As one of the oldest and most historic cities in the nation, Philadelphia is uniquely known for its contributions in food, art, music, and professional sports teams — home of the Philadelphia Eagles (NFL), Phillies (MLB), 76ers (NBA), Flyers (NHL). Founded in 1794, the *Mother Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church* is the oldest AME congregation in the nation and is continuously owned by African Americans. *The Philadelphia Museum of Art* and *Free Library of Philadelphia* were designed by Julian Francis Abele, a prominent African American architect and chief designer. The city developed an early jazz scene with luminaries such as *John Coltrane* and *Charlie Biddle. The Sound of Philadelphia* was pioneered by producers Kenny Gamble and Leon Huff in the 1960's. *The Philadelphia Tribune* is the oldest continuously published African American newspaper in the country. W.E. B. Dubois launched his career with his book, *The Philadelphia Negro*, published while he was a scholar in the sociology department at University of Pennsylvania.

Our conference theme, "Sister Power 2017: "Lift As We Climb" A Right, A Responsibility, A **Privilege...**" will highlight our remarkable speakers and presenters who have committed their lives to lifting their voices on behalf of sisters in every sphere of influence. Together they will discuss topics such as the historical impact of African American women in academia, career development, health and wellness, leadership, social identity, and the increase of diversity in academia. Together, we will create new sisterly partnerships and develop best practices in higher education.

At such a pivotal moment in our history, your involvement over the next several days could not be more vital. Thank you so much for being here! In 1976, Dr. Jacqueline A. Kane became Director of the Resource Center on Women in Higher Education with the New York State Education Department. In this capacity she became concerned about what could be done to assist affirmative action officers. She was directed to assist in the recruitment and promotion of Black women. In April 1977, Jackie convened a committee of Black wonnen from across NY State to plan a conference for June 5-7, 1977. This committee included women involved in Opportunity Programs, foundations, community based organizations, as well as faculty, staff and administrators. It was decided the conference theme should be the "elimination of Institutional Policies and Practices that Adversely Affect Black Women': That conference was attended by approximately 7 5 participants who recommended that the Center organize a second conference to be held January 23-25, 1978, in Albany with the theme "Black Women in Higher Education." The participants of this second conference decided that it was time to start an organization.

For the next year and a half, with continuing support from the Resource Center, a group of women met to form what was to become the Association of Black Women in Higher Education and to sponsor a conference to launch the organization. Dr. Patricia Carey introduced the group to the Institute of Afro-American Affairs at New York University which became host for eight of the nine conferences at the University. The first conference was attended by approximately 200 participants. There was enthusiastic support for ABWHE, and a modest membership campaign began. Most of the initial energy was focused on the annual conference and providing an organizational framework. At the end of the first full year 21 women had joined ABWHE.

Today, ABWHE has five chapters nationwide. Since its inception, ABWHE has served as a forum for developing strategies to improve the quality of education of Black people, with particular emphasis on encouraging Black youth to take full advantage of available educational opportunities. ABWHE is committed to aiding Black women in the academy in fulfilling their own aspirations as well as encouraging black youth to pursue their education.

CONCURRENT SESSIONS I

Workshop A: (Leadership In the Academy)

"Coming Back from Second Place - the Best Rejection Ever"

This presentation will share how a personal invitation to apply for a dream role in higher education and acing the interview process led to a rejection conversation that rebooted my career trajectory. This presentation will outline strategies to build equity within your current position or change lanes to an advanced role.

"The Illusion of Inclusion"

This presentation will address the need to increase diversity of faculty in higher education and the academia. Using Social Dominance Theory, the presentation will include an in-depth historical contextual analysis to support the current issues of diversity in higher education and to explain the current trend of the lack of full-time faculty of color. The essential questions addressed will be: (1) How does diversity of faculty impact students in higher education? (2) How is diversity defined in the context of higher education? (3) How does a historical context fit into the argument of how and why people of color are not hired on full-time tenure tracks in higher education?

Workshop C: (Personal and Career Development)

"It Gets Lonely At the Top: Life Histories of African American Women Senior Student Affairs Officers"

In a post Obama era is diversity and inclusion just a catch phrase? This session highlights strategies for career advancement through sharing the researched lived experiences of seven African American women who are senior student affairs officers that have made a broken system or a system not designed for them work in their favor. This session will also encourage, challenge, and provide others a historical guide, to lead and inspire them along the way – so although it looks like you are alone, know that you are standing on the shoulders of many. **Presenter: Dr. Tamekia Scott**

Workshop D (Panel): (Student Services and Support) "LIFE INTERRUPTOUS: All Great Achievements Require Time"

Last year it was reported that Black women were the most educated demographic in the nation. The fact is more Black women are languishing in the education pipeline and many never complete their studies due to a myriad of life's challenges. This panel is composed of accomplished women who will share their personal stories of what took some upwards of 18 years to complete their doctoral studies, and offer strategies to help other women to persist and reach their goal of being hooded!

Workshop A (Panel): (Leadership In the Academy)

"Black Women Coloring the Academy through Voice, Activism and Scholarship"

In this panel, five female leaders of color, share best practices they are employing to color the academic landscape through their voice, activism and scholarship. Drawing from the fields of leadership studies, political science, education and urban missiology, they will discuss how they are working as change agents and tempered radicals in the context of higher education. The panel concludes with practical strategies that others can employ to continue to push the needle towards creating more diverse and equitable academic spaces.

Workshop C: (Personal and Career Development)

"Black Women and Depression: Lifting the Stigma, Getting Help and Climbing out of Shame!" In this session, I will share my experience as a Black Woman in Higher Education with mental illness (depression) and what depression REALLY looks like in the Black Community. We will discuss your RIGHTS as a Black Woman with depression in Higher Education, your health/selfcare RESPONSIBILITY vs. the intuitions RESPONSIBILITY and the PRIVILEGE/Freedom to live without the stigma of depression.

Workshop D: (Student Services and Support)

"Each one, Teach one: Addressing and Preventing Sexual Misconduct in Marginalized Communities"

The impact of sexual misconduct on campus is proportionately higher in marginalized communities. As a result, intentional educational outreach to students that identify with these groups is imperative. Therefore, preventative educational programs should be integrated into our work as student affairs professionals. This presentation will highlight the various types of sexual violence that fall under the categorical umbrella of sexual misconduct. Attendees will discuss: the socialization of acceptance, the definition of affirmative consent, and how to integrate sexual violence prevention education into their work.

Concurrent Workshops III

Workshop A (Panel): (Leadership in the Academy)

"Building an Informal Network of Support for Sisters in Academia"

The panelists will display how they've used both formal and informal support systems as Black women in academia. They will address the volatile environment which Black women in the academy have to navigate while giving attendees best practices. The panelists are all at different stages of the tenure process ranging from tenure track to tenured. **Presenters: Panelists – Dr. Keisha V. Thompson, Dr. Kevicha Echols, Dr. Tisha Ulmer, and Dr. Lisa Paler.**

Workshop B: (Social Identity) "Black is Beautiful: A Method of Nurturing Psycho-Social Healing in African American Females"

Black women live in a world dominated by exposure to print and electronic media they meticulously articulate a narrow standard for physical attractiveness with *White* as the standard for beauty. These customary images are pejorative to non-Anglo qualities that are common to Black women including body features, skin tone, and hair textures (Frisby, 2004;

Kelch-Oliver & Ancis, 2011; Mucherah & Frazer, 2013). Utilizing a six-prong modification through "Lifestyle and Behavioral Change Approach," this training will assist workshop participants through use of the womanist approach that teaches African American/Black female university students how to benefit by taking action to nurture and love one's self (American Psychological Association, 2003; Kelch-Oliver & Ancis, 2011; Walker & Gordon, 2014). **Presenter: Dr. Paulette Theresa-Schechtel**

Workshop C: (Personal and Career Development)

"Strong Black Woman: Why Are You Too Stressed to Be Blessed?"

African American women suffer higher rates of hypertension than any other ethnic group of women. We have higher mortality rates, suffer more loss and are still expected to perform as good as or better than our white counterparts to achieve a level parity in higher education. In addition to climbing the hierarchical ladder of the ivory towers, we support our parents, spouses, children and the community. The internalized message of strength is characteristic of the Strong Black Woman schema (Watson & Hunter, 2015). The self-contradictory term promotes self–efficacy but also has detrimental effects on our overall health. In this interactive workshop, be prepared to share your personal career trajectory story; its impact on your emotional and physical health; and to discuss and experience practical ways of self-care. **Presenter: Dr. Angela S. McNeil**

Workshop D: (Personal and Career Development)

"Wellevate Women!"

Concurrent Workshops IV

Workshop A: (Leadership In the Academy)

"Designing A Professional Development Action Plan"

As the landscape of higher education continues to change, it is important for women in the field to evolve and take on more leadership roles. Designing a viable professional development action plan is a core element of forging the leadership pathway for women desiring career advancement in the postsecondary education arena. The goal of this interactive session is to provide foundational tools, resources, and templates for women at all levels of their career, to design and implement a road map for ascension to next step and goal positions.

Workshop B: (Social Identity)

"The Black Body Remembers: The Impact of Socialization History on Black College Students' Experiences of Race-Based Trauma and Community Violence

In response to the lack of sociological scholarship on the interaction between micro- and macro- levels of analyses as they relate to socialization processes, my interdisciplinary Honors thesis explores how Black undergraduate college students (at the University of Pennsylvania, Temple University, Swarthmore College, Bryn Mawr College, and Haverford College) utilize their socialization histories to appraise and cope with both race-based and community-based traumas. This workshop will explore the scope of the literature as well as prod participants to consider the implications of some preliminary results (survey data, interview responses). **Presenter: Lydia Koku, Swarthmore College '18**

Workshop C: (Personal and Career Development)

"Surrendering Shame: Using Storytelling to Reclaim Personal and Professional Narratives" In the age of social media, it has become common to have one's missteps exposed on a public, globally accessible platform. Using themes from their literary novel, *The Search for Susu*, professors Tracey Lewis-Giggetts and Marcella McCoy-Deh will discuss the critical role that telling one's story (through a myriad of genres) can play in combating social/professional shaming and helping students, faculty, and administration define themselves, and potentially unravel from the chains of false or past narratives. Issues related to the particular cultural dynamics of shame that show up in communities of color (popular culture, power, race, class, and gender) will be highlighted.

Workshop D (Panel): (Student Services and Support)

"Innovations for Student Support"

In this presentation panelists will describe three Community College of Philadelphia initiatives: A Food Pantry created to respond to student food insecurity; the Women's Outreach & Advocacy Center programming developed to respond to issues such as student homelessness; and the Diversity Certificate, developed to help improve the cultural competence of faculty and staff in their interactions with students. Panelists will explain the need for each initiative and some outcomes to date. The initiatives described can be adapted and implemented by other institutions interested in improving the success of students.

Sonia Sanchez. Poet. Mother. Professor. National and International lecturer on Black Culture and Literature, Women's Liberation, Peace and Racial Justice. Sponsor of Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. Board Member of MADRE. Sonia Sanchez is the author of over 20 books including Homecoming, We a BaddDDD People, Love Poems, I've Been a Woman, A Sound Investment and Other Stories, Homegirls and Handgrenades, Under a Soprano Sky, Wounded in the House of a Friend (Beacon Press 1995), Does Your House Have Lions? (Beacon Press, 1997), Like the Singing Coming off the Drums (Beacon Press, 1998), Shake Loose My Skin (Beacon Press, 1999) and most recently, Morning Haiku (Beacon Press, 2010). In addition to being a contributing editor to Black Scholar and The Journal of African Studies, she has edited an anthology, We Be

Word Sorcerers: 25 Stories by Black Americans. BMA: The Sonia Sanchez Literary Review is the first African American Journal that discusses the work of Sonia Sanchez and the Black Arts Movement. A recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts award, the Lucretia Mott Award for 1984, the Outstanding Arts Award from the Pennsylvania Coalition of 100 Black Women, the Community Service Award from the National Black Caucus of State Legislators, she is a winner of the 1985 American Book Award for Homegirls and Handgrenades, the Governor's Award for Excellence in the Humanities for 1988, the Peace and Freedom Award from Women International League for Peace and Freedom (W.I.L.P.F.) for 1989, a PEW Fellowship in the Arts for 1992-1993 and the recipient of Langston Hughes Poetry Award for 1999. Does Your House Have Lions? was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award. She is the Poetry Society of America's 2001 Robert Frost Medalist and a Ford Freedom Scholar from the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History. Her poetry also appeared in the movie Love Jones. Sonia Sanchez has lectured at over 500 universities and colleges in the United States and has traveled extensively, reading her poetry in Africa, Cuba, England, the Caribbean, Australia, Europe, Nicaragua, the People's Republic of China, Norway, and Canada. She was the first Presidential Fellow at Temple University and she held the Laura Carnell Chair in English at Temple University. She is the recipient of the Harper Lee Award, 2004, Alabama Distinguished Writer, and the National Visionary Leadership Award for 2006. She is the recipient of the 2005 Leeway Foundation Transformational Award and the 2009 Robert Creeley Award. Currently, Sonia Sanchez is one of 20 African American women featured in "Freedom Sisters," an interactive exhibition created by the Cincinnati Museum Center and Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibition. In December of 2011, Philadelphia Mayor Michael Nutter selected Sonia Sanchez as Philadelphia's first Poet Laureate, calling her "the longtime conscience of the city."

Diversity and Pedagogy (2016). She engages in good conflict, conflict resolution, and understanding and undermining racism and other forms of oppression. A convinced Quaker, Dr. Willie-LeBreton has served on the Boards of Pendle Hill Quaker Study Center and Haverford College.

Yvonne RB-Banks, is a professor in the School of Urban Education at Metropolitan

State University in St. Paul, MN. Prior to transitioning to Metropolitan State University in 2015, Dr. RB-Banks started her career in higher education at the University of Northwestern Saint Paul (UNWSP) in 1998, where she held two positions simultaneously. She was dean and established the Center of Academic Programs for Support Services (CAPSS), and was professor in the department of education. Prior to higher education, she held various roles in PK-12 public education.



Dr. RB-Banks graduated from the University of

Minnesota, earning an Ed.D. in Educational Policy and Administration. Her B.A. and M.A. were earned at Northeastern Illinois University. She has served on various boards and continues to be active in community efforts that focus on educational equity. 



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
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
