Law of Massachusetts.

AN ACT—Providing for the payment of
part of the State Debt, and for other
purposes.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Rep-
resentatives, in General Court assembled,
and by the authority of the same.* That the Treasurer
of this Commonwealth, be and he is hereby direct-
ed and empowered to pay on the first day of July
next, one fifth part of the debt due from this Com-
monwealth on notes issued in conformity to an act
passed the twenty-second day of June, eighteen
hundred and three, entitled "An act to provide for
the payment of part of the State Debt," in addition to
the interest which shall then have accrued thereon.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That the Treas-
urer shall issue new notes to the several holders of
the notes aforesaid, similar to those issued under
the said act, passed the twenty second day of June,
eighteen hundred and three, mutatis mutandis, for
the balance which shall be due to them, after de-
ducting and paying off one fifth part as aforesaid;
and the one fifth part of the State debt as aforesaid,
shall cease to bear interest after the first day of Ju-
ly next.

SECT. 3. *Be it further enacted* That all the mon-
ey now in the hands of the Treasurer, or which
shall hereafter come into his hands, be appropri-
ated to the purposes aforesaid, excepting such sums
as may be necessary for defraying the expenses of
government and such as have been or may be oth-
erwise appropriated by law.

SECT. 4. *Be it further enacted,* That the Treas-
urer of this Commonwealth, be, and he is hereby
authorized and directed to borrow of the Presi-
dent and Directors of the Union or Boston Banks,
on the term referred in the charters of said Banks,
any sum, not exceeding one hundred thousand
dollars, which may be necessary for carrying into
effect the purposes of this act; and to repay the
sum he may so borrow as soon as money suffi-
cient for that purpose, not otherwise appropriated shall
be received into the Treasury.

Law of the United States.

EXTRACT—FROM

AN ACT, passed the 17th March, 1808, and
approved by the President.

SECT. 3. *AND be it further enacted,* That the Sec-
retary of the Treasury be and he is hereby
authorized to cause to be erected and placed bea-
cons and buoys at the following places, to wit: two
beacons and three buoys near the entrance of Spruce
harbour; three buoys, one on Garnet rock, one on Bass
rock, and one on Deck's flats, and two beacons on the
stone muscle bed, near Plymouth Harbour; three ad-
ditional buoys before the harbour of Nantucket, and a
buoy or leading mark on the island of Tuckanuck, in
the state of Massachusetts—three buoys at or near the
entrance of Connecticut river, and three buoys to be
placed at or near the entrance of Great Egg Harbour

ALREADY has more than one tribute been feelingly paid to the memory of Dr. West; but it seems proper, that the paper, which was adorned by some of his last pious labors, should contain some memorial of his virtue. The following, though a very imperfect, is yet a sincere, and we believe an unexaggerated delineation of his character.

The character of Dr. West, was distinguished by no dazzling display of brilliancy, but for discriminating judgment and solid sense. His religious instructions were always heard with effect, for they came warm from the heart, and were delivered in the genuine simplicity of the sacred truth. It was peculiarly his praise, that he never preached himself, but Jesus Christ. He never sought by an ostentatious parade of eloquence to draw his hearers from the contemplation of truth to the admiration of the man. He felt the genuine power of religion, and he wished to inspire it pure and unmingled in others. He delighted in dispensing the comforts of the gospel. He had himself tasted of the cup of sorrow; and when he saw others compelled to share it, he listened to impart to them the soothing consolations which he had enjoyed. The gospel, under his hands, never appeared like a cold, unaffected system of morality;—it warmed his heart, it sanctified his life, and he preached it with the earnestness, charity and zeal of a faithful minister. His domestic life was remarkable for the mild and humble virtues. Those who have been wont to visit him in his hours of retirement, can best appreciate his private worth. They could then see the image of holiness reflected from his amiable and exemplary life. The instructions he was always ready to impart, were mingled with pious affection; and the reproofs which vice in every form drew from him, were softened by paternal tenderness and love. In the discharge of his parochial duties he was peculiarly faithful and conscientious. It was here that the warmth of his zeal and the tenderness of his affection were eminently displayed;—it was here that his familiarity and powerfully impressed the truths which he had enforced from his pulpit. He knew enough of the human heart to accommodate himself to the varying characters of men. He knew how to subdue the prejudices and weakness of the ignorant, to dispel the doubts of the desponding, and to answer the calls of the converted, by the dignified firmness, though with the winning gentleness of a minister of Grace.

Do we not here recognize the character of the true christian, and of the genuine servant of the gospel. Here indeed is nothing attract worldly applause nothing perhaps that the world would call great;—But such are those, on whom heaven smiles with peculiar complacency—for em are prepared the white robes of purity and blessedness. They have served their Maker in his earth temple, and they shall stand before his throne in "the temple made without hands, in the kingdom of their Meemer.

name which is better than rubies;" and his "memory will be justly blessed." In this capital, where he spent the last 19 years, but one sentiment is felt, but one opinion entertained respecting his professional and personal worth. In his neighborhood he was most peculiarly regarded and beloved: in his parish, he was all which his parishioners could desire; in his family, he was a most precious companion and counsellor. Few men die more extensively valued, probably no Pastor was ever more tenderly endeared to his flock. Such was the interest he manifested in all their concerns, such his peculiar attentions to them in all circumstances, that in the hearts of young and old he holds the place of a father and a friend.

His literary reputation can be but transiently noticed in this brief and rapid sketch. Several occasional discourses, and many moral and religious essays, from his pen, are before the public. While they evince a strength of reasoning, and accuracy of discrimination which ensures them a value with the learned, they possess that winning charm of the pathetic and persuasive, which makes them a manual of inestimable value to his friends, and an auxiliary of much importance to general improvement.

For several years past his health has been much impaired; and for many months, he has been wholly confined to his chamber and couch. He has been exercised with much pain, and at times with severe distress, during this long season of lingering, and through all has evidenced the unwavering faith and unflinching hopes of a genuine servant of Jesus Christ. Those who have seen and heard him in his sickness, can never forget how like a saint he looked, how like a sage he spoke. And though the radiant composure of benevolence and piety, which beamed from his countenance, is dimmed, though the mild accents of resignation and truth which flowed from his tongue, are silenced by death, they leave for their consolation, that he now enjoys a happier society, and aids their pious devotions. While every acquaintance feelingly exclaims, "I am distressed for thee, MY BROTHER, very precious hast thou been unto me," let this also be their purpose and their prayer: "Let me live the life of the RIGHTEOUS, that my last end may be peace like HIS."

The funeral of Dr. Wier was attended on Wednesday afternoon.—The corpse, preceded by the Clergy of this town and vicinity, and followed by the mourning relatives, was conveyed from the house of the deceased to the Meeting-house; which was suitably dressed in mourning on the occasion;—and where a very crowded auditory was assembled.—The funeral performances, were introduced, by the anthem, "Samuel the Priest, gave up the ghost, and all Israel mourned," &c. sung by an excellent and numerous choir.—The Rev. Dr. ELLIOT addressed the throne of Grace in a very fervent prayer.—"Hark from the tombs," &c. was then sung;—A very appropriate and consoling sermon, by the Rev. Dr. LATHROP, from 2 Timothy i. 12. "For I know whom I have believed, and I am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day;" was then delivered.—The concluding prayer, by the Rev. Dr. ELLIOT; and the performance of the piece of Music, "Vital spark of heavenly flame," executed in a manner, we venture to say, never before exceeded, if ever equalled, in this town, closed the religious rites in the House.—A procession was then formed, consisting of the whole church and congregation, male and female, from "Henceforward to hoary age," the Rev. Clergy, of

Champagny's audacious Letter.

WE are happy in learning that a leading democratic Member of Congress from *Massachusetts* has expressed his pointed indignation at the audacious letter which the French Emperor ordered his Minister, *Champagny*, to send to Gen. *Armistrong*, and which has recently been communicated to Congress: And farther, that of the whole Representation of the People of the United States, in Congress, there are but six or seven who do not join with the above member in execrating the instrument, and opposing its infamous dictatorial spirit. We find but one paper in the United States (the *Aurora*) so vile, as to defend the insulting demand of *Bonaparte*, contained in *Champagny's* letter.—On the contrary we find it thus handled in a leading *New-York* administration paper:

FROM OUR WATCH-TOWER.

The aspect of this (*Champagny's*) letter is so terrible, that he who is not half consumed by hatred to *England*, and half corrupted by French seduction cannot look at it without feeling a raging indignation.—"That it should come to this!"—But twenty-five years an independent nation, and called upon, with the oily tongue of the Devil, to surrender our sovereignty and independence to the GREAT TYRANT, and to become what *Naples*, what the *Italian States*, what *Holland*, *Switzerland*, *Germany*, *Portugal*, *Spain*, *Prussia*, and all the European continental nations, but *Russia*, are—the *slaves of France*. What tell us that we are abused by *England*, and under that pretext rob us of our freedom? If this insult be not flung back at the teeth of the tyrant, then are we base and contemptible, and shall richly merit the very yoke he is preparing for us. Yes, we know that we are wronged by *England*, and without the insolent and degrading interference of the tyrant, we will ourselves redress our own wrongs.—But has not the same preliminary language been held out to those numerous nations which French intrigue and gold have first corrupted, and French force has subsequently subdued? What said *Junot* in his proclamation on entering the city of *Lisbon*?

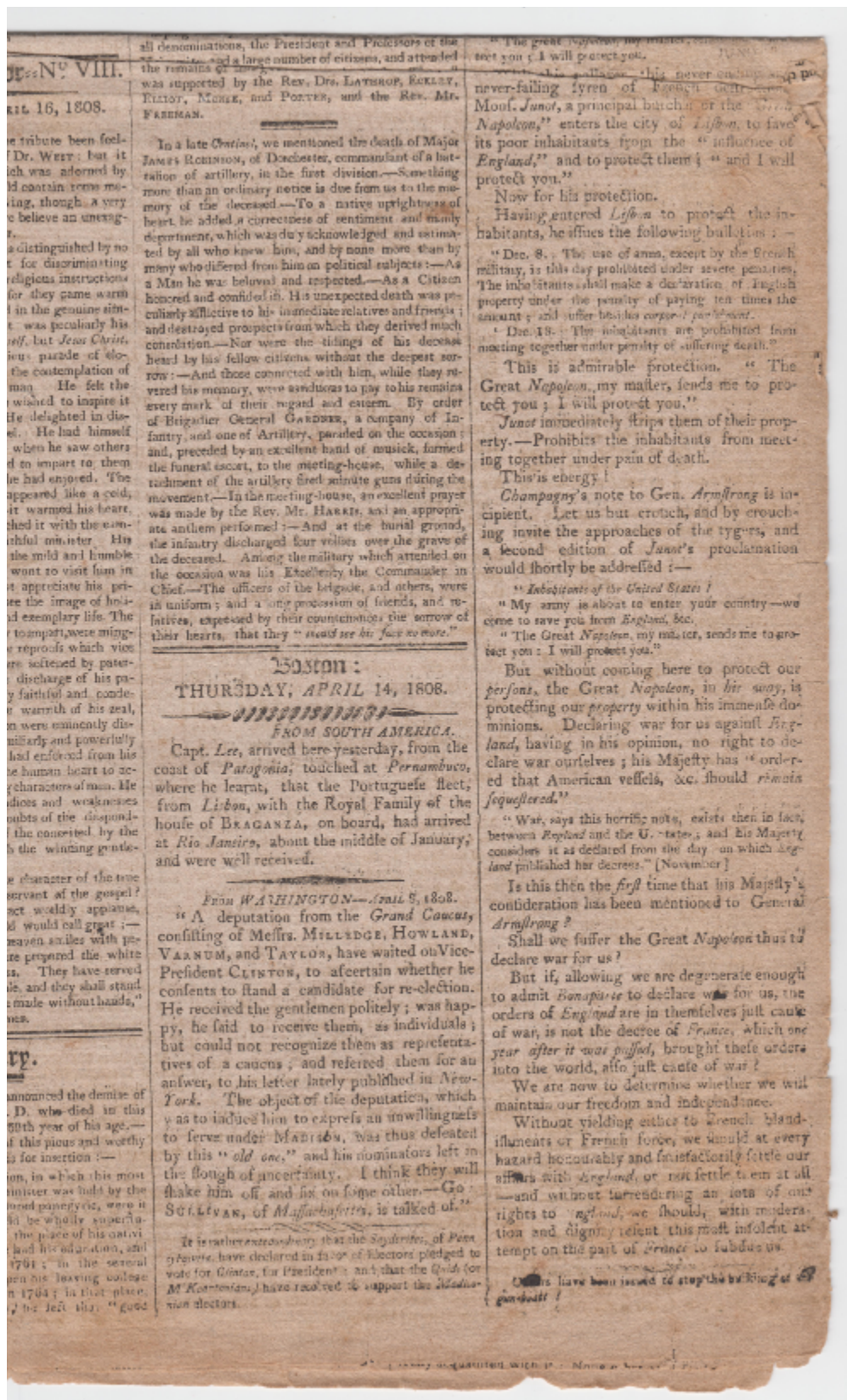
"Inhabitants of *Lisbon*!

IN SENATE, APRIL 2 1808.

TRIAL OF MR. SMITH.

THE Senate resumed the consideration of the Resolution, reported by Mr. Adams, to expel John Smith. Twenty-one additional depositions were read, to discredit the testimony of Elias Glover; and thirty-three in support of his character.

Messrs. Key and Harper, Counsel for Smith, read other depositions to invalidate other testimony against Smith.

April 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th, the trial proceeded.—A great number of depositions to invalidate and substantiate testimony, was adduced. On the 5th Mr. Key spoke four hours in defence of Mr. Smith; and on the 6th Mr. Harper, in a speech of about three hours, finished the defense of the accused.—On the 6th a motion to postpone the consideration of the report and resolution until the next day, was negatived; but afterwards, on motion of Mr. Anderson, who declared his inability to decide on the subject until the next day, the further consideration was postponed until then. In the course of the remarks which fell from Mr. Giles, he observed, that he considered Elias Glover as so completely discredited, that he desired no further information to make up his opinion.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, MAR. 30, 1808.

SECRET JOURNAL.—CLOSED DOORS.

Mr. RANDOLPH moved, that the President be requested to inform the House of the dates of the *extradit*, and copies of two letters of Mr. Champagny, referred to in some of the documents accompanying the President's message. The motion was agreed to.—Yeas 93. Nays 24.

THURSDAY, MARCH 31, 1808.

The doors being closed, Mr. Randolph informed the House, that the Committee had waited on the President for the information desired yesterday, and received an intimation that the President being indisposed, could not give them a personal interview; and that they left the request with his private secretary.

Mr. Randolph moved the injunction of secrecy on the President's message, and papers, with the exception of the letter of Gen. Armstrong, to Mr. Madison, of Dec. 27, 1807, be taken off. The question, *Shall this motion be considered?* was Negatived, Yeas 42. Nays 77.

The YEAS were, Messrs. Bibb, Champion, Chittenden, Clinton jun. Cobb, Culpepper, Dana, Davenport, Duval, Elliot, Ely, Gardener, Gardner, Garnett, Gray, Harris, Hoge, Jenkins, Key, Lewis, Lyon, Macdon, Masters, Milnor, Moseley, Mumford, Pitkin, Quincy, Randolph, J. Mr. Randolph then moved for the injunction of secrecy to be taken off, so far as relates

Mr. Randolph moved to reject this bill.—A spirited debate ensued.—And finally, on motion of Mr. Epper, the bill was recommitted; with instructions to the committee to report on the expediency of abolishing the office of superintendent of public buildings.

THE STANDING ARMY

Bill, was again taken up.—Mr. Stanford spoke an hour and an half against it, quoting various speeches of '98, made by Gallatin, Farnam, and others, against Standing Armies; and also the sentiments of President Jefferson against such a military force.—He concluded by observing, that the future historian would be perplexed to find any distinctions between the two administrations (Adams and Jefferson's).—Armies, navies, patronage, and taxes, though at first exploded, now appeared to be as much encouraged as ever.—*N. B.* This Mr. Stanford is a good North-Carolina democrat.

Messrs. Macon and Blount, though they voted against the '98 army, said they should vote for this; Mr. Barwell also spoke in favor of the bill; and Mr. Randolph against it. Mr. Sloan said, there were not half the reasons for raising an army now, as in '98.—No question was taken.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 6, 1808.

The discussion of the new Standing Army bill occupied the whole day.—Messrs. Tallmadge, Southard, and G. W. Campbell supported; and Messrs. Maury, Sloan and Dana opposed, it.—But no question was taken.

THURSDAY, APRIL 7, 1808.

The committee appointed to report on unfinished business, and the time when Congress might adjourn, reported, that thirty bills remained to be acted upon; but that Congress might adjourn the 25th April. It is probable Congress will rise about the 1st May.

THE ADDITIONAL ARMY

Bill, after another long and warm debate, passed the House 96 to 16.—*The bill was returned to the Senate, amended.*—It contemplates raising about 6000 additional troops of the line; and we think will eventually pass.

An Act, in addition to Acts, regulating the storage, safe-keeping, and transportation of Gun-Powder, within the town of Boston.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same,* That no ship or other vessel, on board of which Gun-Powder shall be laden, shall lay at any wharf in the town of Boston, nor within two hundred yards of any wharf within said town.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That when any Gun-Powder shall be landed in the town of Boston, from on board any ship or other vessel, laying in the harbour of Boston, the same shall be brought to, and landed at Tiltson's Wharf; and shall be immediately carried from the place of landing, to the public Powder House, on Pine Island, in the town of Roxbury, either in boats, or in a waggon or waggons, cart or carts, or other carriage, closely covered with leather or canvas, and without any iron on any part thereof, and which shall have been approved by the Firewards of the town of Boston, and marked in capital letters, with the words **APPROVED POWDER CARRIAGE**; and that when any Gun-Powder shall be intended to be laden on board any ship or other vessel, in the harbour of Boston, the same shall not be brought through any part of the town of Boston by land, unless the same be brought in a waggon, cart, or other carriage, made and approved as aforesaid; nor, unless such Gun-Powder be brought to Tiltson's Wharf aforesaid, and be thence carried directly on board the ship or other vessel, on board which the same is to be laden.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That no person or persons, not in public service, or on military duty, shall keep, have or possess, in any house, warehouse, shop, or other building, nor in any street, lane, ally or passage-way, yard or cellar, nor in any waggon cart, or other carriage, nor on any wharf, nor on board any ship, or other vessel, nor in any place within the town of Boston, Gun-Powder, in any quantity exceeding five pounds, in any way or manner otherwise than as by this act, is permitted and allowed.

And be it further enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for any two or more of the Firewards of the town of Boston, to enter any building or other place in the town of Boston, to search for Gun Powder, which they may have reason to suppose to be concealed or kept contrary to the provision of this act, first having obtained a search warrant therefor according to law.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That an act entitled "An act in addition to these several acts now in force, which relate to the carting and transporting of Gun Powder through the streets of the town of Boston, and the storage thereof in the town town," passed the twenty-sixth day of June, in the year seven hundred and ninety-two, be, and the same hereby is repealed. And also that the first third a fourth sections of an act, entitled "An act to provide for the storing and safe keeping of Gun Powder in the town of Boston, and to prevent damage from the same, passed the nineteenth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and one, and the said sections hereby are repealed. And be it further enacted, That all actions, suits, processes, or forfeitures, already commenced or incurred, shall be commenced and prosecuted according to said laws, the said repeal notwithstanding.

Sec. 10. And be it further enacted, That this act shall be in force from and after the passing thereof; and that shall be the duty of the Firewards aforesaid cause the same to be immediately published two or more of the Boston newspapers, and continue the publication thereof six weeks successively.

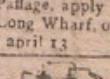
