Association of Black Women in Higher Education The History

In 1976, Dr. Jacqueline A. Kane became Director of the Resource Center on Women in Higher Education with the New York State Education Department. In this capacity she became concerned about what could be done to assist affirmative action officers. She was directed to assist in the recruitment and promotion of Black women. In April 1977, Jackie convened a committee of Black women from across NY State to plan a conference for June 5-7, 1977. This committee included women involved in Opportunity Programs, foundations, community based organizations, as well as faculty, staff and administrators. It was decided the conference theme should be the "elimination of Institutional Policies and Practices that Adversely Affect Black Women". That conference was attended by approximately 75 participants who recommended that the Center organize a second conference to be held January 23-25, 1978, in Albany with the theme "Black Women in Higher Education." The participants of this second conference decided that it was time to start an organization.

For the next year and a half, with continuing support from the Resource Center, a group of women met to form what was to become the Association of Black Women in Higher Education and to sponsor a conference to launch the organization. Dr. Patricia Carey introduced the group to the Institute of Afro-American Affairs at New York University which became host for eight of the nine conferences at the University. The first conference was attended by approximately 200 participants. There was enthusiastic support for ABWHE, and a modest membership campaign began. Most of the initial energy was focused on the annual conference and providing an organizational framework. At the end of the first full year 21 women had joined ABWHE.

Today, ABWHE has five chapters nationwide. Since its inception, ABWHE has served as a forum for developing strategies to improve the quality of education of Black people, with particular emphasis on encouraging Black youth to take full advantage of available educational opportunities. ABWHE is committed to aiding Black women in the academy in fulfilling their own aspirations as well as encouraging black youth to pursue their education.

Health care careers is among the fastest growing occupations according to the Department of Labor. Underrepresentation of minorities in allied health profession has been a focus of public health agencies. Increasing minority representation would serve many purposes, including working within the underserved communities to provide care and health education and increasing the pool of medically trained minority executives and educators in allied health. This presentation will provide an examination of the low number of minority students in the allied health profession; give insight into minority students' clinical experience; and highlight the steps needed in recruiting the next generation of health care scholars.

Research indicates that creating a relationship through mentoring increases the academic outcomes of success when gender and race are the same. While the literature purports that black

CONFERENCE SPEAKERS

Carol L. Adams, Ph.D.



Carol L. Adams, PhD. is Founder and CEO of Urban Prescriptives, Inc., a consulting firm that specializes in program and organizational development for enterprises engaged in educational, social and cultural practice. This venture merges the diverse experiences that comprise her remarkable career and her commitment to asset-based and data-driven models for social change.

In her recent position, as President and CEO of the DuSable Museum of African American History, Dr. Adams not only raised over \$15 million, but she raised the visibility of the venerated institution through the "Du Something" branding campaign and the implementation of a host of well-received public programs. Historic re-enactments of the March on

Washington and African American participation in the Civil War, the creation of a mobile museum, the presentation of jazz concerts and dance on the grounds of the museum represent a sampling of those initiatives. Further the Museum hosted heads of state from six African countries and sponsored study-travel tours to Mexico, Cuba, and Brazil.

As an applied sociologist, Adams has astutely moved from theory to practice in a number of key positions, including Secretary of the Illinois Department of Human Services, the state's largest agency with a staff of 14,000 and a budget of over \$5 billion dollars; Director of Resident Services and Programs at the Chicago Housing Authority; and Director of Museums and Public Schools (MAPS). An esteemed educator, she has taught at a number of universities and served as Director of the Center for Inner City Studies at Northeastern Illinois University, Dean of Adult and Continuing Education at Kennedy-King College and Director of African American Studies at Loyola University.

Known for her development acumen, Dr. Adams has raised over \$400 million dollars for a variety of agencies and institutions, both public and private.

Dr. Adams pursued her undergraduate studies at Fisk University and her graduate work at Boston University, University of Chicago, and the Union Graduate School. She has also studied at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and at Yale University

She serves on a number of Boards, among them: ETA Creative Arts Foundation, After School Matters, Choose Chicago, the Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events, Shimer College, the Mayor's Commission for a Safer Chicago and the state of Illinois' Amistad Commission. Her memberships include The Chicago Network, the Economic Club of Chicago, the Executives Club, the Chicago Council on Global Affairs and the Conference of Minority Public Administrators.



Dolores E. Cross, Ph.D.



Dr. Dolores E. Cross, author and former president of Morris Brown and Chicago State University, earned her Bachelor in Science in Education from **Seton Hall University** 1963, her Master of Science in Education from **Hofstra University** in 1968 and later received a Ph.D. from the **University of Michigan** in 1971.

Dr. Cross began her career in education as a kindergarten teacher in Newark, New Jersey. She also taught special educational classes for the emotionally disturbed in Brentwood, NY and was head teacher for a demonstration school for severely disturbed students at Hofstra University.

At the completion of her doctorate in higher education at the University of Michigan in 1971, Dr. Cross commenced her 40-plus years career as the first

female African American as faculty and administrator in higher education in prestigious and diverse colleges and universities, as well as governmental agencies and foundations.

In 1988 she held administrative and faculty positions as Associate Provost at the University of Minnesota, MN with tenure in Education. Within two years she was selected President of Chicago State where she was the first female to head a 4-year public university in the State of Illinois, a position she held for close to eight years. She went on to join General Electric, Hartford, CT as President of the GE Fund and later as the Distinguished Professor in Education at City University of New York Graduate School. In October 1998, she accepted the position of President at Morris Brown College, Atlanta GA. In the fall of 2002, she was invited to DePaul University as Visiting Scholar to direct their doctoral program in Education and teach courses in Multi-Cultural Education.

Education has always been a passion. She worked for seven years as a secretary at the Newark Board of Education, while attending college full and part-time and while being a mother to two young children. Dr. Dolores E. Cross has extended her involvement serving as a Board Member of the College Board, American Council on Education, American Association of Higher Education (also Chair), Campus Compact (Vice Chair), American Association of State Colleges and Universities, National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, National Association for Equal Opportunity, National College Higher Education Loans Program and National Center for Public Policy in Higher Education. She also served as presidential appointee on the Committee on America Reads and was a founding member of the National Association of Women Executives in State Government. She has also served on two corporate boards: the Northern Trust and Sallie Mae.

She is the author of two books: *Breaking Through the Wall: A Marathoner's Story*, and *Beyond the Wall: A Memoir*. She has also published in the areas of multi-cultural education, public policy in higher education as well as access for minorities and women; and presented papers both nationally and internationally.

Dr. Dolores E. Cross has run 20 marathons since completing New York City Marathon at age 50. Her best time in the 50-54 age group was 3:36 in the Twin Cities Marathon.

Dr. Cross resides in Hyde Park, Chicago, Illinois.



Yvette C. Cozier, D.Sc., MPH



Dr. Yvette Cozier is an Epidemiologist with the Slone Epidemiology Center and Assistant Professor of Epidemiology at the Boston University School of Public Health. She holds and A.B., from Harvard University, M.P.H. and D.Sc. from Boston University School of Public Health.

Dr. Cozier is an investigator on the Black Women's Health Study (BWHS), a prospective follow-up of over 59,000 African American women begun in 1995. Dr. Cozier's overall research focus is on the influence of psychosocial factors in the development of sarcoidosis,

obesity, cardiovascular disease, and cancer. She has published several analyses of perceived racism in relation to hypertension, breast cancer incidence, weight gain, and mortality in the BWHS. In addition, she has published analyses of neighborhood socioeconomic status, including median household income and segregation, on the risks of hypertension, and diabetes. For the past several years, Dr. Cozier has been studying selected risk factors for sarcoidosis in the BWHS, including reproductive factors and genetic polymorphisms. She has also assessed the role of attitudes about spirituality and religiosity in health promotion and disease prevention efforts among Boston-area residents and clergy.

Phyllis West, Ph.D., MPH, MSW



Dr. Phyllis West is currently a Senior Lecturer in Governors State University's Department of Social Work. She also coordinates the BSW Triton Program, and is the faculty advisor for the Social Work Student Organization (SWSO). She teaches the foundation practice courses, human behavior, diversity and a social work health care class.

Dr. West earned a Bachelor of Arts in History from Paine College in Augusta, Georgia where she was very active in the community. She

served as a Peace Corps Recruiter for one year and lived in New Orleans where she earned a Master of Public Health and a Master of Social Work degree from Tulane University. Dr. West worked at the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) as a Health Education Supervisor and Assistant Health Officer. Dr. West provided leadership for the strategic planning, implementation, assessments and evaluations to address health disparities in South Suburban Cook County for 1.2 million people, while collaboratively servicing the 2.4 million people in Suburban Cook County. Dr. West earned a Ph.D. from The University of Chicago, School of Social Service Administration, and was one of the most highly funded Ph.D. candidates at The University of Chicago due to her research on mothers in the criminal justice system. AWARD RECIPIENTS

Lifetime Achievement Award Carol O. Carson-Warner, Ed.D.



Dr. Carol O. Carson-Warner, a self-proclaimed entrepreneurial educator, served more than 30 years as an administrator of grant programs at Chicago State University (CSU) prior to her retirement in 2012. Her professional career has focused on enhancing the educational opportunity of urban dwellers and was initiated in New Jersey where her first position in the Neighborhood Youth Corp provided her an opportunity to work with inner city youth at a community center.

During her tenure at CSU, Dr. Carson-Warner served as assistant director of the Upward Bound program and director of the Student Support Services program, both federally-funded programs. With a vision to establish a college-access pipeline at CSU for community residents, from 5th graders thru adulthood, she sought and attained funding from the US Department of Education for two Upward Bound Programs, an Educational Opportunity Center, and an Educational Talent Search. This expansion resulted in the creation of a new title for her of Executive Director for Educational Opportunity Programs/TRIO.

In her final three years at CSU, Dr. Carson-Warner directed the Textbooks and Learning Materials Program/Ghana (TLMP): a \$13 million grant funded by the US Agency for International Development (USAID) to develop educational workbooks for Ghana's children in kindergarten and primary grades, and teacher training. Dr. Carson-Warner's continued collaboration with the Ghanaian educational community and USAID enabled CSU to receive additional funding after her retirement in excess of \$5 million.

Extensive and committed service to the University has been and continues to be illustrated by Dr. Carson-Warner. During her tenure, she led and participated on numerous university-wide and departmental committees. As a retiree, she serves on the CSU Alumni Board as an emerita member and mentor for graduate students through the 21 Century Graduate Initiative. A proponent of professional development, Dr. Carson-Warner's leadership and membership in educational opportunity organizations has been extensive from the local through international levels. She became a charter member of the Association of Black Women in Higher Education, Inc. (ABWHE) in 1989 and has served as treasurer and president of both the Chicago Chapter and the National Chapter. One of her proudest achievements with ABWHE, Inc. was the Millennial Metamorphism: Women of the Diaspora Conference she co-organized for educators from the US and Ghana. The conference was held in Accra, Ghana in 2000. She continues to serve as advisor to both the Chicago and National Boards and as development chair for the National Conference 2015.

Dr. Carson-Warner has a doctorate in transformational educational leadership from Roosevelt University and a master of arts and bachelor of arts from CSU. She has been married to Robert Warner Jr. for 38 years. Both recent retirees, Carol and Bob have parlayed their collective passion and expertise into an art distribution and consulting enterprise, the RSAKGroup. Together, they have three adult children and two grandsons.



Lifetime Achievement Award

"Gloria M. Gay, MSW, CSW"



Gloria Gay has over 48 years of experience in working with corporation and human service agencies on issues such as organizational development, human relations and equity. Ms. Gay was the Associate Director of the Penn Women's Center and an adjunct instructor in human sexuality education in the School of Social Policy and Practice (formerly known as The School of Social Work) at the University of Pennsylvania. Ms Gay has also developed and taught courses in adolescent sexuality, counseling, human sexuality, racism, and domestic violence. She was one of the recipients of the 1996 City of Philadelphia Human Relations Commission Award.

At the University of Pennsylvania for 25 years she has served on the Sexual Harassment Committee for several years and has implemented numerous sexual harassment training programs throughout the University for faculty, staff, and students. Ms Gay was also a primary trainer for the educational training team that provided training for the Philadelphia School System for teachers, principals, counselors, and other members of the Philadelphia School System Community. This training has been implemented for ten years and was focused primarily around diversity issues. The program entitled "Equity in the Era of Diversity" has reached hundreds since its inception in 1985 – 1995.

Ms. Gay received her Master's in Social Work from the School of Social Work at the University of Pennsylvania. She is certified as a sex education counselor by AASECT, a Certified Rape Crisis Counselor through Women Organized Against Rape, and a Certified Domestic Violence Counselor through the National Association of Forensic Counselors.

Ms. Gay is an Honorary Lifetime Board Member and has been active in the Organization for many years, as consultant, client, and staff trainer and board member. Ms. Gay has also participated in statewide training for the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence. Her expertise is known throughout the country and has been recognized by the Pennsylvania Attorney General through her appointment to his statewide Family Violence Task Force.

Ms. Gay was a member of former Mayor Street's Task Force on Domestic Violence. In 2004, Ms. Gay received the Shirley Chisolm award for social work practice. This year, 2010, commends Ms. Gays' 25th year at the University of Pennsylvania.



Outstanding Leader in Higher Education Barbara Henley, Ph.D.

Dr. Barbara Henley serves currently as the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and Associate Professor of Educational Policy Studies at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC). She leads a division of 500 staff members and twenty-two departments and is responsible for most aspects of student life including international services, student housing, financial aid, support programs, the student centers, UIC Forum, and UIC Pavilion, to name a few. During her tenure, she has established a scholarship fundraising operation in Student Affairs and initiated or led the program planning for student life construction and renovation projects totaling \$325 million that included: new and renovated residence halls and recreation facilities; new office/retail spaces; renovated student center; and a 3000-seat venue.



Dr. Henley is a native Chicagoan and graduated from UIC with an undergraduate degree in History. She attended The Ohio State University where she earned a master's degree in Counseling and a doctorate in

Counselor Education with an emphasis in Counseling Psychology. Subsequently, she served in leadership roles at Lincoln University (PA), Chicago State University, and Northern Illinois University.

Dr. Henley has in many served professional associations, including: NASPA, the association for Student Affairs professionals; American College Personnel Association; the American Psychological Association; the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities; and the Committee on Institutional Cooperation (CIC) comprised primarily of the Big Ten universities. Dr. Henley has authored or co-authored publications in professional journals and has presented program sessions and keynote addresses at nearly 100 professional conferences and meetings. Moreover, she is the recipient of numerous professional and civic awards and holds a license to practice clinical psychology in Illinois. In her "spare" time, Dr. Henley enjoys travel, music, volunteer activities, attending sporting events, and mentoring.

Outstanding Chapter Member Award, Chicago Chapter Michelle D. Morrow



Michelle is the director of scholarships at Northeastern Illinois University (NEIU) where she administers and awards many of the University's institutional scholarships, which aid in the recruitment and persistence of students. In 2010 she was a finalist for the Indelible Mark Award, which recognized her work as a student club advisor. Michelle is a founding member of the Sista Circle at NEIU, providing networking and support for African American faculty, staff, and students. Michelle's prior professional experience includes serving as the interim director of Adult and Women Student Programs at NEIU, Kendall College registrar, adjunct facilitator teaching Issues in Diversity for the adult degree completion program,

assistant director of records and exams at the Illinois Institute of Technology, and an academic advisor at the University of Illinois at Chicago in the former College of Business Administration's Office of Minority Affairs. Michelle completed a Doctor of Education Degree in Educational Leadership with a concentration in Higher Education from Argosy University, Chicago. Her dissertation, a qualitative study, is titled: "How Does Campus Involvement Impact the Persistence of African American Students



Attending Postsecondary Institutions?" Michelle holds a Master of Arts Degree in Inner City Studies Education from Northeastern Illinois University, a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English from the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), and an Associate of Arts Degree in Business Administration from South Suburban College.

Michelle is an invaluable member of the National Chapter of the Association of Black Women in Higher Education, as Chicago Chapter vice president: 2007-2009 and president: 2009-2013 and currently on the Chicago Chapter's executive committee, secretary for ABWHE's National Board, is the ABWHE Scholarship Chair, and is a member of the 2015 ABWHE National Conference Committee. 
