



# DIY Airplant Workshop

45 min



## Supplies

- Grapewood
- (3) Airplants
- Green Moss
- Glue

## Directions

1. Start by selecting your grapewood and three airplants.
2. Plan out your design by looking at the different types of airplants to see what colors and characteristics work best together.
3. Select the areas on your grapewood where you would like to add the airplants.
4. Glue moss to the areas you selected for the airplants. Let this dry for a few minutes before adding the airplants.
5. Glue the airplants in place on top of or within the moss pieces. Hold in place for a couple of minutes and then allow the glue to dry completely before displaying.
6. Note: You can glue the airplants to the grapewood first, and then apply the moss; either way works!

## Care

About once a week, immerse the entire piece of grapewood in a bucket of cool water and soak for 15 minutes. After soaking, dry upside down to avoid rotting at the base of the plant. If needed, you can mist the airplants in between waterings. The warmer and/or drier the air, the more frequently you will need to water. Check for signs of dehydration, which is apparent when the edges of the leaves start curling up and “pinching”. During cooler weather, airplants can go longer between waterings, but this depends on the environment. Don’t be alarmed if your airplant loses some “leaves”. If it loses outer leaves, you may have to reapply with glue again. Airplants do well with indirect, bright light. About once a month, spray with pre-mixed 20-10-20 fertilizer—a foolproof fertilizer that won’t overdo it.



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
