The setting

Soo Kim Lan turned sixteen at the start of the second decade of the twentieth century. The 1910s elevated the momentum of its first decade, which opened the century with exploits that unfurled one of the most revolutionary times in human history. Change became the natural order of the day as the world got used to soaring the skies (Wilbur and Orville Wright took their first flight in 1903), gliding over land (Henry Ford introduced his first Model-T on October 1, 1908), taking photographs (Kodak introduced the low-priced Brownie camera in 1900), watching silent movies (Thomas Edison produced the first silent movie in 1903), receiving Nobel Prizes (First Nobel Prizes were awarded in December 10, 1901), and exploring a new physics of reality (Max Planck formulated the Quantum Theory in 1900), which paved the way for Einstein's Theory of Relativity in 1905. The world was caught up with a profusion of new inventions and incorporations when it received news that King Edward VII departed in 1910. His funeral was described as "the greatest assemblage of royalty and rank ever gathered in one place and of its kind, the last" (Tuchman, 1964). Closer to home, the Anglo-Siamese treaty was signed on March 10, 1909 by the United Kingdom and Thailand, dissecting the northern Malay states from Malaya.

Unfortunately, the 1910s came to be dominated by the First World War (WWI), which began in 1914. This war spread to Malaya at the Battle of Penang on October 28, 1914, when German cruiser SMS Emden sank two allied warships in the Strait of Malacca.

The undeterred goal

Set against this backdrop, an orphaned, sixteen-year old school girl living with her maternal grandmother in Taiping, Perak, was contemplating her future. Soo Kim Lan was filled with childhood dreams of becoming a doctor. Her intrinsic yearning was so intense that she would immediately go to the aid of any animal in need. She would soothe and nurse limping stray dogs, injured cats and birds till they were able to walk, run and fly on their own. At the same time, she was a teenager overwhelmed with gratitude for her maternal grandmother who cared for her and her siblings after the loss of their parents.

Well aware of the trials of her times, which made it seem near impossible for a woman to be accepted into Medical College, she proceeded to become a teacher after graduating from high school. While she found some consolation in being able to help reciprocate her maternal grandmother's kindness, it appeared that fate would not allow her to settle into her job. World War I (July 28, 1914 to November 11, 1918) broke out just before she completed her teachers' training program. The war lasted throughout her years as a teacher from 1915 to 1917. She persevered, doing her best to educate and care for every child under her tutelage. In her own time, Kim Lan immersed herself in her studies, community services, charity and church services. Assessments of her choices during her teenage years demonstrate that she held unwavering faith in the wisdom of a biblical verse that counsels one to be joyful in hope, patient in affliction and faithful in prayer (Romans 12:12).

Hereinafter are five photographs of her teachers' training and teaching days. She was eighteen to twenty-two years of age when these photographs were taken circa 1912 to 1916.

The childhood dream

Soo Kim Lan's earnest dedication to pursue her chosen field, Medicine, was so deep-rooted that by 1916, at only twenty-two years of age, she was working beyond her duties as a teacher. She actively served local communities and charitable causes, and gave public sermons at the Middle Road Methodist Church in Singapore. By all accounts, she was a young lady who had dedicated her life to help others, to make a difference by giving with kindness. In due time, she showed that giving does indeed, open the way for receiving. Soo Kim Lan went on to take the medical college entrance exam and upon passing, she received the Tan Jiak Kim Scholarship on May 30, 1917. She embarked on life as a college student at the King Edward VII College of Medicine in September the same year.

The succeeding photographs, manuscripts and news articles are presented in chronological order to provide a more in-depth understanding of Soo Kim Lan's paths in life during the 1910s.


Dr Soo Kim Lan's devotion to spend her life in service of the welfare of her community from the onset of her early twenties, is evinced from the preceding articles. These news articles further reveal a profound testimony: as individuals, we are each capable of rising above personal troubles to help lighten the burden of others, regardless of our circumstances. All through the loss of her parents, uncertainties of the first world war, untold trials and trauma heightened by the deaths of her elder sister and maternal grandmother, she revealed a lesson in times of suffering: One may choose to grow bitter, or better and stronger with courage and compassion.

To this day, Dr Soo Kim Lan's passage across the 1910s, persist in bringing to the fore, the message that anyone can triumph over personal challenges, apparent failures and discouragement, through personal choice and courage.

We can always choose to see that challenges are not meant to destroy or deprive us in any way, but to spur and strengthen us to achieve ever greater feats for the greater good of everyone in our lives.

The setting

Soo Kim Lan was in the prime of her youth at the start of the 1920s. She had completed two years of medical college and was fully fledged to conclude her third year at The King Edward VII Medical College with unmitigated success. The new decade was vibrant with reform and restoration. People were celebrating the end of World War I. The 1920s opened with the Summer Olympics with an emphasis on reconciliation. Women won the right to vote in the U.S. and the world's first commercial radio broadcast aired to give news and entertainment to the masses. The decade's roll of historic events includes the declaration of the Irish Free State in 1921, when China's Communist Party was established, the first Malaysia Cup was held, and Soo Kim Lan was discovered by famous American journalist, broadcaster and film producer, Lowell Thomas.

Insulin was discovered. The Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) established, and Mahatma Gandhi was imprisoned for peaceful resistance in 1922. Hitler was jailed, talking movies invented, Time magazine founded, Prince Albert (later King George VI) and Lady Elizabeth Rowes-Lyon got married, and Soo Kim Lan graduated on August 27, 1923 as the first woman to break the male monopoly of medics in Malaya.

The first Winter Olympics was held in France. India conferred citizenship on Americans born to Indian citizens in the United States, the first flight around the world took place, and The Malaya Command (Garrison to defend British Malaya in Kuala Lumpur, Penang, Taiping, Seremban and Singapore) was formed in 1924. The first television transmitter was invented, and *The Great Gatsby* and Adolf Hitler's *Mein Kampf* were published in 1925. Harry Houdini died, Agatha Christie went missing, Winnie the Pooh published, and the first liquid fuel rocket was fired in 1926. Lindbergh became the first man to take a solo transatlantic flight, The British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) was founded, and Soo Kim Lan moved to Kuala Lumpur as Malaya's first woman doctor in 1927.

Chiang Kai-Shek became China's leader, the first Oxford English Dictionary published, Penicillin discovered, Bubble gum and Mickey Mouse introduced, the first Australian Grand Prix held, and Amelia Earhart became the first woman (Passenger) to fly across the Atlantic Ocean. Vatican City became an independent state and the first Academy Awards were held in 1929. After years of indulgence and excess in all areas from entertainment, fashion, cars and art to innovations in

entertainment, fashion, cars and art to innovations in electrical goods, the stock market crashed on October 24, 1929 and triggered what is today known as the Great Depression.

The unassuming exemplar

Young, vibrant and full of life, Kim Lan greeted the 1920s and its epic developments as a studious college student who busied herself in her studies, charity works and church services. Even while she kept her nose to the grindstone, authorities in the field were already recognising her potential as a heartening leader. Upon her graduation from medical college, the news media started taking serious notice of her rise within her chosen field of occupation.



The spur to be of service

Soo Kim Lan passed her mid-year exams on April 4, 1923 with distinctions in Medicine and Midwifery (The Singapore Free Press and Mercantile Advertiser (1884-1942), 5 April 1923, p.12). Later the same year, she passed her final exam on 27 August 1923 to graduate from The King Edward VII College of Medicine. She commenced her medical career soon after, at the Singapore General Hospital where she worked and trained under Dr J.S. English, in Gynaecology and Midwifery. About a year into her career, Dr Soo Kim Lan was requested to assist Singapore's Orchard Road Police Department through supplying medical evidence for a case connected with a fatal shootout. Her credibility

as a medical doctor grew rapidly from thereon. She became known as the *go-to* medical expert for court case inquiries requiring medical evidence. All through her career at the Singapore General Hospital, Dr Soo Kim Lan served charitable causes and gave sermons. Adding to her busy schedules, she actively served her alma mater. In appreciation of her unsparing efforts, she became the first woman medic to be honoured by members of the Medical Union in Singapore (The Straits Times, 5 September 1923, p.11). As she received greater media acclaim, her honest, forthright opinions began to reflect her central priorities, firmly laid in public healthcare and social wellbeing.

The succeeding news clippings are presented in chronological order to review and explore greater insights into Kim Lan's journey in the 1920s from a young college woman and missionary to a reputable expert in the medical field and the first Malayan Chinese woman doctor who faced all conventions in her stride and refined them in the interest of the public healthcare and wellbeing.

Graphic Details of a Constable's Crime.

Mr. F. G. Boarne held his enquiry yesterday into the circumstances attending the death of a Malay police constable, who was shot in the Orchard Police Station shortly after midnight on the 15th instant by a Pathan constable, named Nobi Hassan. On the table in Mr. Bourne's court were gruesome exhibits in the shape of a biood-stanted charge book and pen holder, as well as the rifle and cartriage with which the shooting was done.

Insp. Johnson conducted the enquiry and after medical evidence was given by Dr. Soo Kim San of the General Hospital he examined Insp. Uphill, second Inspector stationed at Orchard Road police station, who said that about 9.45 p.m. on the 15th instant he went to the charge room and saw police constable 703 standing there with his coat undone. Witness asked him what was the matter, and on making enquiries found that when P.C. 869 (deceased) called 703 to go on

The Assizes.

Murder Charge Against Pathan Policeman.

The trial of Nati Hassan, a Pathan policeman who is alleged to have murdered another policeman at Orchard Road police station was commenced at the Singapore Assizes, this morning, before Mr. Justice Barrett-Lennard. The accused was represented by Mr. Richard Page. Relating the circumstances, Mr. N. H. P. Whitley, D.P.P., said that the offence took place on May 15 at Orchard Road police station, where the deceased and the accused, both of whom were police-constables, were stationed. On the day in question deceased was on duty as an orderly, and at 9.30 p.m. he went upstairs to call the constables who were due for duty. Among these constables was the accused, who apparently had an idea that he was not yet due for duty because he protested, and a quarrel ensued between the accused and the deceased. It appeared that the deceased man struck the accused in the face, and made his nose bleed, and the accused retaliated by throwing a clog at the deceased. Downstairs Inspector Uphill noticed that the accused's nose was bleeding, and, after learning what had happened, told the accused that he would be reported for disobedience. At 10 p.m.

the accused went on duty as sentry in front of the police station, and, in accordance with routine, he took over ten rounds of ammunition from the constable who had preceded him. Nothing happened until 12.25, when the accused was seen to come into the charge-room, point his rifle at the deceased, fire a shot, and walk out. The deceased was stooping over a book at the time, and the bullet penetrated his law neck, hung and solite.


While some might argue that she fought or defied conventions from the start of her career, the preceding collated manuscripts of her journey over the 1920s show that Kim Lan demonstrated great respect for the conventions of her time. She worked hard to refine them to the extent that proper precedence was given to public healthcare and social welfare, both themes of which, she devoted her lifetime to serve, not only as a doctor and an unfailing philanthropist, but also through her contributions to the missionary society. Given that the 1920s was a decade when very few women pursued their chosen field of profession, Kim Lan showed by

example, as a young Asian woman, that each individual possesses the oft neglected choice to step out of one's personal boundaries and beyond expected social roles to realise one's own, unique dreams.

One of the most profound perspectives she held tenaciously as a young woman in her twenties was that we can all choose to view our mistakes as gifts, and be grateful for them as lessons that we can use as opportunities for wisdom and growth.

Memoirs of an unconventional matriarch

This chapter comprises an anthology of unrevealed stories and vignettes about the only woman we know as Malaya's Grand Lady of Medicine. It is dedicated towards drawing inspiration from a deeper understanding about Dr Soo Kim Lan's life and times. Each private memoir rekindles forgotten impressions for those who shared similar memories, and invites others to bask in a treasury of historical highlights, bequethed to us by the respective individuals' reminiscences.

We all have a childhood dream, a special niche we envisioned for ourselves as children, a unique place that only we can fill, something we were, or may still be inspired to do, which no one else can do. For Kim Lan, this was to become a physician, and the best that she could be. She pursued every opportunity to fulfil what she believed was her true calling in life. Despite countless obstacles that came with times when young women did not leave home without a chaperon, let

alone participate in public life, she forged ahead to embrace her childhood dream. Once realised, she steadily demonstrated genuine humility that expressed honour and privilege for her chosen vocation in life. She never once, took the realization of her childhood dream for granted, but from the moment she entered into practice, she entrusted her life to adhering to the physician's pledge.

Today, it is in this pledge that we found her exuberant devotion towards public health and wellbeing, which continues to shine, for the greater good of humanity.

Physician's Pledge. (Adapted from the Declaration of Geneva, 1948).

I make these promises solemnly, freely and upon my honour:

- I pledge to consecrate my life in service of humanity;
- I give my teachers, respect and gratitude, which is their due:
- I will practice my profession with conscience and dignity, and give utmost priority to my patients' health;
- I will do my best to honour the noble traditions of the medical profession and treat my peers, as my brothers and sisters;
- I will not allow prejudice, including considerations of religion, nationality, race, party politics, and social standing, to intervene between my duty and my patient;

• I will maintain utmost respect for human life, and will not use my medical knowledge contrary to the laws of humanity, even under threat.

While every effort was made to retain the distinct voice of the ensuing narratives, unclear expressions were re-scripted for coherence and clarity. These personal accounts represent two generations' worth of insights on Dr Soo Kim Lan's notable, yet largely overlooked private life. She accomplished so much in her lifetime that it is intriguing to find little or no prior study on the life and times of a local legend who lived through World War I (1914-1918) and World War II (1939-1945). This observation adds to the value of this work, to help fill a gap in knowledge, and strengthen it with true accounts of those who were closest to her. As you explore each narrative, it is hoped that you meld them with the chronicles of central media events put forward in the preceding chapters.
