

We sign ourselves with the Cross as the celebrant says

■ In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The celebrant reads the Introit and then greets us.

How great is the love that the Father has shown to us. We were called God's children, and that is what we are, alleluia. Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! **He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**

The celebrant introduces the Eucharist and then invites us to make an act of penitence for our failures and sins.

In sorrow for our sins and with faith in his mercy, let us turn to the Lord, for with him there is mercy and plenteous redemption.

May your loving mercy come to me, O Lord, and your salvation according to your word: Lord, have mercy.

Lord, have mercy.

Your word is a lantern to my feet and a light to my path: Christ, have mercy.

Christ, have mercy.

O let your mercy come to me that I may live, for your law is my delight: Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.

May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins and bring us to everlasting life.

Amen.

We remain standing to sing the Gloria.

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly king, almighty God and Father: we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us. You are seated at the right hand of the Father, receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord. You alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, 承 in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

We remain standing as the celebrant prays the Collect.

Let us pray.

Most Holy Lord,
the ground of our beseeching,
who through your servant Julian revealed the wonder of your love:
grant that as we are created in your nature
and restored by your grace,
our wills may be so made one with yours,
that we may come to see you face to face
and gaze on you for ever;
through Jesus Christ our Lord,

We sit for the Epistle, read by Josiah English, Resident Steward of All Hallows House.

A reading from the Letter of St Paul to the Romans.

Romans 8.31-39

What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us.

Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written,

'For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.'

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

This is the word of the Lord.

We remain seated for these verses from Psalm 84, led by Shirley Buxton, Chair of the Trustees of the Friends of Julian of Norwich.

Chapter 9, LT

I am not good because of the Showings. I am only good if I love God better. If you love God better than I do because of it, it does you more good than

me. I do not say this to those who are wise, for they know it well, but I say it to you who are simple, to cheer and comfort you – for we all need comfort. For truly it was not shown to me that God loved me better than he loves the humblest soul that is in grace – for I am sure that there are many who never had either Sign or Showing, except for the ordinary teaching of Holy Church, who love God better than I do.

For if I look at myself alone, I am nothing. But when I think of myself and my fellow-Christians joined together by love, I have hope. For in this joining lies the life of all who shall be saved.

For God is all that is good, as I see it, and God has made all that is made, and God loves all that he has made. And he who loves all his fellow-Christians for God's sake, loves all that is. And he who loves thus, loves all.

We stand to sing the Gradual Hymn.

We remain standing to acclaim the Gospel.

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus said, 'I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ!

We sit after the reading of the Gospel for a short time of shared silence, then we stand for the Nicene Creed.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father.
God from God, Light from Light true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation, he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and was made man.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son: who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, ♣ and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The celebrant introduces the Intercessions.

As we celebrate the revelation of divine love to the Lady Julian of Norwich, we turn in confidence to our loving Lord and bring the needs of his people before him.

We remain standing for the Prayer of the Faithful, during which we use the response Lord, hear us:

Lord, graciously hear us.

The celebrant concludes the Intercessions with a prayer.

Lord our God,
may the life and writings of the Lady Julian
inspire us in our Christian discipleship
to grow in love of you and of our brothers and sisters,
and to rejoice in the love you have revealed and given to the world
in the Passion and Death of your Son, Jesus Christ.
We ask this through the same Christ our Lord.

Amen.

We sit for the reception of two new Companions of Julian of Norwich, who join the Convenor of the Companions in the chancel.

The Convenor of the Companions says

Spirit of God, breathe into us strong affection and such homely wisdom that, taught by your servant Julian, we may know that your hands hold all.



We present *NN* who desire to be Companions of Julian of Norwich.

The Convenor asks the new Companions

Do you undertake to follow the 'way of life of a Companion' you have received, living in the spirit of Julian?

They reply I do.

Which phrase from the *Revelations of Divine Love* have you chosen for your own spiritual journey?

Each reads their chosen phrase, and the Convenor says

May these words be a blessing to you as you journey onwards.

Presenting the CJN medal, he continues

Receive this medal and wear it as a sign of commitment and fellowship within the Companions of Julian, pledging your place among us in silence, prayer and loving service.

NN, we welcome you.

Other Companions of Julian of Norwich who are present for this Mass now come forward to the front of the church to reaffirm their own commitment, uniting as they do so with those renewing the same commitment elsewhere this Juliantide.

Let us recommit ourselves to a life of solitude, prayer, compassion and loving intercession, according to the teachings of Julian, and as Companions in communion with her and with one another, offering each other friendship, support, acceptance and care.

Companions may light a candle to reaffirm their commitment, while saying the phrase chosen as their own particular focus when joining the CJNs. After the candles have been lit, we all stand and the Companions remain at the front of the church as the celebrant introduces the Peace.

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you; look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will, who live and reign for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

The Sign of Peace is not exchanged physically.

We remain standing to sing a hymn while the altar is prepared and honoured with incense. During the hymn, a collection is taken to support the life and work of this Church and the expenses of this day: please give generously and, if you pay tax, use the enclosed Gift Aid envelope to increase the value of your gift at no extra cost to you.

The celebrant calls us to join in offering the Eucharist.

Pray, my brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father.

May the Lord accept the Sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church.

The celebrant prays the Prayer over the Gifts:

Almighty God, who by your servant Julian declared, 'It is I whom you delight in, I whom you desire': grant that through these gifts of bread and wine we who truly long for you may ever find you; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

We remain standing for the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer:

The Lord be with you and also with you.
Lift up your hearts.
We lift them to the Lord.
Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give thanks and praise.

The celebrant praises God for his goodness revealed in Julian of Norwich and all the saints, and we all sing the Sanctus and Benedictus:

We remain standing and the celebrant, calling upon the Holy Spirit, recalls the Last Supper and repeats Christ's words over the bread and wine, consecrating them as the Body and Blood of the Risen Lord, after which we acclaim:

Great is the mystery of faith.
Christ has died:
Christ is risen:
Christ will come again!

The Eucharistic Prayer continues and concludes with the doxology, to which we all joyfully acclaim **Amen!**

Rejoicing in God's new creation, let us pray with confidence to the Father in the words our Saviour gave us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come; thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, now and for ever. Amen.

As the Bread is broken, we say the Agnus Dei:

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us.
Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us.
Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: grant us peace.

The celebrant then invites us to receive Holy Communion:

Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.

Therefore let us keep the feast, alleluia!

After he has received Holy Communion, the celebrant says the Communion Antiphon:

One thing I seek:

to dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, alleluia.

Psalm 27.4

We come forward to receive Holy Communion. **To aid movement, all those seated on the right (cell) side of the church come to the altar first,** followed after everyone on that side has received by those seated on the left (Our Lady's) side. Come forward and form a line across the chancel.

If you do not wish to drink from the chalice, it is perfectly acceptable to receive only the Host, in which the full gift of Holy Communion is still received.

As the Blessed Sacrament is given, the minister says:

The Body of Christ. The Blood of Christ.

Amen. Amen.

If you have not been baptised and admitted to Holy Communion in this church or your own, please come forward for a blessing from the celebrant, bringing this booklet as a sign of your intention.

Towards the end of the distribution of Holy Communion, we remain kneeling or seated to sing the hymn.

Rejoice in God's saints, this day of all days: A world without saints forgets how to praise. Rejoice in their courage, their spiritual skill; In Julian of Norwich, rejoice all who will!

The candle she lit six centuries gone By darkness beset shines quietly on; Her cell is no prison, though narrow and dim, For Jesus is risen, and she lives in him.

How bright in her cell the Shewings of God, No writings could tell what love understood; She suffers his Passion, she grieves over sin, And shares that compassion which makes us all kin.

How courteous is God, all love and all light, In God's motherhood she finds her delight. She pleads for the sinner, she wrestles with hell; God answers: 'All manner of thing shall be well.'

Dear Lord, we would learn to walk in this way, With patience discern how best to obey. The disciplined spirit, how saintly and rare, Lord, help us to wear it – this habit of prayer.

God our Father, in tender courtesy you give us the Blessed Sacrament, which is the previous food of life itself: grant that by its saving power we may live gladly and gaily because of your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

We remain standing for the Blessing.

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! **He is risen indeed! Alleluia!**

The deacon says
Bow your heads and pray for God's blessing.

May God, who kindled the fire of his love in the hearts of the saints, pour upon you the riches of his grace. **Amen.**

May he give you joy in their fellowship and a share in their praises.

Amen.

May he strengthen you to follow them in the way of holiness and to come to the full radiance of glory. **Amen.**

And the blessing of almighty God, the ♣ Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**

We face Our Lady, with whom we rejoice greatly in her Son's Resurrection, and greet her as we sing the noonday Regina Coeli.

Joy to thee, O Queen of heaven, alleluia! He whom thou wast meet to bear, alleluia! As he promised, hath aris'n: alleluia! Pour for us to God thy prayer: alleluia!

Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia! For the Lord is risen indeed, alleluia!

Let us pray.

O God, who through the Resurrection of thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ hast vouchsafed joy to the whole world: grant, we beseech thee, that aided by the prayers of his Mother the Virgin Mary, we may attain the joys of everlasting life; through the same Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The deacon sends us into the world to live our Easter faith.

Go in the peace of Christ, alleluia, alleluia! **Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia!**

We remain standing as the altar party leaves the church, then we sit to enjoy the organ voluntary.

A short break follows the Mass while the sanctuary is cleared and the church is prepared for the lecture: you are welcome to walk in the garden for a few minutes or to visit the WC in the Julian Centre, but please be back in church at 11.55am so that the lecture can begin promptly.

The Julian Centre is currently closed for refurbishment: we are able to use the WCs today, but please be careful in doing so as the site is not currently set up properly for public access.
