Safe Cleanup After Pesticide Use

KEY POINTS:

- Pesticide residues can remain on skin, clothing and equipment after a task is completed.
- Wear the appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) when cleaning pesticide-contaminated clothing or equipment.
- Thoroughly clean yourself after pesticide use.


Pesticides can be harmful


- Pesticides are an effective way to kill pests on plants and crops.
- But exposure to pesticides can also harm you or your family members.
- Pesticide residues can remain on skin, clothing and equipment long after a task is completed.
- This may result in:
 - exposure to you or family members
 - clogging, corrosion or other damage to equipment
 - harm to the environment
- That's why it's important to thoroughly clean up after each pesticide use.

When you take a break

Here are some steps to take each time you take a break from working with pesticides:

- 1. Don't rub your eyes or touch your face or bare skin with pesticide-contaminated gloves or clothing.
- 2. Wash the outside of your gloves with soap and water before you take them off.
- 3. Rinse your shoes or boots with soap and water.
- **4.** Avoid touching the outside of your protective clothing with your bare hands.
- **5.** Wash your hands and face with <u>soap</u> and water before you eat, drink, smoke, chew gum, use the toilet or put on makeup.
- 6. Be careful where you walk or sit, because pesticide residues on your shoes or clothing can rub off.
- 7. Don't use the same cleanup tools you use to wash off pesticides for anything else.

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When you finish work

- **1.** Wash the outside of your gloves and boots with soap and water.
- **2.** Take off your other <u>protective clothing</u> while your gloves are still on. Inspect it for leaks or other damage. Then remove your shoes or boots.
- **3.** Place your pesticide-contaminated clothing in a plastic bag or container, separate from your personal clothing.
- **4.** Re-wash your gloves. Take them off, inspecting them for leaks or tears. Then place them in the appropriate container.
- **5.** Wash your face, hands, neck and forearms with soap and water.
- **6.** Take a complete shower as soon as possible. Use a lot of soap, and be sure to wash your hair.

More cleanup tips

- Always wear <u>waterproof gloves</u> when washing protective clothing.
- Use mild soap or <u>detergent</u> and very warm water when washing gloves, boots and other protective clothing by hand. Wash both the inside and the outside.
- Keep pesticide-contaminated clothing separate from your other clothing and from the family wash.
- It's best to wash pesticide-contaminated clothing in a separate washing machine dedicated for that use. See your supervisor for specific instructions.

Cleaning equipment

- Mixing, loading and application equipment should be cleaned immediately after pesticide use.
- If you are uncertain how to do this, see your supervisor.
- When cleaning equipment:
 - Wear the <u>personal protective equipment (PPE)</u> specified on the pesticide label for handlers. Also wear a <u>chemical-resistant apron</u>.
 - Don't repeatedly clean equipment in the same spot unless you use a containment pad.

PESTICIDE CLEANUP DO'S AND DON'TS

DO:

- Wear the appropriate PPE when cleaning pesticidecontaminated clothing or application equipment.
- Discard pesticide-saturated clothing.
- Put on clean clothes after taking a shower at the end of the workday.

DON

- Ever wear pesticide-contaminated clothing home.
- Store excess pesticides in mixing, loading or application equipment for more than a short time.
- Put clothing that has been exposed to pesticides in the dryer. Line dry it instead.

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
