Designer Chat: Ron White



KATE MIDDLETON'S WEDDING gown and

the polks-dot dress worm by Julia Roberts in Pretty Woman—unfragettable fashion moments in pop endurer—may sneak into designer Ron White's creative consciousness, but like a true retailer, White allows his designs to be guided by the clientele he's amassed since opening his first luxury comfort footwer store in

comfort footwear store in 1993, "Twe taken my customers' wish-lists into consideration," White says of his Spring '12 Signature Collection, his year-old line of red carpet-worthy shoes. "They've asked for thinner and higher heels and have given me the confidence to really push further with my designs."

The Toronto-based designer has jushed the technology envlope too, incorporating 5.5 millimeters of Poron cashioning into overy abje and adding a Vibram outsole for the first time this season. With suggested retail prices between 8550 and 8850, White says he wants his customers to feel good about investing in a pair of comfortable and warrable shoes.—Angele Welapade.

What's new for spring? I was inspired by the "70s. The shoes have a rator feel—like Sonny and Cher—with a lot of metallic, shades of burnt orange, chocolate brown and color blocking. Yo'll see a mix of materials like chiffon, patent, silks and organza. I'm also using a cashmere printed suede that looks like crackle potters, lizard and susky.



What are key silhouettes for the season? It's important to have a range from elegant red carpet-ready dress sandals to more tailored peep-toes and slingbacks. There will also be a more aggressive grouping, it sounds like an oxymorom, coming from a luxury comfort brand, but I'm introducing my first snike hrel.

Who is the Signature Collection customer? She's a socialite with disposable income. Even so, she wants to be able to wear her shoes to a gala or pair them with skinny jeans.

What inspires you? I keep notes in a file to keep track of all the things that inspire me from day to day. The seats of a vintage convertible at a car show inspired a ballet flat. A retailer used the phrase "tears of joy," and I later looped thin pieces of leather into a chain link of teardrops on one of my sandals.

Which footwear designer do you most admire? The original king of footwear, Roger-Vivier. His designs were inventive and special.

If you could dress anyone, who would it he? Oprah. She's over 50 and wants to look stylish. But she has very particular needs for her feet. On her show, she was known for walking out in ultra-high heets, but would kick them off once she sat down. She was harefoot for part of her final show. I would want to solve that problem.
