I love Teddy's *gumption*, and Nick Offerman for introducing him to me through his book of the same name.)

During the warmer months ahead, make a big list of all the things you want to get done. Then, choose the three most important ones and don't worry about the others. Take the time to do the ones you chose like a boss. And build in plenty of time around them, preferably outside while you're getting a bit of gentle exercise, to think about the tasks you're on and how you can do them better. Everyone and everything, including your blood pressure, will benefit from this calmer, dialled-back approach.




EEL CREEK TRADING

While setting our annual goals in 2022, Mr Blackwell told me he would be committing to his children's book. Like many people, the desire to write a book lingered year to year, but knowing Adam as I do, once a task is on his list, it's going to be done, and I was excited to see the result.

I'm even more excited now that it's finished and he can share it with the young readers of the world. His skill with rhyme is on full display and the story shares what might have been the genesis of his entrepreneurial journey - in a creek full of eels and golf balls in Upper Hutt!

Adam's story is skillfully illustrated by this longtime collaborator Paul Rees. If you've been reading the Bugle for a while now, you'll be familiar with Paul's work on our *Blackwell Press* jigsaw puzzles, cards and posters.

Technically, this is Adam's second adventure book. He wrote and illustrated his first book at age six. His production of just one unit was stapled together by his mum who now plays a starring role in Adam's second adventure story.



In preparation for the book launch, I had a couple of hard hitting questions for the author!

MB: Hello Mr Blackwell. Tell me, why this particular story?

AB: This story was a very memorable part of being a boy in Upper Hutt in the 60s and early 70s. The mystery of the creek, the treasures that lay within, and as every boy in the 70s knew, the ever-present threat of quicksand that could swallow me up in the squishy creek bed!

MB: Who is this book for?

AB: The reading level is aged 4-9, but any reader who can recognise rhyme will enjoy this story.

One of my favourite series when I was young was the *Berenstain Bears*, and like the Bears, this is a locally based adventure story where the hero always has the safety of home to return to.

MB: This book deals in part with the sale of second hand merchandise. What advice do you have for other young entrepreneurs?

AB: It doesn't matter how good your product is, your story is the thing that other people will get excited by - so focus on finding the magic in your story and sharing it with others. Regarding secondhand goods: presentation is everything! Do your best to make them look new - even when all parties know that they aren't.





A.J. Jacobs \$37.90 Paperback

A.J Jacobs first came onto my radar in 2010 with the highly entertaining Year of Living Biblically where he attempted to follow every precept in the Bible, even where they contradicted each other. He's back again with a book that explores the enduring power of puzzles - why we love them, what they do to our brains, and how they can improve our world. Crosswords, Sudoku, Rubik Cube, jigsaw puzzles, mazes and a whole lot more are covered in the course of his explorations.



This year we've had two stand-out survival stories set at sea. *The Wager*, pieced together from 18th century records and presented as nonfiction, and *Mrs Jewell and the Wreck of the General Grant*, a fictional story based on real events.

THE WAGER

David Grann \$40.90 Paperback

It's 1742 and a ramshackle vessel has washed up on the coast of Brazil. Inside, thirty barely alive men say that they are survivors of the H.M.S Wager, a British vessel that left England in 1740 on a mission to capture a




Spanish galleon filled with treasure. The Wager ran aground off the coast of Patagonia but the crew built their flimsy craft from the wreckage and sailed a hundred-plus days, through storm-wracked seas to reach Brazil...

Six months later, another vessel lands on the coast of Chile. The three castaways on this craft have a different story to tell. The sailors who landed in Brazil were not heroes - "they were mutineers."

MRS JEWELL AND THE WRECK OF THE GENERAL GRANT

Christina Saunders \$37.90 Paperback

1866: Fourteen men and one woman survive the shipwreck of the General Grant, a passenger ship sailing from Melbourne to




London. This group is made up of gold miners, sailors and the newly-married Joseph and Mary Jewell. Stranded on the remote Auckland Islands, they must work together to survive in a rugged and inhospitable corner of the world. Mrs Jewell is our narrator and in between tales of dysentery, scurvy, and learning to cure seal skin, there's space for just a little Victorian-era romance. Based on a true story of one of New Zealand's earliest shipwrecks and a finalist for the 2023 Ockham's Prize for Fiction.

TRUST

Hernan Diaz \$38.90 Paperback

My favourite book of 2022 was Barbara Kingolver's *Demon Copperhead* - based in Appalachia, it's a modern retelling of *David Copperfield* (I highly recommend it). So when Hernan Diaz's *Trust* and *Demon Copperhead* were announced co-winner the 2023 Pulitzer Prize it definitely caught my attention! A part of me really wanted not to like this book - because how useful is a bookseller who consistently recommends major prize winners?! but this book was excellent, I didn't want it to end.


Trust is the same story, told from four perspectives, at four different points in time. Beginning in 1920's New York, we're privy to the life of one of the city's most powerful couples. As the chapters unfold, we realise that everything is not as it seems. The story questions the reliability of written history, and those who get to tell their story.



THE VILLAGE OF EIGHT GRAVES

Seishi Yokomizo \$23.90 Paperback

Multiple deaths, diabolical twists and a cast of characters to enthral! Set in post war rural Japan, social alliances have changed and nobody is really whom they seem to be. Nestled deep in the mist-shrouded mountains. The Village of Eight Graves takes its name from a bloody legend: in the sixteenth century eight samurai, who had taken refuge there along with a secret treasure. were murdered by the inhabitants, bringing a terrible curse down upon their village.




TOM LAKE

Ann Patchett \$35.90 Paperback

Lara and Joe Nelson live on a cherry orchard in Michigan. It's 2020 and their three 20-something daughters Emily, Maisie and Nell are all home, waiting out a period of lockdown (rest assured, this is not a pandemic novel). It's harvest time and with farm labour in short supply, the girls must help pick the cherries, something they're not entirely enthused about.

It's well known that Lara was once an aspiring actress who had a summer romance with Peter Duke; a man who went on to become a famous Hollywood star. To pass the time in the orchard, the girls pester their mother for details of that summer.

Controlled and intelligent, Ann Patchett shares all that is good in her main characters. The book exudes cozy appeal with the details of the Michigan farm house, Lara's evenings quilt making, and the description of the meal times and love the family shares.



THE PARIS BOOKSELLER

Kerri Maher \$35.90 Paperback

Based on the real story of Sylvia Beach, founder of the *Shakespeare and Company* bookshop. When young American Sylvia Beach opens *Shakespeare and Company* on a quiet street in Paris in 1919, she has no idea that her bookshop will change the course of modern literature. Ernest Hemingway considered the bookshop a second home, and it

was where some of the most important literary friendships of the twentieth century are forged - including the one between James Joyce and Sylvia herself. When Joyce's controversial novel *Ulysses* is banned, Beach takes a massive risk and publishes it herself.



WHAT YOU ARE LOOKING FOR IS IN THE LIBRARY





WHY IT'S OK Not to finish A book

As much as we'd all love to have unlimited hours next to the fireplace with a book, the reality is that most of us don't.

Yet I think it's fairly common that some people feel they have to finish any book they pick up, even if they don't like it. I'm not sure where it comes from; some version of the "clean plate club" that we have to finish what's set out before us?


But our reading lives are limited and we have to make the most of any and all hours we can find for our favourite pastime!

For this reason, it can help to adopt a philosophy that it's ok not to finish every single book you start. If you struggle to walk away from a book without finishing it, I've collected some reasons that might help reconcile the idea of leaving some books unfinished.

EIGHT REASONS TO STOP READING THAT BOOK

1. There's a book for every reader. But not every book is for every reader. If reading is even a somewhat serious part of your life, you're going to strike a few books that just aren't right for you. For me, this often happens with awardwinning books, and for you it might happen with recommendations from friends and loved ones. Just because a book has been crowned "best" by a panel of experts (or just the experts in your own life!) doesn't mean it will be your cup of tea.

- 2. How many more books can you realistically read in what remains of your life? Sorry to get so morbid so quickly, but as Oliver Burkeman outlines in *Four Thousand Weeks*, if you live until you're 80 years old you'll live a total of four thousand weeks. If you're 50 and read an average of one book per month, that's 360 more books. Have you got time to waste on books you're not enjoying?
- 3. You might be a different person now than when you bought the book. If you run an ever growing TBR (to-be-read) stack there's a chance that books stay there for months or even years before you get to them. Consider whether you have changed in that time and what impact that could have had on a book that once filled you with enthusiasm. Call it personal growth and move on to the next book in your stack!
- 4. It's ok not to love everything your favourite author produces. Even if one of their books is your all-time favourite, it's alright not to enjoy the book that's in your hands right now. The same goes for versatile authors — Wendell Berry comes to mind — who produces fiction, nonfiction AND poetry! It's ok not to like them all. So put that book aside and be grateful for the experience you had with other books from that author.





- 5. Stress or distraction might be stopping you from connecting right now. Sometimes life just gets in the way of our best efforts to read (or maintain any other hobby), so consider whether it might be something else in your life stopping you from really enjoying the book you have in your hands. Mr Blackwell has a suggestion for you on the right.
- 6. Here's one for the numbers people: There are approximately four million books published EACH YEAR, and that's just the books published in English. What do you think the chances are you will pick books that are 100% for you every time?
- 7. Consider whether it could be the platform? I love audiobooks and my favourites are heavily weighted toward non-fiction read by the author. I think that in my brain it's more like getting to spend a few hours hanging out with someone I wouldn't normally get to spend time with. But I don't really enjoy fiction as much as an audiobook as I do from reading on paper. So if you're struggling with the audiobook but think it's a book you could really like, consider switching. And vice versa, maybe the concepts in a social science book will resonate better as you hear the spoken words on your next walk.
- 8. If all else fails, consider it part of your bookshop fantasy. I know you've dreamed about throwing in your day job and owning a bookshop instead! Once you do, you'll realise that partially reading a whole lot of books many that aren't right for you from the outset is just part of the job so you can recommend books to readers who don't read like you. So chalk that unfinished book up to your training for the day you'll own your own bookstore!

What to do about your unfinished books?

- 1. One man's trash is another man's treasure give it away, or add it to your local Little Free Library or host a book swap and exchange your unwanted books with friends and family.
- 2. Mr Blackwell does this when he feels a book has promise but just hasn't been able to get into it: He parks it, puts a note in his calendar for six months from the date and moves it to the **"second chance"** pile in his office. His top tip if you try this approach is to move your bookmark back at least one chapter to refresh where you were up to.
- 3. Sell it! Most secondhand bookshops will give you cash or credit for your unwanted titles that you can put toward another read that might suit you better.

The point is, unless the book is damaged or totally out of date, it's very likely that someone, somewhere would love to have it and get good use out of it.
