

TITLE: A NAUGHTY RABBIT LEVEL: E



INTRODUCE THE BOOK

Before students begin to read, make them familiar with the important ideas, plot, new language structures, and new words in the book. Prepare them for a successful first reading of the story. You might say:

- "This book is about a rabbit named Mr. Naughty. He gets out of his cage and does some naughty things."
- "Turn to pages 2 and 3. There's Mr. Naughty. Let's turn the page and see what happens. 'Look! The cage door is open!'"
- "Now turn the page and see what he finds to chew on. Look! Mr. Naughty chewed the flip-flop. Then Mr. Naughty hopped away. What two letters would you expect at the beginning of then? Find then."
- "Turn the pages to see what else he chews on."
- "Turn back to the beginning of the book to read about Mr. Naughty."

READ THE STORY

Encourage each student to read the entire book in a soft reading voice. Listen to students' reading and prompt for and/or praise strategic processing. Refer to the Level E Prompting Guide for a list of desired reading behaviors and suggested actions to take.

DISCUSS THE STORY

Invite students to talk about the story. Encourage students to make connections to their own experiences and/or other stories they have read. Below are some discussion ideas.

- Discuss how Mr. Naughty was being naughty.
- Have students share their own experiences with rabbits.

FOLLOW-UP TEACHING

Based on your observations of students' reading, select one or two teaching points that will be most helpful to all students. You might:

- Have students locate the word then. Make the word then with magnetic letters. Show students how this starts like the.
- Review how they can check if they are right (look at the picture, read to see if it sounds right, check the first/last letter).

EXTEND KNOWLEDGE OF WORDS AND LETTERS

In this lesson, students will blend word parts together.

Steps:

- 1. Tell students they are going to play a listening game.
- 2. Say, "I'm going to say the first part of a word, and then I'll say the last part (st-and). I can put those parts together to make a word (st-and, stand)."
- 3. Repeat with th-ink, br-ing, st-op, fl-ake, pl-ot, and ch-ip.
- 4. Place the collection of pictures (brick, grape, shoe, smile, swim) in the pocket chart.
- 5. Say, "I'm going to say the first part and the last part of the word, and you point to the picture that goes with what I am saying."
- 6. Say the two parts of the words, and have students find the matching picture.

SUPPORTING ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

Consider what additional challenges the lesson might present for English language learners.

- Make sure that students can name all of the objects that Mr. Naughty chews on.
- You may want to practice several language structures, such as, Yum! Yum!
