1. George Washington and the US army crossing the Delaware River on December 25-26, 1776.
2. John F. Kennedy –35th (president)– saved his crew when his PT boat sank.
3. The Marine Corps War Memorial is dedicated to all U.S. Marines who have died since 1775.
4. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is dedicated to U.S. service members who died without their remains being identified.
5. Both Ronald W. Reagan –the 40th president– and Nancy Reagan–first lady– were both American actors.
6. Ulysses S Grant got a speeding ticket on a horse.
7. Gerald R. Ford –38th– was a big supporter of Scouting.
8. Abraham Lincoln –16th– was also a “the rail splitter,” someone who splits logs for building fences.
9. Rutherford B Hayes–19th– was the first president to have a phone.
10. James Monroe –5th– loved to travel the world.
11. Calvin Coolidge –30th– had many animals in the White House.
12. Andrew Johnson –17th– was the first president impeached.
13. George H.W. Bush –41st– was a big baseball fan and crashed 2 planes during WWII.
14. Andrew Jackson–7th–appears on the US \$20 bill.
15. Woodrow Wilson –28th–led the nation during WWI.
16. John Tyler –10th– loved children.
17. William Howard Taft –27th– was so heavy, he broke the White House bathtub.
18. William McKinley –25th–always wore a red Carnation flower as a good luck charm.
19. Joe Theismann –a famous US football quarterback– played for the Washington Redskins.
20. William Henry Harrison –9th– gave a three hour speech in the rain and died three weeks later.
21. Bob Bennett served as a US Senator for Utah from 1993-2011.
22. The Town Crier would make public announcements by first saying “Oyez” French for “listen” or “hear ye.”
23. The Vietnam Memorial Wall is symbolic of the past and the present coming together
24. Benedict Arnold was an American general in the Revolutionary War who betrayed the US, and later fought with the British.
25. Congressman Rob Bishop is currently in the US House of Representatives.
26. Congressman Chris Cannon served in the House of Representatives from 1997-2009.
27. Senator Orrin Hatch has more than four decades of public service.
28. The Vietnam Women's Memorial was established in 1993.
29. Franklin Pierce –14th– brought about “Bleeding Kansas,” a war to see if the northern state of Kansas should be a slave state.
30. Martin Van Buren –8th–is known as the “Ok” president.
31. Chester A Arthur –21st– loved fishing.
32. The World War II Memorial was dedicated on April 29, 2004
33. Martin Luther King Jr. declaring his “I Had a Dream” speech.
34. The Lincoln Memorial contains the second Inaugural address and the Gettysburg Address.
35. The Korean War Veterans Memorial highlights all of the military branches.

37. Jimmy Carter –39th– was a peanut farmer.
38. District of Columbia War Memorial was dedicated on November 11, 1931.

41. Dwight D. Eisenhower –34th– was the Supreme Commander of Allied forces in WWII.
42. James A Garfield –20th– was assassinated after 100 days of being president.
43. Millard Fillmore –13th– put running water and a stove in the White House.

47. Franklin D. Roosevelt –32nd– was paralyzed after 1921 but rarely seen in a wheelchair.
48. Eleanor Roosevelt was involved in many humanitarian causes.
49. William “Bill” Jefferson Clinton –42nd–had always wanted to be president.
50. Herbert H. Hoover –31st– being a great miner, made his money in gold.
51. Warren G. Harding –29th– was a successful newspaper publisher.
52. James Madison –4th– was nicknamed the “Father of the U.S. Constitution” and his wife Dolly Madison.
53. Thomas Jefferson –3rd– wrote the Declaration of Independence.
54. Benjamin Franklin helped in drafting the Declaration of Independence.
55. The Thomas Jefferson Memorial sits directly south of the White House.
56. The Holocaust Museum stands as a striking reminder of what happened to millions of Jews and other victims during WWII.
57. Zachary Taylor –12th– also served in the army for four decades.
58. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is also called the Jamie L. Whitten Building.
