## How To Determine Your Ring Size

## Getting your ring size right

1. First off, make sure you're printing this to scale so all the measurements are accurate - this guide is only compatible with A4 paper.
2. When printing, check the scale by using the following - for Windows, set page scaling to 'none', then print. Mac users, edit the scale to 'customised', type '100', and print. Double check you're printing on A4 paper!
3. Once printed, check the measurements on this scale and ensure they line up perfectly with your ruler or measuring tape. If so, we're good to go!

Useful tip: engagement rings and wedding rings are worn on the third finger of your left hand. This is called your 'ring finger' and is next to your pinky.

## Measuring the ring you have

1. 

Select the ring you'd like to measure. Note, each of our fingers will measure differently - sometimes quite drastically. So, make sure the ring you select fits well on the finger you intend to create a ring for.
2. If you don't have a ring for the finger you intend to create a ring for, find a ring worn on the same finger on the other hand. If you're looking for an engagement ring size, you can use rings worn on the third finger of the right hand - but it may need adjusting later.
3. Use the following circles to find the closest match - simply place the ring on top of whichever looks right, until you find the right fit!


If your ring size appears to fall somewhere between two different circles, it'll be a half size measurement, for example ' $M 1 / 2$ '
