



3 Things Every Tooth Fairy Should Know

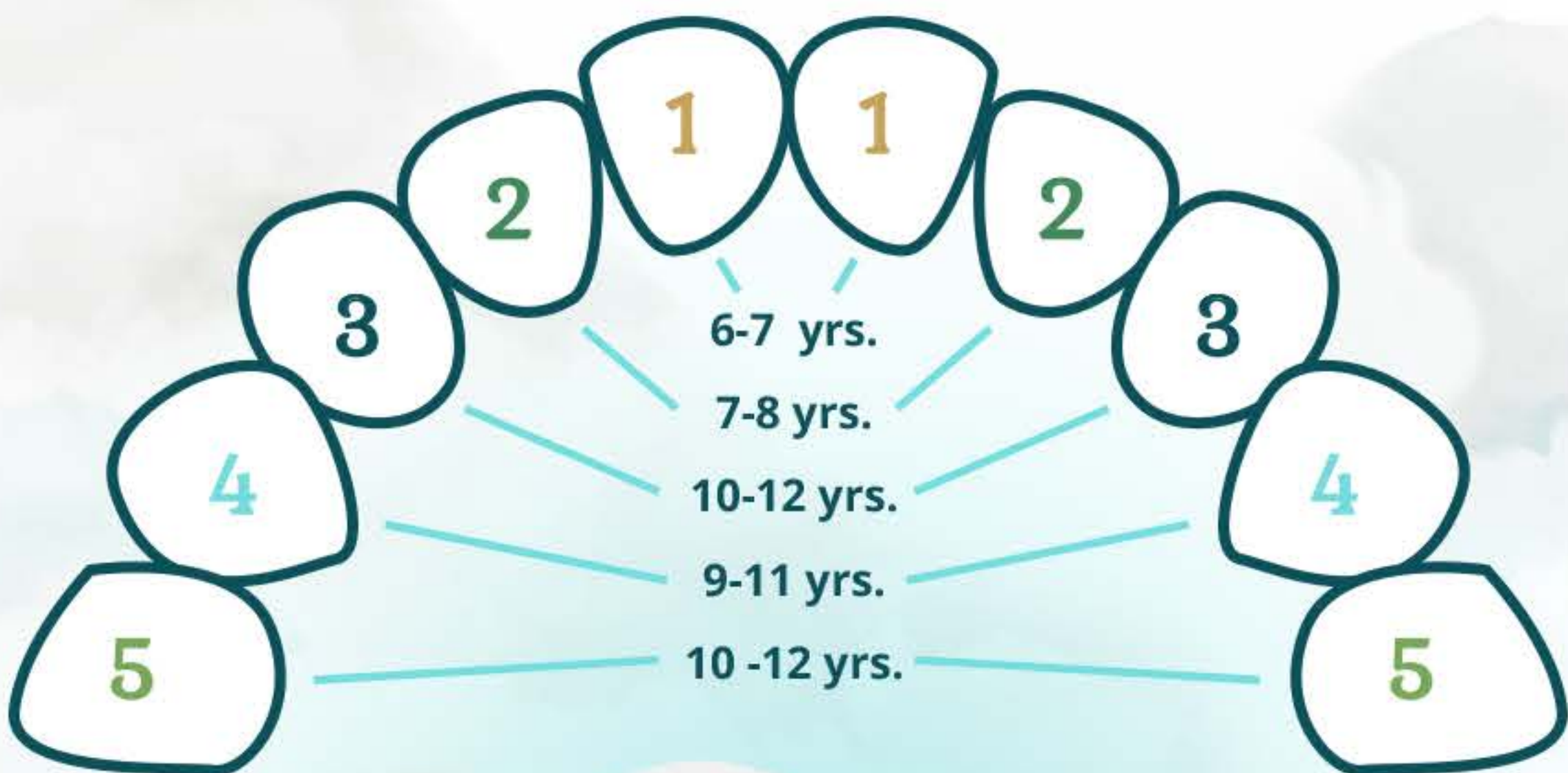
