## **MESSAGE FROM MARY**



### **Dear Members, Supporters and Friends,**

Greetings to everyone in the Free the Bears family, which continues to grow and grow. When we first registered Free the Bears almost 25 years ago, it was just a few of us in Perth, working day and night to try and make a difference. Over the years we were able to get the message out and raise awareness of the plight of the bears. I remember how surprised and happy I was when I'd receive messages of support, first from Australia, then Europe, USA, and further afield. These days we receive messages from the most far-flung corners of the world. It's so heartening to see more and more people taking an interest in the bears. I've always believed that individually we have the power to make a difference, but together we can achieve so much more - look at what Free the Bears has managed to achieve!

In mid-October we had a meeting of the Board of Directors followed by a small gathering of volunteers and Free the Bears family members at Perth Zoo. It was a lovely evening filled with laughter and hope. We visited Jamran, the male sun bear we helped rescue in 2001, a real treat to see him again. Our CEO Matt Hunt gave a very comprehensive update of the many recent bear rescues, the new bear houses we've built, our busy Education and Research Programmes and the many other projects underway. I'm so very proud of our local teams based at the sanctuaries, they're doing such a great job and I can tell are giving their all for the bears.

At our Cambodia sanctuary, the world's largest sun bear sanctuary, our Awareness, Communication and Education (ACE) team are informing record numbers of young people about the issues facing bears and other wildlife. Our Bear Care Tour and Volunteer Programmes continue to raise funds and receive glowing reviews. The Research Programme published the first ever Conservation Strategy for Sun Bears and have more research papers in the pipeline. Our Bear Care Team and vets are doing a great job – just last month they helped a tiny sun bear cub with a horrific snare wound and assisted a rare and delicate eye surgery. Congratulations to Nev, Pesei, Vuthy, Jen, Brian, Kirsty and their teams.

Matt is currently living in Laos where they've already had a record year of 17 bear rescues. To cope with all the rescues we've built bear houses and other facilities at our new Luang Prabang Wildlife Sanctuary (although it looks like we'll soon need more bear houses). It fills me with hope that our Laos government partners are strengthening their capacity to tackle the illegal wildlife trade. Congratulations to Matt, Tak, Lar and their teams. Dung, our Vietnam Programme Manager, has recently opened our third Bear House at the Cat Tien Bear Sanctuary in Vietnam. Sacha, who is doing a marvelous job coordinating our State Supporter Groups, has just returned from a visit. She's been showing me some lovely photos – the sun bears enjoying beautiful new forest enclosures and the older moon bears, many of which have suffered terrible lives in tiny cages on bile farms and aren't very mobile these days, lazing in the hammocks in their dens.

Our State Support Groups have had a busy and successful year with trivia nights, stalls at events and shopping centres, movie fundraisers, teddy bears picnics, even art classes and a Bollywood Dance! I'm grateful to the State Support Group coordinators and volunteers for your hard work and dedication. What an eventful and exciting six months - we've achieved a lot, but we still have a lot to do. Next year will be our 25th year - I'm excited to see what 2020 brings. Thanks to everyone in the Free the Bears family. May your homes be filled with joy and love this holiday season.

# UPDATES FROM THE FIELD

## **CAMBODIA**

Over the past six months in Cambodia we've been strengthening and expanding our Volunteer, Research and ACE Programmes while renovating and improving care facilities for our family of 119 rescued bears. Our vet programme has been active with visiting specialists.

We've just received our 207th Cambodian Rescue, a sun bear cub from Ratanakiri province in northeast Cambodia. Weighing in at only 5kg, the cub had lost a paw, the result of a horrific snare wound. X-rays revealed the remaining bones of her paw had become infected, requiring a partial amputation. Malnourished, terrifed and suffering excrutiating pain when rescued, she's now on the road to recovery. She'll require lifelong care at the Cambodia Bear Sanctuary.

In late October we had a visit from Dr Claudia Hartley, one of the world's leading wildlife ophthalmologists, who very kindly



On the education front, our second scholarship student, Vichet Roth, has graduated with a Masters of Biodiversity Conservation and now joined Free the Bears as a Research Programme Assistant. Welcome Vichet. Our education team is busy hosting over 1,000 Cambodian high school students at the Cambodia Bear Sanctuary, teaching about wildlife welfare and conservation (and testing their knowledge at the end of the day). These are our largest school groups ever, funded by visits from international schools, including a large group of delightful and industrious students from the National Public School of Singapore just last month. We're glad to have this opportunity to help create a new generation of wildlife warriors.



donated her time to check the eyes of two bears with cataracts, Sutty and Jon. We were hoping cataract removal could restore vision for Sutty, a young male moon bear. Sadly, Dr Claudia's sophisticated equipment revealed both bears were already totally blind and the cataract surgery was cancelled. Sutty and Jon are coping well, using their incredible sense of smell to negotiate their enclosures and locate food and treats.

The Volunteer Programme and Bear Care Tours are going from strength to strength. The tropical Cambodian climate is brutal on the sanctuary (especially when you add sun bears and moon bears into the mix). Visiting vounteers have been hard at work painting bear houses and repairing climbing structures, hammocks and enclosures, as well as preparing enrichment to stimulate the complex minds of the bears and test their foraging skills. Does that sound like an experience you would enjoy? Visit our website for details of volunteering opportunities we have available. A huge thanks to our team and all of the wonderful supporters who have already visited and helped out - we hope to see you again.

Our Cambodia Programme Manager and a former winner of the international Future for Nature Award, Vuthy Chuon, was just hosted in Europe by the Future For Nature Awards. He also visited zoos in Germany and Netherlands where he shared his knowledge of bears and picked up valuable skills.

Our Research Programme (Brian, Thona and Vichet) are busily writing applications for research grants (and winning them) as well as working on multiple research projects. They recently published the Sun Bear Global Status Review and Conservation Action Plan. This is the first ever conservation plan for a terrestrial bear species, a huge step forward to ensure the survival of the world's smallest and least-known bear species. Implementation of the plan was discussed at the 2nd Sun Bear Symposium held in September in Borneo, attended by Matt and Brian. Brian and Thona recently visited our key research and conservation partner San Diego Zoo Global for a series of valuable meetings. It's very exciting to watch the Cambodian team grow and develop. Great work team!

# **LAOS**

2019 is proving to be our most challenging and exciting year yet (or do we say that every year?). What isn't in doubt is that 2019 is already a record year for bear rescues. Since our last newsletter in May we've rescued an additional 13 bears in Laos, bringing us to 17 bear rescues for the year and far surpassing last year's record (13). This included an amazing August rescue where we set out for two young cubs but came home with five after chasing tip-offs given to our government partners. It was our largest ever rescue and we were lucky to have had police protection during the confiscations. All five are moon bear cubs - two sets of mixed gender siblings (featured on the front cover) and an older male. We were just able to squeeze them into the back of the rescue truck. September saw another four rescues, including another two moon bears cubs, followed by two more adult moon bears in October. We also rescued a second female sun bear in June, providing little Mary Christmas with a new friend.

In August we completed a new bear house and enclosure at the Luang Prabang Wildlife Sanctuary. This allowed us to move a group of girls up from the crowded Tat Kuang Si Bear Rescue Centre, bringing us to a more reasonable 29 bears at Tat Kuang Si (designed for 25). Then BOOM, suddenly we have 11 more bears! Two bears have since been moved to the new sanctuary and we're managing with the small cubs in the nursery for the moment. Thanks to a generous donor (thanks Claire), we've been able to fast-track construction of a larger cub nursery at the new sanctuary, which will enable us to move the larger cubs quite soon with the other cubs to follow.

It's not only bears which are keeping us busy. We recently rescued our first ever pangolin, the world's most trafficked mammal. Our little guy is a Chinese pangolin which is critically endangered. Thankfully we'd just completed work on our specialist Pangolarium facility for rescued pangolins. Dr Kath was able to give him the all clear and he is recovering well, sleeping in the day and munching on special night feeds of ants nests and termites. We hope to release the pangolin and other rehabilitated wildlife to the forest next month.



Now that the Wildlife Hospital is up and running (thanks Perth visitors for bringing the X-ray machine), Dr Kath has been hard at work conducting health checks (special thanks to Australian Volunteers Programme as well as Jennie, Jules, Julie and Fiona). Our heartfelt thanks to the specialist ophthalmology team of Dr Claudia Hartley, Kelly and Sarah, who visited in October for eye surgeries. We're also excited to welcome a new Laos vet to the team. Welcome Meng!

Our construction team at the new sanctuary is working hard to complete the Quarantine House and Cub Nursery. Following a concerningly short rainy season, new water storage dams have been dug to increase our water storage capacity, also allowing the creation of two 'islands' which can serve as homes for future rescues. We're improving security with extended boundary fencing and CCTV systems. Future projects include new Bear Houses and volunteer facilities (pending funding).

Our Education Team have been busy with a wonderful programme for local villagers called "Discover, Love and Protect Laos Wildlife" comprising five workshops over five months. They've just completed the third workshop. The villagers are soaking up the knowledge which we hope will translate into positive behavioural change. The team have also been busy at the Bear Rescue Centre with a steady stream of visitors keen to learn more of the plight of the bears. The Laos Volunteer Programme will be launched in the near future - get in touch or keep an eye on the website for details if interested.

The last six months have been both exhausting and rewarding. Thankfully we've had many wonderful donors and supporters visit us in Laos, which always helps to lift our spirits. Thank you - we hope to see many more of you in the years to come.


# **VIETNAM**


Rain, rain, rain! After a late start to the rainy season, the skies opened up, providing several weeks of solid rain and causing all the roads in the sanctuary to flood. Thankfully the bears weren't affected (in fact they quite enjoyed it) although for a while we had to carry the bear food in on boats and all construction was paused. A break in the rain allowed us to finally complete our third bear house at the Cat Tien Bear Sanctuary and in October we moved the rescued moon bears to their new homes, featuring giant forested enclosures with swimming pools. The bears are loving the new environment and regularly disappear into the forest where they can nest for the night if they so desire.

Construction has commenced on a Food and Enrichment Kitchen and Bear Carer facility, all designed to improve hygiene and decrease the risk of disease transmission from domestic livestock and pets. Our next project we are seeking funding for will be a new Bear House (#4) and enclosures.



We recently had a visit from the 2019 Vietnam Expeditions trip, the biggest group so far! A team of 11 devoted supporters joined to volunteer for the bears. The level of action and imagination from this team was incredible! They completed 4 platforms for the bears, 10 grass baskets, 9 bear hammocks, 10 puzzle cubes, general repairs, enrichment sessions, scatter feeds, bamboo clearing, cleaning, scrubbing, fence installation and on their final day installed hammocks into our new Bear house 3, ready for its residents to move right in! Our local team were overwhelmed by the productivity and commitment this year's expedition crew put into action and we cannot express our gratitude enough.THANK YOU!





Vietnam has reached a turning point with respect to the bear bile industry. A real chance exists to end this illegal trade, with a lack of suitable sanctuary space being one of the few hurdles remaining. Once we have this additional Bear House we'll be able to rescue a large number of bears from the bear bile trade.

Our Education Team continues to grow and develop. They recently hosted a group of budding young Vietnamese conservationists, winners of the WildAct Challenge, whose prize included a visit to our sanctuary. The winners described the visit as the "highlight of their lives". Our Vietnam Programme Manager Dung also gave a lecture to tourism students at Hoa Sen University, who were so impressed with our work that they banded together and raised a generous donation for the sanctuary. It's great to see this increasing interest and commitment from Vietnamese youth and institutions to support wildlife conservation (as an aside, there have been multiple arrests and incarcerations of illegal wildlife traders in Vietnam this year, a very positive sign).

Vietnam Expeditions is now open for applications in 2020 for two trips: May 2-13 and September 26-October 7. There are 8 spots available for each trip. For an information pack or application, please contact volunteer@freethebears.org

We've just had X-ray and imaging equipment arrive at our new Wildlife Hospital (thanks to donors Beth & Mike), an invaluable addition to help with the diagnostics and treatment of bears and other wildlife (particularly important for geriatric and ex-bile farm bears). Our family in Vietnam has also grown with the recent hire of Technical Advisor Jose and Logistics Officer Nu. Both have settled into their new roles and are proving to be an incredibly valuable contribution to our small team. Welcome to the family Jose and Nu. In the near future we're hoping to source a reliable electricity supply to the sanctuary and we're soldiering on with road improvements and other facilities, made possible by a grant from our key donor Welttiershutz-gesellschaft e.V. 2020 will be an exciting year of progress - we can't wait, bring it on. Merry Christmas!

### SPECIAL XMAS TREAT...BALL

Bears are incredibly intelligent animals. In our efforts to give our rescued bears a life as close to natural as possible, and to keep their complex minds challenged, we provide them with enrichment activities on a daily basis. Specially made for bears, treat balls are stuffed with vegetables and other treats. On treat ball day, they'll often lie on their back and roll the ball around, using their long tongues and claws to extract the treats, peering into the ball with one eye to see if there is anything left inside. Treat balls are definitely one of the favorite enrichment activities of the bears - but sadly we don't have enough treat balls. 
