Loopy Hook Cover Pattern.



This is a very simple pattern that enables you to use the skills learnt at the workshop to create a useful and beautiful hook case so you can transport them and hook away wherever you go!

To start you should chain enough to cover your hook with enough left to create a flap to close the case. Using the catona cotton with a 3mm hook I chained 50. Depending on the yarn you use it could be different. Next you will work back along the chain. Make a double crochet in the second chain from the hook and then make a double crochet into each chain. Chain one and turn your work.

Now make a double crochet in the chain at the base of that stitch - highlighted below by the pin.



Continue to the end and then continue to make 7 rows in total before changing your yarn.

Make one row of treble crochet.

Change colour again and make another 7 rows.







That is the back of the hook case made. Weave in ends (weave them all in on one side) and start on the front making it in exactly the same way. Instead of crocheting 50 I crocheted 40 to make it slightly smaller but still enough to cover the top of your hook.

The two sides will be used lengthways and the back will be folded over to make a flap to close the case. I have done it this way as often when learning to crochet keeping the ends of a piece of crochet can be hard to do. By using them lengthways you have a smaller width and as they will be sewn together it isn't as crucial that the ends of the piece are straight. You will end up with a neat edge on the long side of the case and if the shorter ends are a little less than perfect they will be hidden when you stitch them together.

Once you have both sides made and all ends woven in you can begin to put it all together. The first thing to do is to match them up together with wrong sides facing (the sides the ends were woven in) and pin them loosely so you can position the button on the smaller section. Fold over the top and mark the position. Separate them again whilst you sew on the button.



Once you have it securely sewn on you can once again pin the two together. Start at the top right side and whip stitch them together all the way round.

Sew in the ends securely.







Next you will form a loop to secure the button. Attach the yarn to your hook and got into the space to the right of the stripe of colour in the middle slip stich and then chain 10 hook through the space at the other side of the middle stripe. Slip stitch and then cut the yarn. Weave the ends in on the back side of the flap and you have completed the hook case. This pattern is easy to adapt to make different sized cases/covers
