Sources say that the bear cub was purchased from a hunter for only \$20 by Canadian Lieutenant Harry Colebourn in White River, Ontario, Canada, while he was on his way to England during WWI, and he named the bear “Winnie” after his adopted hometown in Winnipeg, Manitoba.
