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Ayn Rand's Legacy

Jennifer Burns's Goddess of the Market: Ayn Rand and the American Right* (2009) is published by Oxford University Press. An excerpt from the book (and other material) may be found at Dr. Burns's website, www.jenniferburns.org. The other Rand biography from 2009 is Anne C. Heller's Ayn Rand and the World She Made* (2009, Doubleday). Both books were reviewed by Jonathan Chait in The New Republic (9/19/09). Whittaker Chambers's 1957 review of Atlas Shrugged ("Big Sister Is Watching You") may be found in the archives of the National Review website. Chambers's 1952 autobiography, Witness* (Regnery), was dismissed by many critics as too God-besotted, but praised in the Saturday Review by John Dos Passos, who claimed: "Among the testimonials of the suffering spirit of man I think the book will stand high, somewhere between Dostoevsky's The Possessed and the narratives of the adventures of the light within like Pilgrim's Progress."

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Souls in Transition

Christian Smith's *Souls in Transition: The Religious and Spiritual Lives of Emerging Adults** (2009) is published by Oxford, as was his earlier book, *Soul Searching: The Religious and Spiritual Lives of American Teenagers** (2005). 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Religion and Knowledge

Dallas Willard's Knowing Christ Today: Why We Can Trust Spiritual Knowledge* is published by HarperOne. During our interview, Dr. Willard mentioned that he is at work on a longer, more technical book on the reality of religious knowledge; it is tentatively titled The Disappearance of Moral Knowledge. Other books by Dallas Willard include The Spirit of the Disciplines: Understanding How God Changes Lives* (HarperCollins, 1988), The Divine Conspiracy: Rediscovering Our Hidden Life in God* (HarperCollins, 1998), and The Great Omission: Reclaiming Jesus' Essential Teachings on Discipleship* (HarperCollins, 2006). An essay by Dr. Willard examining some of the 20th century debates about the nature of knowledge ("The World Well Won: Husserl's Epistemic Realism One Hundred Years Later") is posted on his website, www.dwillard.org.
