
Why Do My Eyes Look Different?

WHY DO THIS?

We all have different shaped eyes. Unfortunately, some of our little ones are teased for the shape of their eyes. What starts as a joke can quickly escalate to bullying and impacts our little one's self confidence and self worth. Don't wait for your little one to tease or be teased to celebrate eyes that are different!

WHAT TO SAY?

1. Explore and discuss the different eye shapes

" Do the eyes look the same or different to you?" "Which eyes are big, small, almond-shaped or hooded?"

2. Talk about how some kids are teased for the shape of their eyes.

3. Give them phrases to use when they get teased.

" My eyes help me see. They're what make 'me' me." "Your eyes are different too. They're what make 'you' you."

- 1. "All Asians have similar eyes." Nope. Our eye shapes are not always linked to our ethnicity.
- 2. Be aware if you label a person merely by the shape of their eyes. Don't ignore it either if you hear someone else do so. Call it out. Your kids are learning from you.

WHAT TO DO?

- Draw their attention to all the different eyes we see in media. "She has almond eyes. He has hooded eyes."
