It was simple. It was short.

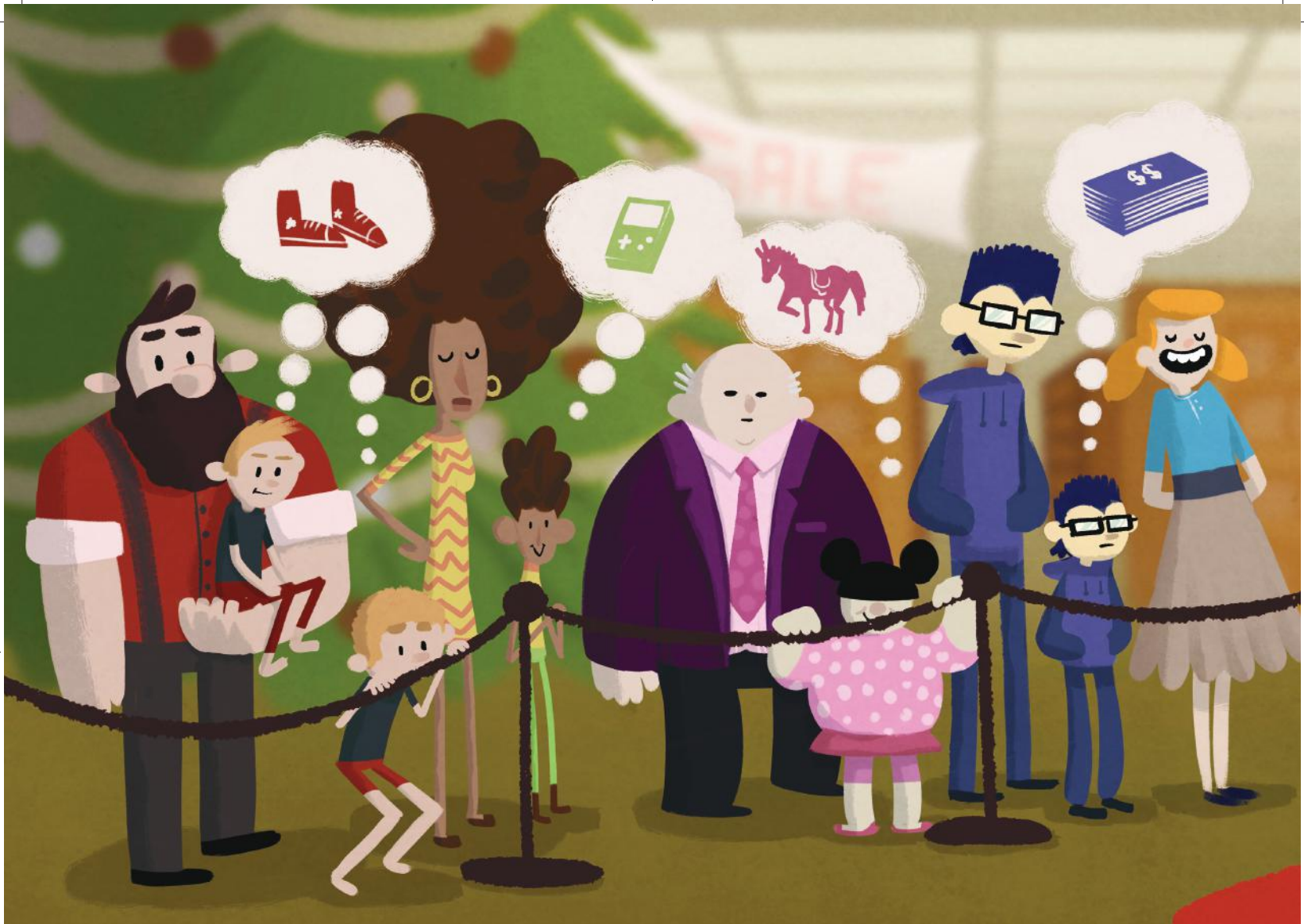
But a seed was sown in Santa's heart,

He also knew their "nice attempts" were pretty much a joke.



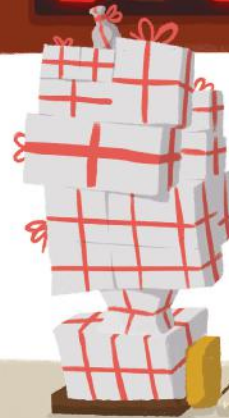
Their heads weren't filled with thoughts as nice as kindness, peace and joy,

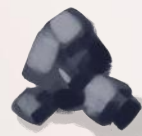
*That shook his world.

Tricky Words Glossary

There may be some words in the story that you or your kids are not familiar with. You'll find here a short definition as well as a Bible reference in brackets, so that you can see where these words are talked about in the Bible.

Bible A very special book that God has given to us. It tells the story of God's relationship with people and the whole book points to the gospel about Jesus.
(2 Timothy 3:15-17)

Gospel The good news about who Jesus is and what he has done to reconcile us to God. The word "gospel" means "good news".
(1 Corinthians 15:1-5)

God The one who made everything and everyone. God is the most wise, powerful, good and loving being that exists. There is only one God but within God there are three persons - the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
(Acts 17:24-25)

Jesus The name given to God the Son when he became a human. "Jesus" means "God Saves", because Jesus saves us from our sin by dying for us on the cross.
(Matthew 1:20-25)

Christ This is not Jesus' last name. "Christ" means the same as "Messiah". It is the title of the special king that God promised would come.
(John 4:25-26)

Sin To turn away from God in your heart, mind or actions.
(Isaiah 53:6)

Mercy When God doesn't give us the punishment for our sin that we deserve.
(Ephesians 2:3-5)

Grace When God shows us kindness that we don't deserve.
(Ephesians 2:6-9)

Forgiveness When God deletes our record of sin so we can be reconciled to God.
(Colossians 2:13-14)

Reconcile When we go from being God's enemy to God's friend.
(Colossians 1:19-22)

Prayer Speaking to God.
(Matthew 6:5-13)

Creator Another title for God, because God created everything including us.
(Genesis 1:1-31)

Born Again To be given new life by God. To be adopted into God's family forever.
(John 3:3-8)

The Author's Inspiration

The inspiration for this book came around Christmas 2013 after I witnessed an amusing moment during a local community carols event. After we'd sung everything from "O Holy Night" to "Santa Claus is Coming to Town", the time came for Santa to come out. As expected, he asked the crowd of excited children, "So, who's been a good boy or girl this year?" "Meeeeeee!!" they all screamed. Then he asked cheekily, "And who's been a naughty boy or girl?" To his surprise, the kids again screamed, "Meeeeeee!!". After an awkward moment, Santa shrugged and said, "Oh well... I guess you've tried to be good", proceeding then to randomly throw out presents to the expectant crowd.



What a message, I thought! A weird mix of moralism and apathy - of "only good people get a gift" and "everyone is pretty much a good person". I thought about how so many believe that's what Christianity teaches. The truth is, the message of the gospel is exactly the opposite. In contrast to the "good people go to heaven" idea, Jesus taught that everyone needs mercy and he had come to die for sinners like you and me - to bring the gift of forgiveness to all who would trust in him.

These truths had transformed my life and so I left that community carols event reflecting on the various messages we teach our kids and ourselves, and musing about the contrast between Jesus' message and Santa's. That's when I got this funny idea. What would happen if the character of Santa heard about the gospel? Would he find it challenging? How might he respond?

It has been a joy to collaborate with Matt Boutros to turn this idea into a beautifully illustrated Children's book. I hope you find it fun and engaging as you read it with your kids and reflect on how the messages we believe compare to Jesus' gospel of grace.
