Essentials

- Water**—one gallon per person, per day (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- Food**—non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home)
- Flashlight**
- Radio** Battery-powered or hand-crank (NOAA Weather Radio, if possible)
- Extra batteries**
- First aid kit**
- Medical items, including Medications** (7-day supply)
- Multipurpose tool**
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items**
- Copies of personal documents** (medication list and pertinent medical information, proof of address, deed/lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies)
- Cell phone with chargers**
- Family and emergency contact information**
- Extra cash**
- Emergency blanket**
- Map(s) of the area**
- Matches**

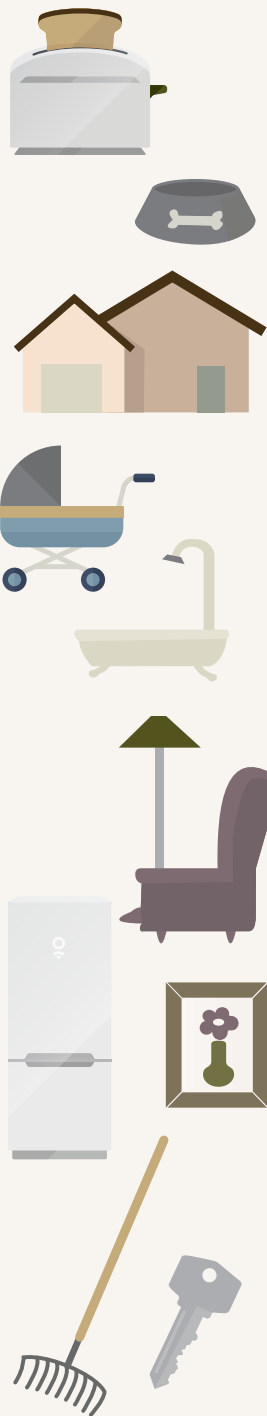
Further Supplies to Consider

- Fuel cans**
- Medical supplies** (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, cane)
- Baby supplies** (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers)
- Hand sanitizer**
- Games and activities for children**
- Pet supplies** (collar, leash, ID, food, carrier, bowl)
- Two-way radios**
- Extra set of keys** (car and house)
- Manual can opener**
- Extra clothing, hat and sturdy shoes**
- Plastic sheeting**
- Duct tape**
- Scissors**
- Household liquid bleach**
- Entertainment items**
- Blankets or sleeping bags**
- Portable Toilet Sets**

Recommendations Based on Geographical Area

These may only apply for certain disasters

- Whistle**
- N95 or surgical masks**
- Rain gear**
- Towels**
- Work gloves**
- Tools/supplies for securing your home**
- Sand bags and sand**
- Wood** (plywood, lumber, etc.)
- Hard hats**



AT WORK



Essentials

- Clipboard/binder with list of personnel
- Water** (one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days) for drinking and sanitation
- Food** (at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food)
- Radios** Battery-powered or hand-crank and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Bedding and blankets**
- Can opener** (manual)
- Dust mask** to help filter contaminated air
- Plastic Sheeting**
- First-aid kit**
- Flashlight**
- Hand sanitizer**
- Local maps**
- Plastic bags** (zip-top, trash, etc.)
- Toiletries**
- Personal Sanitation**— Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties

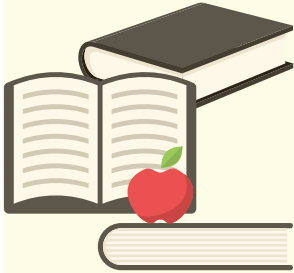
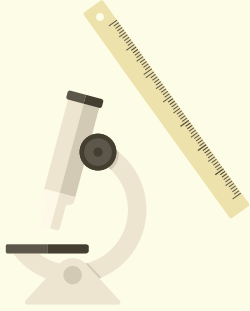
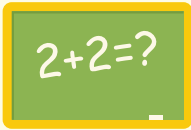
Further Supplies to Consider

- Disposable plates, cups and eating utensils
- Medical supplies
- Batteries
- Communication devices** (two-way radios, satellite radios, cell phones, chargers and weather radio)
- Electrical lockout/tagout kits**
- Extension cords** (indoor and outdoor)
- Fire extinguishers**
- Floor drain plugs**
- Fuel cans and generator fuel**
- Hoses**
- Ropes**
- Tape** (duct, masking, electrical, cloth, caution, etc.)
- Utility knives**
- Bleach**
- Portable Toilet Sets**

Recommendations Based on Geographical Area

- Tarpaulins** (water-resistant, fire-retardant, etc.)
- Rain gear**
- Tools** (pliers, hammer, gas wrench, wrenches, screwdrivers, nails, handsaw, staple gun, staples, etc.)
- Sand bags and sand**
- Sealants** (expandable polyurethane, caulk, caulk guns, etc.)
- Sump pumps**
- Wood** (plywood, lumber, etc.)
- Towels** (paper, cloth rags, etc.)
- Hard hats**
- Bungee cords**

AT SCHOOL

Essentials

- Clipboard with:
 - List of classroom students (and photo)
 - List of students with special needs and description of needs (i.e. medical issues, prescription medicines, dietary needs), marked confidential
- List of emergency procedures
- First aid supplies
- First aid instruction manual
- Medical gloves
- Food
- Water
- Battery-powered flashlight
- Batteries
- Blankets
- Sanitary items (towelettes & toilet paper)
- Work gloves
- Breathing masks
- Fire extinguishers

Further Supplies to Consider

- Student activities
- Plastic sheeting
- Duct tape
- Whistle & hat (or other identifier) for teacher
- Hand Sanitizer
- Communication devices (two-way radios, satellite radios, cell phones, chargers and weather radio)
- Bucket
- Can opener
- Plastic bags (garbage bags, plastic liners etc.)
- Portable Toilet Sets
- Work Gloves

Go Kit

According to the recommendation of Ready.gov all classrooms should have a "go kit" in event of emergency evacuation. Supplies to consider packing in a Go Kit are:

- Clipboard with:
 - List of classroom students
 - List of students with special needs and description of needs
- List of school emergency procedures
- Whistle and hat for teacher identification
- First aid kit with instructions
- Student activities (such as playing cards, checkers, inflatable ball)
