The Hours: Daybreak

THE LEADER SHOULD CHOOSE A SHORT PASSAGE OF SCRIPTURE FOR THE DAY'S CONTEMPLATION BEFORE BEGINNING. THIS SAME PASSAGE WILL BE READ DURING EACH "LITURGY OF THE HOURS" THIS DAY.

LEADER: O children of the Living God, what is your Father's greatest desire for you this day?

PEOPLE: That we should love our eternal King with all our hearts, with all our souls, with all our minds and with all our strength.

And how would you show this love?

By remembering him at all times.

By cultivating thankfulness
for his many blessings, and trusting
his good providence
for the meeting of our needs.

By loving all whose lives intersect our own.

By choosing to serve rather

than to be served, to be wounded rather than to wound, and by bearing patiently with the failings of others, extending the same kindness, mercy, and compassion that God in Christ has so graciously offered us.

We would also love him by serving with faithfulness and due passion in our various vocations, by delighting in all things he has created for our benefit and pleasure, and by caring well for all he has given us to steward.

O children of the Living God, you would do well to practice your love in these ways today!

Do you now possess the needed strength to perfectly accomplish such holy requirements? We do not. We are weak and inconsistent, and often buffeted by fear and pride and selfishness. But being impoverished and ill-equipped as we are, we will look to the grace of God and to the sanctifying work of the Spirit to accomplish his purposes in and through us this day,

as we, in grateful response, seek to choose that which pleases him.

We open our hearts anew to you this morning,
O Lord, that the love of the Father
and the life of Christ
and the breath of the Spirit
would quicken within us
a greater affection for your ways.

Work your will in us, Lord Christ.

Let us now bring before our gracious God any petitions relevant to this day.

O Lord, hear our prayers.

O children of God, casting your cares upon his strong shoulders, now surrender your own agendas for this day, and instead be led by the workings of his Spirit.

Open our eyes and our hearts, O Lord, to your words and truth.

THE SHORT PASSAGE OF SCRIPTURE CHOSEN FOR
THE DAY'S CONTEMPLATION IS HERE READ ALOUD
BY ONE OF THE PARTICIPANTS. A MOMENT OF SILENCE
IS THEN TAKEN FOR REFLECTION.

May these words of God bring to each of us conviction, challenge, and comfort, as our lives and choices this day require.

Shape us even now, O Lord.

Prepare our bodies for the labors of this day.

Give us strength and health

to complete them.

Prepare our minds for the demands of this day.

Grant us clarity, creativity, and discernment.

NOTIFY ATTENDEES IN ADVANCE THAT THIS LITURGY INCLUDES A TIME TO SPEAK SHORT BLESSINGS FOR THE BRIDE AND GROOM, SO THAT ANY WHO DESIRE TO DO SO MIGHT PREPARE THEIR THOUGHTS AND WORDS BEFOREHAND.

BEST MAN: Welcome all, to this glad hour and to this festive table!

MAID OF HONOR: Let each find their place

in this good company!

GUESTS FIND THEIR PLACES AND REMAIN STANDING BEHIND THEIR CHAIRS.

OFFICIANT (typically a Minister or Priest): For what reason are we gathered in this place?

ALL PRESENT. We are gathered for a celebration!

OFFICIANT: Why are we called to this table?

ALL PRESENT: We are called to a feast!

OFFICIANT: And what do we feast here?

What do we celebrate?

ALL PRESENT: We celebrate our joy tonight, on the eve of the wedding of (Bride) and (Groom), and we feast our blessing of the same!

MAID OF HONOR: Now set sorrows aside, friends, or hold them loosely for these hours. Accept this invitation to feasting and gladness, for it is a foretaste of that marriage sacrament still to come.

BEST MAN: Laugh and be glad, friends, but even in joy do not hide the welling of your meaningful tears if they be born of love for this bride and for this groom.

ALL PRESENT: Amen.

OFFICIANT: Now may our sovereign
Lord, who has purposefully twined
all of our many stories together
in the love of (Bride) and (Groom),
be present in this hour and at this table,
that our feasting and our fellowship,
indeed that our very gladness, might resound
as a praise of his enduring goodness!

ALL PRESENT: Amen!

OFFICIANT: Be seated for this happy feast.

ALL TAKE THEIR SEATS, FILLING THEIR GLASSES WITH WHATEVER BEVERAGE THEY CHOOSE AS THE GROOM AND BRIDE CONTINUE.

GROOM: You are invited here as those who have long loved us, guiding, nurturing, and shaping (Bride) and me, proving yourselves faithful in a thousand ways.

BRIDE: You are here as the generations who have cared for and carried us from the times of our births until now.

And you are here as the brothers and sisters and friends who have walked beside us, the ones who have laughed and wept with us, the ones who knew us best.

GROOM: Until we found each other.

HERE THE GROOM MAY KISS HIS BRIDE-TO-BE ON THE HAND OR FOREHEAD.

GROOM: You have, all of you, each in your ways, been vital to our stories as they have unfolded, as they have brought my bride and me, by God's providence, to this very night, gathered in love here in this holy moment—BRIDE: a moment carved out to savor your company, marking together this last of our shared hours in this chapter of our lives, before my groom and I are yowed to one another, from tomorrow till life's end.
