

### Genesis I-2; 3:20

Long, long ago - before anyone can remember - God made the world. At first it was lonely and dark.

Then God made the light. He said, "Let there be light," and light came. God was pleased with it. He called the light "day." And he called the darkness "night." God did these things on the first day of Creation.

Then God made the space above the earth. He called it "sky." God did this on the second day of Creation.



Genesis 3; Romans 5:12-16

# A NEW HOME FOR ABRAM

Genesis II:27-I2:10




Far away in the land of Ur (which was in the country we call Iraq), there lived a seventy-five-year-old man named Abram. The people of Ur worshiped idols of wood and stone. This was very wrong, for God had said people must worship only him. God told Abram, "Leave this country. I will show you another land where I want you to live."

So Abram left home with his wife, Sarai, his nephew Lot, and his servants. Even though he didn't know how far he would have to go or how long he would have to travel, he believed God would take care of him.

Abram and the others had to cross wide rivers and a dry, lonely desert. Yet God took care of them and brought them safely to the Promised Land of Canaan. Today we call it the land of Israel.

"I will give this whole country to you," God told Abram. "It will belong to you and to your children forever." Then Abram built an altar and worshiped God.

God kept Abram safe from other people living in the new land who might have hurt him. But when crops didn't grow well in the fields, the people had little to eat. So Abram and his family went away for a while to a country called Egypt, waiting until there was more food in Canaan.





### Exodus 35-40; Leviticus 16; Hebrews 7

Now it was time to build the Tabernacle. Moses invited the people to bring their gifts of gold, silver, bronze, wood, and whatever else was needed. Each family gladly brought gifts. Finally there was enough, but the people kept bringing more. Moses had to tell them to stop!

Workers chosen by God made curtains for the roof and walls of the Tabernacle. They also made a curtain to hang inside it, and another for the entrance. They covered board frames with gold. They put cloth over the whole Tabernacle.

Then the workers made Aaron's beautiful clothes. Gold bells at the bottom of his robe chimed as Aaron went in and out of the Tabernacle.


One worker made the Ark of the Covenant. This beautiful box with two gold angels on top was the most important part of the Tabernacle because it was a special place to meet with God.

When the Tabernacle was finished, the cloud pillar that had led the people came down and covered it. God's glory filled the Tabernacle.

The Ark was in the inner room. This room was called the Most Holy Place. The Lord told Moses that only Aaron, the high priest, could go in there. And Aaron could go there only once every year.

Aaron offered gifts or sacrifices for his sins and for the sins of the people. Many years later, Jesus, the Savior, was born. After he grew up, he did not offer sacrifices. But he became a sacrifice

when he died on a cross for our sins. Aaron is not alive today and cannot pray for us. But Jesus came back to life. Then he went up to heaven. Jesus is alive in heaven, and every day he is asking God to forgive us when we pray.



### A STORM ON A LAKE

Matthew 8:23-27; Mark 4:35-41: Luke 8:22-25

It was evening when Jesus and his disciples got into a boat. They began sailing over to the other side of the Sea of Galilee. But suddenly the wind began to blow very hard, and there was a terrible storm on the lake. High waves came up over the sides of the boat. Soon it was getting full of water and beginning to sink. But Jesus was asleep at the back of the boat.

"Teacher!" the disciples shouted at him. "Save us! We'll all be drowned!"

Then Jesus stood up and spoke to the wind and the water. He said, "Be quiet!"

The wind stopped blowing, and the water became very still and quiet. There were no more high waves, so water wasn't coming into the boat anymore. Then Jesus asked his disciples, "Why were you afraid? Why do you have so little faith?"

Even though the disciples were Jesus' friends, it was hard for them to understand how Jesus could make the wind and the water obey him. They still didn't know that Jesus was God's Son, and that he could do anything! They asked each other, "Who is Jesus anyway? How did he do that?"





### Matthew 27:32-54; Mark 15:21-39; Luke 23:26-47; John 19:17-30


Jesus had to carry a heavy wooden cross to a place outside the city. But Jesus had no more strength, so he fell. Along the way a man named Simon was coming in from the country. When the soldiers saw him, they made him carry the cross. A crowd followed Jesus out to a place called The Skull, or Calvary. There the soldiers nailed Jesus' hands and feet to the cross.

Jesus prayed for those who hurt him and for those who told them to do it. "Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they are doing," he said. Jesus knew they didn't understand that he is the Son of God. They tried to give him a sour drink so he wouldn't feel the pain so much. But Jesus wouldn't drink it.

Two other men were hanging on crosses with Jesus. One was on his right side, and the other was on his left. Both of them had done many wrong things.

It was nine o'clock in the morning when the soldiers put Jesus on the cross. He hung there until three o'clock in the afternoon. The soldiers took his clothes and divided them up among themselves. Then they rolled dice to see who would get his coat.

Pilate told the soldiers to place a sign on the cross above Jesus' head.



Jesus told the second man, "Today you will be with me in heaven." Jesus wanted the man to know that his sins were forgiven and that as soon as he died, he would go where Jesus was going.

Jesus saw his mother and his disciple John standing near the cross. He asked John to take care of his mother as if she were his own mother.

From noon until three in the afternoon there was darkness over all the land. God sent the darkness because wicked men were killing his Son.

At about three o'clock, Jesus called out with a loud voice, "My God, why have you left me?" God had turned away from him because he was carrying everyone's sins. Jesus was dying to take the punishment for those sins - those wrong things everyone does.

Then Jesus said he was thirsty. One of the men standing ran to get a sponge and filled it with sour wine. He held it up on a stick to Jesus' mouth so that he could drink it. Jesus tasted it. Then he cried out, "It is finished!" And he bowed his head and died.

At that very moment, the earth shook, rocks broke apart, and dead people who had loved God came out of their graves. When the Roman soldiers saw all of this, they were filled with fear. They said, "This really was the Son of God!"

#### Revelation 1:9-20; 4; 14; 21-22


When Jesus' disciple John was very old, he was a prisoner on an island called Patmos. He was sent there as a punishment for preaching about Jesus.
