


Materials at play.





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Doily x I
Metal Ring x I
HoopYarn
Fringe Material x I3
Scissors
Glue Gun & Glue
String IO-I2 6" pieces
Crystal (optional)
Beads (optional)










When selecting your doily, you can either use one that you have on hand. Pick one up at your local thrift store. Make one from scratch if you're into crochet, or source one online.

I find that 10" or 12" rings are nicest to use for this design. With that in mind, you want your doily to be slightly smaller. If your doily is about the same size, you may want to go one size up for the metal ring.





Step One

Heat up your glue gun.

While that is heating, trace the outline of your ring with the yarn you wish to wrap it in, 5 times.

Make a cut and fold the piece in half.






Take the piece you just folded and glue the middle of the fold onto the ring.

Continue to wrap and glue the remainder of the yarn until it has covered the entire ring, you should have just enough yarn left over to trim off.

Turn off the glue gun.





Step hree

Place the doily into the middle of the ring.

Take 4 of your 3" pieces and tie one, attaching the doily to the ring, at the top and bottom and each side.

If it looks like your doily will need 3 attachment places between those, then space them accordingly, and if it looks like it will need only 2, then space them accordingly and attach.

You can cut the strings short or leave them long, it is up to you.



Now for the fun part!



Depending on how long you want your fringe to be, you can cut your yarn pieces. I like to measure from my chin to my arm length towards my hand.

You can braid some pieces, or leave them as is. This is the creative part, so it really depends on the look you're going for.

Lace can be added, ribbon, fabric, yarn, string, the possibilities are endless here.

If you would like to thread some beads onto your design, or add a crystal, now is the time, you just have to be mindful of the hole size and the pieces you're trying to attach them to.





Using a lark head knot, you can attach each piece to your ring.

I like to start in the middle, that way I know it will be even. If there is something special you want in the center, you can start with that. I like to hide the joining point of the cord I wrapped around the ring here.

Spread out the 12 remaining pieces, 6 on each side of the center piece. This will vary if you would like a fuller fringe vs a wispy one.







Cut off a 15" piece of yarn from the one you used to wrap the ring. Attach it to the center of the top using a lark head knot, tie the ends together and use that for your hanging point.

Hang your piece up and see where you may need to or want to trim some of the ends to give it shape.
