- 1. Human beings have been struggling hard against weeds—any plants that thrive where they are not wanted—since the beginning of agriculture. Weeds eliminate grazing areas and account for one-third of all crop losses in the world. Crops and other desirable plants die because the 'interlopers' compete for water, soil, nutrients and sunlight. Weeds also interfere with irrigation potential of the place. Harvesting is also hampered.
- 2. The global need for weed control has been answered mainly by the chemical industry. As we know, herbicides are often effective and necessary to get good agricultural results. Yet some pose serious problems, particularly if they are misused. For example, toxic and otherwise harmful compounds threaten animal and public health when they accumulate in our ecosystems.
- 3. In recent years, the chemical industries have introduced several herbicides that are more ecologically sound than those of the past, notably glyphosates and a series of compounds called sulfonylureas. Also the most effective chemical herbicides kill virtually all plants they contact, sparing only the few species possessing natural resistance to the chemicals and species that have been genetically modified for resistance. Apart from this, chemicals typically have to be applied several times in a growing season.

4. Of late, it is realised that introducing new chemicals alone will not solve the growth of weed and problems related to it in the world. Hence, an increasing number of scientists all over the world are engaged in exploring biological alternatives that harness the innate weed-killing powers. The biological agents now in use are environment-friendly and many offer the significant benefit of specificity. They are chosen for their ability to attack selected targets, leaving crops and other plants untouched. These biological agents are administered once, after which no added applications are needed.

- 1. High-altitude climbing is still a very dangerous task in spite of the availability of oxygen masks and other protective equipments which modern climbers take with them. These, of course, are indispensable accessories of climbing, but more important than these is the stamina of the climber which ultimately determines the success of his attempt. Throughout his superb presence of mind, he has to tread every inch of the ground with the utmost care, death is his constant companion which he can keep at a distance only with his utmost care, for a false step may not only strike him a fatal blow but also bring disaster to the whole expedition. That is why all expeditions invariably take with them local guides who are experienced climbers and who have a thorough knowledge of the nature of the terrain. Moreover, a huge amount of capital is needed for financing these expeditions, and this is generally provided by government or rich private organisations.
- 2. The primary object of a mountaineering expedition is to get to the top of a high mountain, which, in the past, has withstood all attempts to conquer it. But it should not be presumed that the expedition is a complete failure if it does not reach its destination.
