Because of the rapid growth Cincinnati saw in the 40 years after its founding, people began referring to the city as "The Queen of the West" around 1820. 8. The Ohio River flows for 981 miles and is a source of drinking water for over three million people.
9. BB Riverboats got its name from two good friends named Ben Bernstein and Betty Blake. Today, these boats offer tours called USS Nightmare.
10. Mr. William Procter and Mr. James Gamble are the founders of P&G company and have been keeping things clean since 1837.
11. Taylor Southgate Bridge was built in 1995.
12. U.S. Bank Arena was completed in September 1975 and was originally called the Riverfront Coliseum.
13. The Great American Ball Park spans 29 acres and has been home of the Cincinnati Reds since March 31, 2003.

15. Union Terminal first opened in 1933 as one of Americas last great train stations. If you ever visit make sure to check out the whispering fountains.

17. Carew Tower took only thirteen months to build and was finished in 1930.
18. The Scripps Center was completed in 1990.
19. Fifth Third Bank became the first financial institution in the US to establish a charitable foundation in 1948.
20. Duke Energy Building was finished in 1929 and was originally called the Cincinnati Gas & Electric Company Building.
21. Atrium Two Building is an ideal location for businesses and quick access to interstate.
