If anyone was born to be a bear artist then it is Pam Howells. During a bout of childhood illness and being confined to bed, enterprising Pam decided to pass the hours away by making a teddy

bear. Little did she know then the impact this would have on her

Always artistic, Pam studied at Art College and after passing her exams at the age of 18 got a job as 'Assistant Designer' for H G Stone at the Chiltern Toy Works in Pontypool, South Wales. Her capabilities were tested early on when Chief Designer, the very experienced Madeline Biggs took

It was not long before the first Chiltern toy designed by Pam Howells was launched in 1962. Moving away from the traditional Hugmee, a staple of Chiltern at the time, Pam created an artificial silk teddy bear with light brown head, inset white muzzle, finished with a black plastic nose and stitched mouth. He had amber and black safety eyes, integrally dressed as a Bandsman with gold braiding to his chest and was seated on a red painted metal trike with rubber edged wheels.

Initially made in a 28cm (11") size, a larger 43cm (17") version followed plus pixies, dogs and a Sooty on wheels too. They all had a pull chord which enabled you to drive the wheels and propel the bear to pedal faster and faster.

played. Pam worked during a period of intense change in the toy market and at Chiltern, with the takeover by Chad Valley and the eventual loss of the single Chiltern label. After 10 years at Chiltern, Pam's sculptor husband was transferred to Lincolnshire by his firm, so Pam went too; leaving behind many superb memories of what was in the 1960's the largest producer of such

Bear making was Pam's love so it was not long before she set up a studio near her home with a business partner (Ann) creating teddy bears under the 'Pamela Ann Designs' label, mov-

ing on to work in a solo capacity as 'Bears That Are Special' by Pam Howells. Always sought after, her high quality, traditional skills have been applied to create shop specials and limited editions for Teddy Bears of Witney, Peggotty and The Teddy House to name but a few. Publisher Mayfield commissioned Pam to create 'Harold' teddy bear, which was manufactured in a soft brown plush and given away as part of a magazine subscription deal.

Pam's original works are exquisitely made in quality English and German mohair or art silk mainly focusing on larger teds, there have been the odd smaller creation down to miniature versions at only ¾"! They have glass eyes and claw stitching into the paws reminiscent

solid shape with dropped outer edges. Occasionally Pam likes to dress her bears in vintage style or use aged fabrics in keeping with the style, sometimes adding a small brooch, ribbon or coronet of flowers.

One of her most popular recent works under her own name has been a replica Chiltern Hugmee, faithful to those marketed by Chiltern in the 1950's in blond mohair. Pam has also created pastel limited editions for the Teddy Bears of Witney catalogue.

An intensely private person Pam has never been one to promote herself and she is happy that the
