



JACKSON HOLE

Before the 1870's, Jackson Hole was simply the Native Americans hunting and ceremonial grounds. The town was eventually settled but didn't receive its official name until 1893 named after David Edward "Davey" Jackson, who trapped beaver in the area in the late 1820s. Today, Jackson Hole boasts three major ski areas: Jackson Hole Mountain Resort, Snow King Mountain, and the Grand Targhee Resort, with Grand Teton and Yellowstone National Parks nearby which are major tourist attractions all year. 19. Million Dollar Cowboy Bar was actually a doctors office first, then a bank, eventually becoming what it is today.
20. Wyoming State Flag has three colors: red for the Indians and blood pioneers; white for purity; blue for the skies and distant mountains.
21. Snow King Mountain, Wyoming's first ski area, opened in Jackson Hole in 1939.
22. National Elk Refuge was established in 1912.

24. Bill Briggs – Jackson Hole resident and first person to ski down Grand Teton - 13,770 feet.
25. Wyoming was the 44th state to join the union on July 20, 1890.
26. Jackson Hole named after David Edward "Davey" Jackson, and Hole is a high mountain valley with steep sides.

28. Bald Eagles can't swim but can row themselves across water with their wings.
29. The antlers of a male moose can spread up to 6 feet wide.
