



Charlton




claimed rights to Hawaiian lands

that he was being treated unfairly.




Paulet then wrote  
a letter to King Kamehameha III,  
demanding an immediate audience.




Paulet got the King's response  
letter and was not satisfied so he  
threatened to attack Honolulu.




To prevent the attack, the King allowed Paulet to occupy Hawaii unlawfully. Paulet found and burned all Hae Hawaii.



Word was sent to Britain of the  
great injustice and Hawaii  
waited to see what they would do.



Upon hearing of the injustice, Britain sent Admiral Richard Thomas to restore the Hawaiian Kingdom to King Kamehameha III.



The Kingdom was restored and on  
this day, July 31<sup>st</sup>, 178 years ago,  
our hae Hawaii was raised again.



Hawaii rejoiced! King Kamehameha III declared the day of restoration a national holiday and coined the phrase, "Ua mau ke ea o ka aina i ka pono."

The Sovereignty of the land is maintained in righteousness.

ua hana ino ia maila oia.




A kakau akula keia kapena i ka

me ka moi, o Kauikeaouli.




**Huhu aela ke kapena i ka pane ana

o Honolulu."**




**No ka makemake ole o ka moi e kaua,
