We support local creative businesses and creativity in the community. We reinvest our profits back into these areas to fulfil the values that mean so much to us.



It feels so wonderful to be back to a normal trading year with no lockdowns or shop closures but 2022 has still been a challenging time in retail, with the cost of living crisis causing many to tighten their spending habits. Despite this we have just seen our best ever trading year in Made in Ashford which we are so grateful for. Of course these profits go back into supporting other things we do, such as events at The Craftship where we offer subsidised creative sessions for all ages. This year we have seen a large increase in people needing to use those subsidised places to have time to create for their wellbeing and to simply keep warm. We are proud we can offer a creative community hub in the centre of Ashford with the continued support of Ashford Borough Council.

This year has had some fantastic highlights which are shared in this report. For the second year The Craftship has been awesome and is growing every month, with new collaborations and different ways to serve our community & the environment to craft a better future! I am also very pleased that Made in Ashford turned 7 this year which feels like quite a milestone. It fills me with joy how well the shop is loved and the community of creatives & friends who have developed from it. I am a massive fan of the young makers space which launched this year and is growing the next generation of makers & entrepreneurs. They are a big inspiration to me!

Made in Ashford saw some more DIY inside this year adding shelves & spaces to house even more makers. We have had a shop floor change around this year too and added some craft kits from the Craftship to the shop floor to help us raise funds.



73 local Kentish businesses were

supported to sell their products, grow their businesses, skill share and become part of our community of creatives.



This year saw the introduction of the Young Makers Spaces – a section of the shop where we show case the creative work of young entrepreneurs.

We currently have 6 young people benefiting from this space and the additional support it brings.

10 Artists have showcased work in our Starewell Gallery.



We have had 3 team social sessions including bowling, our birthday making party & xmas party. We always try to support other local businesses while we are at it and frequent many an Ashfordian night spot!





Incubator space Crystals of the Moon joined us and took on the incubator space which was quite a small section upstairs and it soon became apparent that they needed more space, so we did a big refit upstairs, worked really hard building table tops, relaying carpet tiles & moved loads of stuff over to CS. Crystals of the Moon was very successful there but returned to the shop floor in order to work less in the shop. This then made way for a new business to join us in the space and try to launch their business. BeFandabbydozy joined us before Christmas making slightly risque slogan items.

We have expanded the seating capacity and table space in the Craftship to accommodate even more makers at once! In our shop space we have 24 national & local craft kit creating businesses selling here. A big thing for us this year was the introduction of a permanent scrap store or Pre-loved Craft space. This is where we sell donated arts & crafts supplies. We have been given so much and we are so grateful. This helps us to put on free craft sessions using the donations themselves and the money raised from selling it too. In some circumstances it saves this stuff from landfill too! A big thanks to our volunteers for processing & pricing these donations!

We hosted - 234 regular clubs, 42 workshops, 12 private group sessions, 8 parties & 36 completely free sessions!


We had a pop up studio in our Kitchen space when we collaborated

E-commerce - website

We have spent lots of time trying to grow our website this year and have been updating all of our product photography. We have been adding new lines and intend to represent the whole of Made in Ashford on our website in the coming year. This is not just a selling platform but a showcase of the makers we have in the shop. We hope it can support the sales of the businesses that are a part of our social enterprise and also

raise funds for us to continue to do the work we are doing.
We have also used our platform to distribute free colouring in sheets & activities to help creativity be more accessible to more folks.

Sales

Made in Ashford had an inconsistent year with sales and our peak Christmas season came to us late. It was all a bit of a worry but then we managed to have our most successful year to date! We traded +19% on the previous year 2021 although due to being closed for 3 months in the final lockdown does not give the best representation so we also did +4% on 2019! We have also managed to sustain & increase some of our other revenue streams in 2022 such as the Makers Market, the website, ebay for change & hiring the facilities in The Craftship.

249 parcels filled with orders were sent from our website & ebay.

Ebay for change

We spent some time really getting to grips with using ebay as a platform to sell the products from our makers. This will spread the message of buying social & the impact it can have for good in communities as well as for individuals.

It has been really successful for sales and we look forward to another year of making that work better for us.

Paid Roles

We had our first ever employee in the form of a Kickstarter. We now have 5 team members who work for us on a regular basis. We have grown our freelance adhoc team who we work with on various projects and try to share this work out between those with the right skill set who are part of the Made in Ashford team. We have worked with over 20 local creative businesses and artists to deliver a variety of projects throughout the year.








In 2022 we held 14 Makers

Sustainability

We continue to be more sustainable in our practices and reduce our impact on the environment. We do not let new products into the store wrapped in plastic packaging and we try to avoid any single use packaging altogether where possible. We use a lot



of donated craft materials for workshops & clubs in the Craftship which is not only thrifty but stops unnecessary consumption of goods, reducing our dependence on natural resources in this world.

Safety

The safety of our team is always very important to us and also the safety of our community as a whole. This is why it was so important for us to join the safe spaces programme and offer both of our shops as places members of the public can go if they need a space to feel safe. We continue to use Ashford Partnership against Crime radio & platforms. We want to do our part in addressing anti-social behaviour in our town and keeping our place safe.

Our social impact

Another year of working hard to give creativity to our community which can help with the symptoms of anxiety, depression, loneliness and even dementia, according to research. It aids well-being, builds connection and makes our town a good place to be, taking pressure off other services locally.





Our gorgeous shop is continuing to support local creative makers and delivering good sales for them. We are a supportive network with many things in place to help each other and have fun together! The Craftship has been successful in providing a safe, warm & welcoming space for the community to create, learn skills and meet new people. We have been a place that organisations have partnered with to fulfil their creative objectives too. This in turn has increased footfall into the town & increased pride in Ashford which is what ABC set out to do with the Made in Ashford project. We work with all ages in our community from preschoolers to older people. It is a privilege to see such diversity in those we support & who support us. We work with people from diverse ethnic backgrounds. We are a predominantly female organisation and seem to have higher proportion of people who identify as female as our participants & beneficiaries. There are many people who are neuro diverse in our organisation. We try to make our space accessible & welcoming for those with disabilities.


Projects, Events & Collabs:

We packaged up the campaign and circulated


it to be shared across multiple local social media accounts to celebrate & highlight the achievements of local female biz women.




Free Family Craft

We were very fortunate to have been given a donation towards our free family craft on a Saturday by Cllr. Peter Feacey. This enabled us to support lots of families to create together,

form stronger bonds, meet new families, learn new skills & positively benefit their wellbeing through creative practices. We also used funds from those who play the Ashford community lottery & support us.











The Queens jubilee

We were commissioned by Park Mall to make a selfie throne fit for a queen. We used sumptuous felt and opulent golden trim with a hand painted crown fixed to the top. Many photos were taken perched regally on the bench across the jubilee celebrations. We were even visited by Dominic King from Radio Kent to feature the bench on his show! We also decided to make an activity book & DIY bunting packs for the occasion and draft in several designers from Made in Ashford to help us create something unique & awesome. We worked with 6 artists and created a book that you could buy physical copies of and download for free to print at home (which is how we always do it so folks don't have to pay if they can't afford to but don't

miss out). This activity book was such a hit that it even featured on Channel 4's Stephs packed lunch where Kerry Katona tried to cut the queen's head off with a pair of scissors - this has gone down as one of my career highlights! On top of all this we were privileged to be one of the destinations for the Ashford Jubilee Tree Trail. Our tree was decorated by Tania Paige and included elements made by members of our yarn and sketchbook clubs.



Reclaim These Streets

A procession was held in Ashford led by a collective of female local councillors from across various parties, the

Ashford safer streets coalition & members of the community united to loudly use our voices to reclaim our streets. We made banners which we held high, one banner built from our rage after the local discovery of Sarah Everard's body and the other crafted from sorrow after the murder of our local loved PSCO Julia James. It was a moving & important march.





Shop Small

We had a great day out in Margate for Holly Tucker's Shop

Independent campaign and met lots of other inspirational small Kent businesses.

Big Green Week

Our market manager got the chance to manage the market & get stall holders in collaboration with ABC for this brilliant event. This event saw the town packed with traders and organisations from e-cars in County Square to Asprie giving out free seeds at the Bandstand. It was a brilliant town event and we laid on some free make do & mend crafts, teaching

basic sewing repair skills and how to make a draft excluder.

We also sold pre-loved craft supplies and fabric in the Craftship which became a permanent fixture.



Ashford 180

We collaborated to sell tickets, programs for them and posters, post cards too in Made in Ashford. We also put on a free day of train/180

themed free crafts in CS. We laid paper track all around the shop which could be coloured in, made junk model trains, tunnels, scenery and the kids made a train station, gift shop & café – we all had the best time!



Keep warm & create

Introduced in response to the cost of living crisis so individuals & families can come into the Craftship sit down have a free colouring in sheet, do something creative & keep warm for a bit. No questions asked. Everyone is welcome.





Kent Mining Museum

During the Easter Holidays Melissa & Danielle ran community bunting workshops at the wonderful Kent Mining Museum in Betteshanger Country Park. Participants used posca pens, stencils, buttons and stiching to create over 20 meters of bunting to be



displayed at the museum and remain as a legacy piece for people to enjoy for years to come. Some of the participants had family members who actually worked in the local mines!



Create Music Village Fringe



We hosted the beginnings of The Ashford Community Drumming Band or AC/DB as they are known! This was part of the Create music village

fringe events and spring board. The band went on to perform on the bandstand and also played at the Carnival of The Baubles!

Folks can play a lottery to win up to £20k and 60% of the £1 they spend on the ticket goes to us if they choose to support our social enterprise.

We have used this money to go towards free craft activities and our keep warm & create project for our local Ashford community.



Fabric of Ashford

This project was a collaboration between Craftship Enterprise, Revelation and Emergency Exit Arts for Love Ashford. The aim was to bring colour and community to the High Street by creating an installation for the town centre via other amazing venues in the borough such as Victoria Park, Singleton Environment Center and the bandstand. This consisted of photographs taken by the community of Ashford that were then worked through embroidery & paint pen to be transformed into a vision of future Ashford. We also worked with resettled Ukrainian & Afghan communities, WI groups, the Amber trust and more. These pieces were then worked into a collaborative installation that was put at the bandstand for the finale event. The Craftship hosted many of the workshops and our facilities such as sewing machines & makers space was used for free for the project's completion. We helped

create the concept for the project and 8 of our members were the paid







freelance artists used on the project.

Carnival of the Baubles

Another year of the beloved Carnival of the Baubles with an out of this world space theme. We again hosted the open workshops, went into schools to create lanterns to be paraded with the children. We also worked on the large lanterns you will have seen in businesses & the parade. This was another collaboration with Emergency Exit Arts, Revelation for Love Ashford. Another 10 of our members worked

on this project working with 2 EEA artists and we had a development session

to work on our big builds with Dream Safari.
The procession was led by an EEA pink robot made from wheelie bins called Bin Bot which was very much enjoyed by all. St. Marys church was lit up and there was projection mapping on the old Bingo Hall.

It is the highlight of our year and gets better each time!







We went into 6 primary schools, 2 secondary schools, worked with 3 community groups, college students came to volunteer & help us (who were fantastic!) and had 4 open workshops at the Craftship. Over 2,000 people came to watch or join in the light procession.

We have collaborated with: AIMREC, ABC, Kippys, Revelation, Create music village, Emergency Exit Arts, Concept Training, Kent Mining Museum, and all 73 Made in Ashford business and artists we have worked with throughout the year


Funding Sources
