shower loo and don't knock it until you've tried it! Come into our showrooms and let one of us demonstrate how it works, don't worry - not literally, but we'll show you the mechanisms. This really is just a modern update on the bidet; the benefit being that it washes the user after use, reduces use of loo paper and is operated using a simple remote control. If you're looking to help the environment and avoid difficulty twisting around, this is a great choice, trust me.

A botanical **bathroom**

Say hello to happy house plants! Martin Ogden, Head of Horticulture at Petersham Nurseries, imparts his expert knowledge on creating a thriving, botanical bathroom...

Ferns

Ferns are at the top of our list for plants that enjoy the humidity and light conditions many bathrooms offer and they come in a bewildering and beautiful range of forms. My favourite is the Maidenhair fern, Adiantum. It has very delicate leaves and will enjoy the humidity briefly created by a shower, and the more prolonged steam from a leisurely bath. A regular mist will also keep them happy!

Begonias

A large family of tropical and subtropical plants hailing from South and Central America, Africa and Asia, requiring bright shade they grow typically in the understory of warm forests. They boast dramatic, exotic and rather brilliant leaves that come in silvers, reds and rusts. Many also have puckered and ruffled qualities, the variety is endless. These are perfect for north and east-facing windows that receive little or no sun.



Calathea and Marantas

A family of dramatic, leafy, tropical plants that love low light levels and lots of humidity, making them perfect bathroom plants. They display graphic leaves in silvers and whites with chevrons, stripes and splashes. Many leaves will have a dark purple reverse, an adaptation to help absorb light at a low level, these are a must-have.

Did you know?



Monstera deliciosa

The archetypal 70s houseguest, the Swiss Cheese Plant. With large, lobed glossy green leaves and holes resembling Gruyere cheese, this can be a substantial and very architectural addition to the home, though it is native to the tropical rainforests of Mexico and Panama. It likes to climb, so is perfect for loft ensuites with skylights!

Ficus lyrata aka The Fiddle Leaf Fig

Hailing from tropical West Africa, this plant has huge, paddle-shaped leaves. It enjoys bright light but not direct sunshine. Pinch out the growing tips to encourage branching and enjoy this superstar plant in your home. If you are looking for a statement plant, this one never fails to deliver - it can grow to six feet or taller!

Pilea peperomoides

Instagrammers will love this one! Succulent, round, glossy green leaves held on long stalks. Place these somewhere bright but out of full sun; water sparingly, allowing the compost to almost dry out between watering.

Orchids



Orchids are a huge family, one of the most prolific and extensive of all plant families in the world. These make perfect houseguests with an often dazzling display of flowers over many months. The Moth Orchid, Phaelaenopsis, is perhaps the best known, with big sprays of elegant, showy flowers in a huge variety of colour, pattern and shading. Their aerial roots soak up moisture in the air, and many enjoy lower light levels, which is ideal for the bathroom.

Decide on your colour palette

If you're nervous about introducing colour, then my advice would be to just pick one colour against a neutral base such as white.

It doesn't mean that you have to confine that colour to one area or one piece of furniture. For example, if you decided on

pink (one of my favourite colours), then you might pick some pink and white

patterned floor tiles but keep the bathroom furniture white. Or, why not consider choosing to tile the walls halfway up in white and then paint a matching pink on the upper half (or vice versa). Alternatively, you could keep the walls white and get

Colour matters

Now you've decided on a colour, make sure that colour is consistent throughout. You can be really precise and colour match your paint to the bath or tiles you've picked.

matching pink bathroom furniture to go with the floor tiles. The options are endless!

Create a moodboard

If you have decided on using multiple colours then it's a good idea to create a moodboard to ensure that the colours blend well together, don't hold back! Mix and match colours together until it feels right and visually pleasing, pop into Ripples and speak to an expert designer, they will be able to give you advice on colours too.

In the right light

Always look at your colour samples in the space you plan to use. You can pick up all sorts of samples at Ripples from radiators to basins and tiles! Colours can look different in different light and it would be disappointing to find out after everything is in place! An item that looks light pink outdoors might end up looking a terracotta shade indoors.

The brassware

It's important to consider how the colours you pick will blend with the bathroom brassware you've decided on; taps, shower, accessories. Chrome tends to go with cooler light colours, brass pairs well with light or warm tones, and black looks great against pastel shades.

How to transform a bathroom on a budget

Award Winning Interior Blogger Emma, of Homebirds, gives her guide to achieving your dream bathroom – whatever the budget...

The most annoying thing about planning a brand new bathroom is the restrictions imposed by your budget. But it's a challenge we all face! When putting together ideas for my own dream bathroom, my goal was to create a luxury space, full of timeless style. Here's how I did it without busting the budget...

Prioritise

Think about which element of the new space is going to be most important to you. For example, if you're a bath person, make the bath your main priority in terms of where you splash the cash. If you're a shower person, invest the biggest part of your budget there. Once you've decided on your main priority, you can adjust your allocated spend accordingly.

Accessorise

The finishing touches are what make all the difference in any room and won't break the bank. When pieces are picked cleverly, they can really transform a space. Consider incorporating some plants or a few carefully selected framed prints. You could pick out some stylish towels or a statement bath mat that fits with your scheme. Paying close attention to detail is always worth it– even down to the toothbrush holder you choose!

Think carefully about colours

The colour scheme you choose will have a huge impact on the overall feel of the room. You may have a small budget, but choosing a classic, timeless colour scheme won't cost you any extra and has the potential to make your space appear much more deluxe. We suggest keeping walls and tiles muted (i.e. simple whites and greys) because if you were to go bold and then realise you're not a fan of the result, these areas can be tricky and costly to change. Inject colour through your accessories instead or perhaps via a feature bath or painted sink unit? Navy is a great colour to use to give a feeling of luxury.

Choose a standout feature

You want your new bathroom to make a statement, but choosing one component that draws the eye, rather than overdoing it with all the elements will give your new bathroom a touch of class, without costing the earth. My standout feature was my navy blue boat bath. It fills the entire back wall as you walk into the room and totally steals the show. It's certainly a talking point among houseguests and provides that memorable element that really stands out.

Be prepared to compromise

Yes it's a horrible word and nobody wants to do it! But if you prioritise the elements you desperately want in your bathroom and think carefully about what you would be willing to sacrifice, I promise you will achieve your goals inside your budget. I was desperate for brass fixtures and fittings in my bathroom, but in the end opted for chrome. I'm actually glad I did as it fits beautifully with my colour scheme and offers the classic look I was seeking.

Wetroom VS Shower

There are pros and cons to both but it's about what works for you. If you're updating your shower space and can't make your mind up, our conversation with Ripples designers Richard and Dena will help, as they have both sides to the story...







Shower Enclosures Richard's thoughts

Shower trays are a more budget friendly option as opposed to a tiled wetroom floor as they require more complex installation and more materials. Shower trays are great because you can choose from a range of colours to match the colour of the floor; you can very easily create a wetroom look without having to allocate a large proportion of your budget.

An enclosure is great for small spaces such as a loft ensuite or small family bathroom, I'd also recommend choosing a frameless shower to avoid any bold lines, giving a small space an open, roomy feel. Utilise a space in the corner of a room and you can create a fantastic showering experience for everyone.



Wetrooms Dena's thoughts

First things first, get your chosen installer to check you have the correct gradient for your wetroom floor, you don't want anything to prevent you from chasing your waste out.

Wetroom floors are completely bespoke so we'll help you to think about how big you want the space to be. The great thing about a wetroom floor is that it creates lots of options, don't feel like your space restricts you, the sky's the limit!

Make sure you are choosing a suitable tile for your wet floor, we have some beautiful slip-resistant options and we'll make sure these are suitable for the gradient of the floor. And to avoid faded tiles in a In an open wetroom you can't control where water splashes, if you opt for a shower enclosure you can contain the water. Put your towels, loo roll and accessories wherever you want and forget worrying about water going everywhere.

There is less maintenance with an enclosure, as you won't need to worry about cleaning the whole floor once you've had a shower. Great news if you've got a family using the space every day.

For those like me, who love a warm, steamy shower - an enclosure is the way to go. The warmth will really surround your body and give you that spa sensation as it contains the steam and creates the perfect place to unwind.

Something that's easily forgotten in a wetroom is making the drain very subtle! We can make them unnoticeable with just a small gap in the wall or a very simple grate that can be removed or tiled into.

Read the feature 'How to future-proof your bathroom', Billie talks about putting a heated membrane in place, not only under your floors but also behind your walls which dries the space out quickly, keeping it low maintenance. Another futureproofing benefit of a wetroom is that it creates easy access to the shower with nothing to step over or into.
