Known for morphing everyday objects into huge pop-psychedelic resin sculptures, Kusama set the standard for conceptual art in the 1960s at the height of abstract expressionism. Today, at age 80, she has planted her largest outdoor exhibition at the Fairchild: "It's an extraordinary combination of nature and artifice," says Louise Neri, a Gagosian Gallery director who helped arrange the exhibition. "The baroque flowers, bright lagoon mounds, and ebullient pumpkins create a truly original and vibrant urgency in the natural 'gallery' of open grass." And the December 5 opening is timely: Art Basel Miami begins December 3. "Yayoi Kusama at Fairchild" runs through May 30.
