NEW & RECENT RELEASES

Larry Sparks: New Moon Over My Shoulder (Rebel REB-1870) Decade after decade, Larry Sparks continues to refine his style and add to his catalog. New Moon Over My Shoulder, marking a half-century since starting his own band, ranks among his best. Ron Stewart's banjo powers the energetic opener "Down in Union County" while Sparks explores the emotional depth of Gary Ferguson's "I'm Really Leaving". Most memorably, Larry fully embraces



the title song (a hit for Jimmie Davis and Tex Ritter) while both adapting the song to his style and his style to the song. Another high-level release from an artist who never quite seems to receive the acclaim he deserves. \$13.99

Bluegrass Reunion: Deluxe Edition (Acoustic Disc, ACD-4) If the Bluegrass Album began a decade or so of second generation stars recording the music of the first generation, then Bluegrass Reunion marked its powerful conclusion in 1991. Most importantly, Bluegrass Reunion surrounded the great Red Allen with the towering talent he deserved. David Grisman, whom Allen gave his start, joined Herb Pederson,

Jim Buchanan, and Jim Kerwin in the core band. Deluxe Edition adds one previously unreleased song with Vassar Clements' fiddle and doubles the number of songs with Jerry Garcia of the Grateful Dead on vocals to four. \$15.00



The Seldom Scene: Changes (Rounder, ROU-00485)

'Changes' not only marks the first Scene album without Ben Eldridge, who had been the last original member, but the 25th year for both Dudley Connell and Fred Travers as band members and the first project with the amazing Ron Stewart on banjo. Probably the first bluegrass album taking its name from a Phil Ochs song, Changes provides a thematic exploration of the singer-songwriters of the 1960s – Ochs, James Taylor, Steve Young, Steve Gillette,



Gordon Lightfoot, and more. Despite the changes, the Seldom Scene delivers what people expect – outstanding, veteran musicians and singers using bluegrass as a method to make great songs their own. \$15.00

Lucas Pasley: Stratford at Bow (self-released)

Influenced by his uncle Lawn Brooks and cousin Fred McBride, Sparta, NC's Lucas Pasley is dedicated to the fiddle and banjo music of northwestern North Carolina. On Stratford at Bow, he takes fiddle and banjo in hand to demonstrate the depth of his passion for the music and its makers. Sometimes Lucas tries to play as close to the source version as

possible. On others, such as "Shady Grove", he explores the sounds that might have been if certain pairings of great musicians of the region had been recorded together. Includes both familiar and rare tunes. \$13.99



Big Possum Stringband: The Finest Appalachian Stringband Music (self-released)

The latest incarnation of West Virginia's Big Possum Stringband builds their robust sound around the powerful fiddling of Tessa Dillon. In the style of the preceding generation of string band musicians, they provide detailed information about the provenance



of each tune. Nonetheless, Big Possum also reaches out including not just the music of Bill Monroe and Kenny Baker, but a song from Americana outlaw Billy Joe Shaver. Good stuff. \$13.99

Tricia Spencer & Howard Rains: The Old Texas Fiddle Vol. III (Old Time Tiki Parlour, TIKI-015)

Fiddlers Spencer and Rains have dug deeply in the old-time music of the Midwest and Texas. Although a couple of songs associated with Bob Wills appear, this is old-time, not western swing. Their third volume of Old Texas Fiddle shows how deep the supply of tunes must be. The 21 selections include familiar titles ("Lost Indian"), ones not usually associated with traditional fiddling ("Campbells Are

Coming"), and a whole bunch I had not heard before ("Mace Bell's Civil War March"). Like all Tiki Parlour releases, this is a lovely package including a booklet with detailed notes about each tune. Important music. \$13.99



Dewey & Leslie Brown and the Carolina Gentlemen: Under the Mountain (Liberty Showcase Records) Many folks remember Dewey Brown as the fiddler for

the Clinch Mountain Boys during Ralph's last year. The revelation on Under the Mountain comes from Leslie's strong singing and songwriting. She composed a dozen of the fourteen tracks that comprise the album. Very good stuff. \$13.99 Larry Stephenson Band: 30 (Whisper Dream Music, WDM-7428) For thirty years the Larry Stephenson Band has remained remarkably consistent and dependable. 30 displays the hallmarks of an LSB album – Larry's voice supported by strong musicians interpreting classic bluegrass ("Sweet Little Miss



Blue Eyes") and country ("Journey's End"), more recent country covers (a reboot of his early hit "Timber, I'm Falling In Love"), and good original songs including co-writes with Ronnie Bowman, Donna Ulisse, and Glen Duncan. \$15.00

Chatham Rabbits: All I Want From You (Robust Records, RBST-017) In the last year, Bynum, NC's Chatham Rabbits (named for a 1930s string band that never made a record) have become the darlings of the Triangle acoustic music scene as Mandolin Orange, whose Andrew Marlin plays mandolin here, have been shared with the rest of the world. The duo of Sarah and Austin McCombie project authenticity and love for traditional music. They wisely do not

mimic the past but nurture their own somewhat lighter and more bluegrass influenced style supporting their almost entirely original compositions. All I Want From You proves a lovely fusion of old and new. \$13.99



Blue Moon Rising: After All This Time (Mountain Fever, MFR-190322) The veteran East Tennessee sextet Blue Moon Rising began reuniting in 2015, but only fully reformed at the end of 2018 with the return of mandolinist Keith Garrett. Their seventh album but first since regrouping, After All This Time, released in May 2019, finds them in good form with mostly original members forming the group. Showing both



contemporary and traditional bluegrass influences, BMR moves easily from adapting Paul Anka's "It Doesn't Matter Anymore" to "We'll Meet Again Sweetheart" to originals to songs by some of today's best bluegrass writers. \$15.00

Debbie Durant: The Eyes of Yesteryear (Walnut Run Music, WRM-0001) DC area bassist, songwriter, and

singer Debbie Durant steps out on her own as lead singer on this solo project. She wrote 12 of the 13 songs and sings lead on all save for producer Johnny Williams' lead on the imaginative "The Ballad of John Henry's Wife." \$15.00



Allison De Groot and Tatiana Hargreaves (Free Dirt, DIRT-0092) Allison De Groot and Tatiana Hargreaves explode on to the old-time scene with a brilliant album of tunes and songs. Hargreaves' fiddling is revelatory and foundational to their sound with De Groot on banjo. Admittedly not from the South, the young pair



have learned and absorbed from the best and used that to inform their own, traditionally inflected sound. They tackle mostly traditional tunes, but add songs from Alice Gerrard and the Blue Sky Boys. Highly recommended. \$15.00

Irene Kelley: Benny's TV Repair (Mountain Fever, MFR-190510) Irene Kelley has attained such stature as a songwriter that it obscures what an outstanding vocalist she is. Benny's TV Repair showcases both aspects of her considerable talent. Kelley co-wrote all the titles with a series of noted accomplices ranging from Ronnie Bowman, Jerry Salley, and Billy Smith to studio electric guitar legend Steve Cropper, who adds his playing to "Anything to Help You Say Goodbye". With a band comprised of Stuart Duncan,

Adam Steffey, and Bryan Sutton and a plethora of guest vocalists from Dale Ann Bradley to Carl Jackson, Benny's TV Repair could be THE contemporary bluegrass album of 2019. \$15.00



Jacob Jolliff: Instrumentals Vol. 1 (Self)

Yonder Mountain String Band mandolinist Jacob Jolliff ranges from the bluegrass of "McGann Naps at Winfield" to the Dawg influenced "Stumbling



Distance (The 376 Years)" to the original sounds of "Storming Heaven (Tune for William Gerald)." Berklee grad Jolliff demonstrates a high level of virtuosity matched by the other three musicians on a sparkling outing. \$13.99

Louisa Branscomb: Gonna Love Anyway (Compass)

Over the course of five decades, one of the first female bluegrass band leaders has assembled a more than impressive set of compositions that goes far beyond her best known "Steel Rails." On Gonna Love Anyway

a plethora of bluegrass luminaries, especially younger women whose lives were changed by that song. They include Molly Tuttle, Dale Ann Bradley, Becky Buller, and Alison Brown. \$15.00



Tessa Dillon: It's Hard to Love (self-released)

Tessa Dillon, a powerhouse old-time fiddler, delivers an irresistible collection of sixteen tunes and a couple of songs. This is unmistakably a fiddle recording. Backed by Kim Johnson and Jesse Milne, Dillon displays her considerable chops, especially

shining on the faster songs that comprise most of It's Hard to Love. The simple beauty of the CD package reflects the music. Dillon offers a wonderful mix of familiar and obscure tunes. Highly recommended. \$13.99



Tommy Webb: Bluegrass Boys (Kindred Records)

Ever since "If It Wasn't for Bluegrass", eastern Kentuckian Tommy Webb has built a reputation as a prolific songwriter and for providing anthems celebrating bluegrass music. The Ron Stewart-



produced Bluegrass Boys fulfills those expectations with the title track and seven more original secular and sacred songs. Webb blends traditional and contemporary bluegrass features on another solid offering. \$13.99

David Benedict: The Golden Angle (Shelton Records, DSB-149) Mandolinist David Benedict leads a remarkable assembly of musicians through a set of eleven original compositions. The diverse tempos and sounds demonstrate strong bluegrass roots while

exploring some very contemporary acoustic music. The Golden Angle sparkles with the exceptional musicianship of Benedict, David Grier, Missy Raines, Stuart Duncan, and others. Brilliant stuff. \$13.99



Willard Gayheart & Friends: At Home in the Blue Ridge (Blue Hens Music, GAYHEART-2019)

Willard Gayheart is one of the best loved and respected people in the southwestern VA - northwestern NC oldtime and bluegrass communities. He earns deserved acclaim for his intricate drawings of people and places in central Appalachian music. His granddaughter, Dori Freeman, herself a rising Americana artist, decided it was high time that he had an album of his



own, showcasing his songwriting and singing. The happy result is At Home in the Blue Ridge. The project beautifully demonstrates how Appalachian music is not monolithic by blending old-time, bluegrass, and traditional country. \$13.99 Tim O'Brien Band: Tim O'Brien Band (Howdy Skies, HOW-2019) The Tim O'Brien Band provides a strong platter that displays everything people love about Tim's music with a larger than usual helping of bluegrass. Listeners can enjoy the latter, a couple of reels, a touch of Americana, original songs, classics, and even a co-write with Dan Auerbach of The Black

Keys. Mike Bub on bass, Shad Cobb fiddling, and Patrick Sauber playing banjo form a righteous ensemble well suited for the material. Especially for 'grass fans, this is one of O'Brien's strongest and most satisfying projects. \$15.00



George Jackson: Time and Place (self-released)

Fiddler George Jackson offers an excellent set of new tunes that sound like they have been around for years. Jackson moved to the USA from Australia three years ago. With a newcomer's eye, he finds inspiration for his music from the places he has discovered here – Chapel Hill, the Cumberland River, Jacksonville. A strong supporting cast includes young veterans



Brad Kolodner on banjo, Andrew Small on bass, Mark Kilianski and Ashlee Watkins on guitars, and Mandolin Orange's Andrew Marlin on mandolin. A lovely album full of new tunes. \$13.99

The Dowdy Brothers (self-released)

Virginia's Dowdy Brothers, Steven and Donald, front a band that delivers good ole hard bluegrass with intensity. Their sound quite resembles what was called traditional bluegrass back in the 1980s.The

Dowdy Brothers, both the album and the band, bring tremendous energy and passion to the music, but come up short in originality. Bonus points for covering a Roy McMillan song, however. \$13.99



The Cadleys: Duets and Ballads (CatieMae Records)

Veteran John and his spouse Cathy produce an album of wonderful diversity, supported by a crackerjack studio band that included Clay Hess, Tim Crouch, and Randy Kohrs. On their second project together, Cathy proves the star vocalist, easily moving among



the different styles of music heard here. The breadth makes the album a delight, ranging from "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" to Bill Monroe and the Louvins, to younger Americana artist Jonathan Byrd. \$15.00

Mountain Highway: Tradition (self-released)



This family band demonstrates a lot of talent with quite promising chops on a set of self-described classics, several not over recorded. Unfortunately, the vocals are recorded or mixed very badly, producing a hollow sound. \$13.99

Lewis & Spence: Big Bully (self-released)

Despite almost no information on the CD cover, I ascertained that the musicians on this album recorded in Pittsboro, NC, are Hannah Lewis and Micah Spence. Nicely recorded live around a single condenser microphone, the 14 selections on Big Bully feature some excellent playing (and even flatfoot

dancing) mixed on some selections with vocals that perhaps remain too close to the Carter Family. This recording succeeds in capturing the essence of authenticity across a nice variety of old-time tunes and songs. \$15.00



Cane Mill Road: Gap to Gap (Patuxent, PATUX-317)

Someday soon, very likely their next album, the young and highly talented Cane Mill Road will put it all together and establish themselves as a top bluegrass band. Gap to Gap, despite a number of high points, only suggests what they could accomplish with their contemporary mix of original compositions with traditional stylings and familiar, but not overplayed,



songs. On their own songs, they show a mastery of bluegrass song structure and sparkling playing, but need to mature lyrically. Liam Purcell shows potential to become a top notch lead singer but has a tendency to over sing. \$13.99

Tim Stafford & Bobby Starnes: What We Leave Behind: A Songwriters' Collection (S&S Records, S&SR-001) This album features 14 new original songs from Tim Stafford and Bobby Starnes, neatly divided into Bluegrass, Country, and Americana. If that variety suits you then you'll love What We Leave Behind, which got stuck in my CD player most of the way to

Chattanooga. A slew of outstanding singers and musicians, including Ron Stewart, Jason Burleson, Beth Snapp, and Tim Shelton, bring out the best in a selection of strong compositions. "Keep It Merle" with Trey Hensley is worth the price of the CD alone. \$13.99



Greg Canote, Jere Canote & Julia Weatherford: Down in North Carolina (Billy Blue Records, BBR-0908)

Greg and Jere Canote met cellist Julia Weatherford at the Swannanoa Gathering near Black Mountain, NC, whose 1930s downtown graces the cover. The title refers to the influence the Gathering has had on their music rather than the sources of the tunes. Greg on fiddle and guitarist Jere take a relaxed approach paired with the cello giving even the most familiar

of the 17 tunes a different feel. For every "Grey Eagle" and "Indian Ate a Woodchuck," the trio plays three like "The Old Hometown Band" and "Sim's One Step." A delight from start to finish. \$13.99



The Vollmers: Waves on the Sea (Two Birds) Brian Vollmer and Claire Byrne form the Vollmers, an old-time duo from upstate New York. The 13 tracks, all from the traditional canon, on the album mix



largely high energy instrumentals with songs, a couple adapted from bluegrass. The fiddling, primarily from Claire, is outstanding, making the instrumentals quite appealing. The vocals don't quite match the excellence of the playing. \$15.00

Danny Paisley & the Southern Grass: That's Why I'm Lonesome (Patuxent Music, PATUX-311)

In Danny Paisley I trust; all others pay cash. Of the middle-aged traditional singers and band leaders, Danny Paisley has emerged as the best. That's Why I'm Lonesome is a delight, full of drive and soul. Dudley Connell joins on the stellar "Rainbow of

my Dreams", which follows the irresistible hard bluegrass of the opening title track. The album beautifully demonstrates how much variety a talented artist can pack into a traditional CD. \$15.00



Tom Mindte, Mason Via, Ben Somerville: (Patuxent Music, PATUX-330) Veteran player and record man Tom Mindte joins younger monster players Mason Via and Ben Somerville for one of the most daring acoustic recordings this year. The playing is outstanding across a broad range of material. The

> trio tackles on one end the Mainer Brothers, Brownie McGhee, and the Louvin Brothers to the Velvet Underground, Bob Dylan, and the only Tex Rubinowitz song anyone remembers. A dazzling recording that will delight those with expansive tastes. \$15.00

Troy Engle: It's Christmas Time Again (Rocky Glen Music, RGM-209)



Best known as a mandolinist, the prodigiously talented Engle sings and plays a dozen different stringed instruments on this holiday release. He even pens two new songs of the season. \$13.99

Kathy Kallick Band: Horrible World (Live Oak Records, **LO-620)** A pioneer among female bluegrass band leaders, Kathy Kallick has established herself as one of the best singers and songwriters in the West Coast bluegrass scene. Her half-dozen compositions on Horrible World stand out with some of her most risky

and incisive songwriting reflecting KATHY KALLICK BAND the world today in a number of ways. Kallick long ago defined her style and has, as usual, a supporting cast that helps her to bring out the best. \$13.99



Joe Mullins & the Radio Ramblers: For the Record (Billy Blue Records, BBR-0908)

Joe Mullins & the Radio Ramblers are as dependable a band as you'll find on stage or on recordings. Their eighth album continues their legacy of very good releases with a strong traditional influence and plenty



of energy. Highlights include Del McCoury joining on "The Guitar Song" and the long overdue resurrection of the irresistible "O-hio", which Tom Ewing wrote and released years ago on a cassette tape. Good stuff. \$15.00

Big Chimney Barn Dance: Whoa Mule (self-released)

For its distinguishing feature, Big Chimney Barn Dance employs triple and twin fiddles in a way that is reminiscent of mid-1950s Blue Grass Boys, but Whoa

Mule is clearly an old-time album. Drawing their material from 1920s recordings, Big Chimney Barn Dance has a strong good time feel resembling pre-"Wagon Wheel" Old Crow Medicine Show. \$13.99



By Grace: Let Me Tell You About Jesus (self-released)



Two generations come together to form the NC quintet By Grace, which approaches sacred material with a solid contemporary bluegrass sound. The title cut is one of two penned by Doyle Lawson and Steve Gulley. No surprises here. \$13.99

Aubrey Eisenman & the Clydes: Bowerbird (Travianna,

TR-190426) Although backed by an acoustic quartet of bass, guitar, fiddle, and producer Aaron Ramsey on mandolin, Bowerbird is hardly a bluegrass recording but rather classifies

more in the vein of contemporary folk. On eleven of her own songs and a Paul Simon cover, Eisenman enjoys accompaniment that is very well suited to her solid songwriting and engaging voice. \$15.00



Mile Twelve: City on a Hill (Delores The Taurus Records, **DTT-0045)** During the past couple of years, Boston's Mile Twelve has become one of the most noted of the younger bands that filter classic influences into their modern bluegrass. City on a Hill demonstrates the maturation of the quintet not just in their playing and



singing, but especially in the lyrics of eight original compositions. Some of their songs address current issues with respect and subtlety seen too rarely these days. An excellent recording by an ascendant band.excellence of the playing. \$13.99

Amanda Cook: Point of no Return (Mountain Fever, MFR-**190401)** Vocalist Amanda Cook continues to burnish her growing reputation with her second project for Mountain Fever. Cook shines on both bluegrass and

ballad selections from a number of today's best writers, including her own co-writes with Thomm Jutz. Cook combines contemporary and traditional bluegrass influences with a bit of country to create her own sound. \$15.00



Unspoken Tradition: Myths We Tell Our Young (Mountain Home, MH-17232) When Unspoken Tradition blasts off Myths We Tell Our Young with the power of "Nothing but Sky", listeners immediately hear why the album and band have become so popular. Some reflection reveals that the band does a lot more than announce their presence with authority. Although clearly a contemporary band, Unspoken Tradition lets the spirit of traditional bluegrass inform their



sound. Their potent combination of new songs range outside the bounds of conventional bluegrass songwriting in themes and word choice. Myths We Tell Our Young demonstrates how to make original music that is still bluegrass. \$15.00

Town Mountain: New Freedom Blues (self-released)

One of the most liked contemporary bluegrass ensembles, Asheville's Town Mountain stretches in musical vision on New Freedom Blues. Along with pedal steel, drums appear for the first time on their sixth album. Those instruments inject a good deal of Americana into Town Mountain's sound including



some honky-tonk that works quite well. As always, however, the strength of Town Mountain comes from their original songs; band members, especially Phil Barker and Jesse Langlais, wrote or cowrote all eleven pieces. \$13.99

Jere Canote: 5-String Circus (Clonetone, CT-1956)

Jere's cello banjo gives a whole different tone to this set of eight tunes and songs with brother Greg, of course, on fiddle. Although not intended for old-time

music, the cello 5-string acquits itself quite well in Jere Canote's hands. The real delight comes from the variety of tunes drawn from old **CIRCUS** masters like Melvin Wine, field and commercial recordings, and old tune books. \$15.00



The Canote Brothers: Dogs in the Dishes: Tasty Old Tunes (Clonetone, CT-1954) With Maxine Gerber and Brendan Doyle on banjo, Greg (fiddle) and Jere (guitar) Canote deliver a generous - 18 songs



- collection of tunes played with equal parts spirit and love. Once again, the brothers demonstrate an expansive knowledge of tunes from seemingly every possible source, even a rare original tune by Greg. Recommended. \$15.00

Scott Freeman: Mr. Satisfied (self-released)

Throughout the Blue Ridge, Scott Freeman is considered an exceptional mandolin player who is comfortable with both bluegrass and old-time. Mr. Satisfied, named for one of his five compositions on the ten-cut album, showcases Scott's considerable swing skills - both Django- and Bob Wills-style swing, and his influence from Jethro Burns and Tiny Moore. Backed by an exceptional lot including his daughter Dori, flat picking sensation Presley Barker, and the

woefully under-appreciated David Iohnson, Scott delivers beautiful Mr. Section music that both intense and casual listeners alike can appreciate. Brilliant stuff, but not a lick of bluegrass or old-time. \$13.99



Natalie Padilla: Fireweed (self-released)

Colorado-based fiddler Natalie Padilla arrives with her outstanding solo album Fireweed. The album is produced and recorded by Ben Winship who also plays on almost every track, joining a crew that includes clawhammer banjo great Chris Coole.



Padilla is a powerful bluegrass fiddler whose songwriting and singing range across genres on this collection of 15 original songs and tunes. A brilliant album by an artist primarily known west of the Rockies. \$13.99

Various Artists: Gonna Sing, Gonna Shout: From the Pen of Rick Lang (Billy Blue Records, BBR-0824)

Over the past three decades, Rick Lang has compiled an exceptional portfolio as a songwriter. I should have noticed that, but it took Gonna Sing, Gonna Shout to make me realize the strength of his writing and catalog. Thanks to Jerry Salley, the album showcases Lang's writing through versions with such stellar interpreters as Claire Lynch, the Whites,

Bradley Walker, Dave Adkins, and Larry Cordle. Rick Lang's particular strength is in writing gospel story songs that are songs rather than the gospel anthems we usually hear. Enjoyable from start to finish. \$15.00



Gina Clowes: True Colors (Mountain Home, MH-17002) Innovative banjo player Gina Clowes has entered her fourth year as a member of Chris Jones and the Night Drivers. True Colors allows her to display a broad range of her talents as a songwriter, singer, arranger, and player on a lovely variety of styles. Backed by Marshall Wilborn, Chris Luquette, and Malia Furtado (Victor and Thomas Furtado make



cameo appearances), Clowes true colors are on display throughout her eleven original compositions and the first Anthony Newley cover I have ever heard by a bluegrass musician. \$15.00

Colebrook Road: On Time (Mountain Fever, MFR-190503)

Enjoyable modern bluegrass from a band with the courage to tackle Paul Simon's hit "Boy in the Bubble." The strength of the album is not that stretch but nine often excellent original songs. \$15.00
