Andrew Davison's Participation in God: A Study in Christian Doctrine and Metaphysics (2019) is published by Cambridge University Press. Hans Boersma's Heavenly Participation: The Weaving of a Sacramental Tapestry (Eerdmans, 2011) presents an introduction to participation in the context of related philosophical/theological themes. A notable essay on this subject by a former guest on the Journal, D. C. Schindler, is "What's the Difference? On the Metaphysics of Participation in Plato, Plotinus, and Aquinas" (Nova et Vetera, English Edition, Vol. 5, No. 3 [2007]). See also Jacob Holsinger Sherman, "The Genealogy of Participation" in The Participatory Turn: Spirituality, Mysticism, Religious Studies, edited by Jorge N. Ferrer and Jacob H. Sherman (State University of New York Press, 2008). In his book, Partakers of the Divine: Contemplation and the Practice of Philosophy (Fortress Press, 2014), Sherman describes how participation describes the practice of philosophy and provides the means to restore the essential unity between philosophy, theology, and spirituality. The theme of union with Christ is central in the discussion of participation by J. Todd Billings in Calvin, Participation, and the Gift: The Activity of Believers in Union with Christ (Oxford University Press, 2008).
