Chapter 1

Some day the sun and moon and stars, and the earth on which we live, will all grow old, just as your clothes grow

old and worn out. But God will be the same as he was, today and yesterday and long, long ago. His life will go on and on, forever.

God is eternal.

God is also wonderful and very great. He can do many things which men cannot do.

We can be in only one place at a time. If we want to be in some other place, we have to go there. But God is in heaven, and at the same time he is everywhere upon earth.

If we go into the deepest dark mines, God is there. If we fly up into the clouds of the sky, God is there.

God sees us always, and everywhere. He knows everything that we do, hears every word that we speak, and even knows the thoughts that we have in our minds.

We cannot hide from God. If we do wrong, God knows it, even if we have not told anyone. He knows, too, when we have tried to be good and to please him, even if no one else knows.

Long ago someone said: *You are the God of seeing* (Genesis 16:13). That is a good line to remember.

God is even more wonderful. He knows everything that is going to happen in the world. We do not know what will happen tomorrow. But God knows everything. He knows what is going to happen tomorrow, and next week, and next year, and always, till the very end of the world. God also knows what will happen after the world has passed away.

And God is good. He is perfectly good, so that he cannot do anything wrong. Everything that God does is right.

Then, too, God is love. He loves you more than anyone in the world loves you. He loves you more than even your father and your mother love you. It was God who gave you a father and mother to love you and take care of you. Your father and mother, as much as they love you, cannot take care of you all the time. Sometimes they must be absent. At night they must sleep.

But God is always near you, and he is always taking care of you. God never sleeps. All night long, when you are sleeping, God is watching over you and caring for you. God takes care of you all of the daytime too.

It is God who made you. He made you because he wanted to love a child just like you. God wants you to love him too.

Heaven is God's home. Heaven is more beautiful than any place you have ever seen. It is more beautiful than anything you can imagine.

There is a wonderful river in heaven called the River of the Water of Life, with water clear as crystal.

There is no sickness nor sadness in heaven, but all is joy and happiness. There are no tears. There is no crying. There is no death.

There is no dark night in heaven, but always bright beautiful day. They do not need the light of the sun there, for the glory of God makes heaven brighter than the sun.

God lives in heaven. And with him there are the beautiful angels, thousands and thousands of them.

With him too are all the people who loved him, who have died.

And there is a place there for us, if we love God and our sins are forgiven for Jesus' sake.

PART 2 – THE ANGELS, GOOD AND BAD

God made the beautiful angels to live with him in heaven.

The angels are bright like the light. They are much stronger than men, and can do things that men cannot do. They go

where God sends them. They can fly down from heaven to this earth.

The demons hate everything that is good. Most of all they hate God. And they do not want us to love him, or to be good, and go to live with him in heaven after we die. They try in every possible way to make us wicked like themselves. They want us to lie and steal, to be disobedient and cross and cruel. But they are afraid of God. God is much stronger than Satan and all his demons. They fear and tremble before him.

So we need not to be afraid of them, though they are very strong.

Chapter 2

How the World Began

Genesis 1

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth.'

CHAPTER 3

The First Man, Adam

Genesis 1, 2

There were now many animals, but there was not a man in all the wide world.

Last of all, God made a man.

God made the first man entirely grown up. It was a great deal better to make him grown up, because he was all alone in the world. If he had first been a little baby, he would not have been able to take care of himself.

God called this man 'Adam.'

God made man a body. He gave him eyes to see with, ears to hear with, a mouth to eat with, and feet to walk with.

But God made him different from an animal by giving this man a wonderful gift, which animals did not receive.

Inside of man's body God put a living soul.

When you love your mother, is it her hands or feet that you love? No, it is something inside of your mother that you love, something that you cannot exactly see or touch. It is her soul that you love.

And it is your soul in you that loves your mother's soul. Your body cannot love or think.

You cannot see your soul, but it is there just the same, inside of your body.

Your body is the house of your soul.

Suppose that in an accident you should lose your arm. Would you be gone when your arm is gone? No, you would still be here. Suppose you were to lose your sight and become blind. Would you be gone if your sight were gone? No, though your sight would be gone, you would still be here.

Your arms and your eyes are parts of your body. They are not your soul. It is your soul that is *you*.

When God made man he gave him a wonderful soul which can love God and think about him. An animal cannot think about God or love him, because an animal has no soul. God created man in his own image. The Bible says, 'the Lord God formed the man of dust from the ground and

breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living creature,' or 'a living soul.'

This is the greatest gift that God could give to man, because the soul that God gave to man will never die.

When an animal dies, its body is dead, and that is the end of that animal. Its life is over, because it has only a body.

God did not give the angels bodies like ours. Angels are pure spirits, without bodies.

God also is a spirit without a body.

When the Bible says that God made man of the dust from the ground, it does not mean that God picked up a handful of earth and made a man of it. It means that man's body is made of the same materials which we find in soil and rocks. When a man's body lies in the earth for a long time, it turns back to dust because it is made of dust.

But his soul does not die. When a man dies, his soul returns to God who gave it to him.

God made both animals and man on that sixth day. And then he was finished with the making of earth and the heavens and all that is in them. 'And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good.'

On the seventh day God rested. He blessed the seventh day and made it holy, and rested from all the work that he had done. And he made that day a day of rest for man, too. On Sundays we rest from our daily work. Sunday is a day set apart for special worship of God with his people, a day to sing his praise together in church, to pray together, and to hear his word.

Chapter 4

The First Woman, Eve

Genesis 2

Do you think you would like to be Adam – all alone in the world?

Adam was the only human being in the world. Yet he was not alone. God came to him and talked to him in the cool of the day.
