### 10. (1)

"Won't" is a contraction of "will not" – a negative statement. The corresponding question tag is thus "will you".

# 11. (4)

"She'd" is a contraction of "she had" – a positive statement. The corresponding question tag is thus "hadn't she".

# 12. (4)

Words like "dislike" (just like "hardly" and "seldom") may sound negative, but they are actually <u>positive</u> statements (He really <u>does</u> dislike going to school). In this case, the question tag is negative – so the answer is "doesn't" since the sentence is in present tense.

#### 13. (2)

The statement is a negative one (*hardly*), so the question tag is positive. The verb "goes" is in present tense, so the question tag "*does*" is the answer.

# 14. (3)

The adverbs *scarcely, never, hardly, seldom* all make a statement negative, so the question tag is positive. In this question, the answer would be "*does she*".

#### 15. (2)

The statement is a positive one (he **did** offer to help), so the question tag is negative: i.e. "**didn't he**" is the answer.

### 16. (3)

The statement is a positive one (she **did** complete it), so the question tag is negative: i.e. "didn't she" is the answer.

# 17. (3)

The statement is a positive one (were), so the question tag is negative: i.e. "weren't they".

## 18. (2)

**You'd** is a contraction of "**you would**". The statement is positive, so the question tag will be negative "**wouldn't you**".
